

History of UTMB

The University of Tennessee Martin Branch is located in the northwestern part of the state. It is situated about half-way between historic, earthquake-formed Reelfoot Lake and Kentucky-Tennessee Lake, the latter being one of the largest man-made bodies of water in the United States.

The main campus of UTMB includes 75 acres of beautifully wooded land on state highway 22 in the western limits of Martin, a city of 5,000 population. Buildings on the main campus are arranged on an open quadrangle with paved drives located outside the campus proper so that vehicles do not disturb pedestrian traffic. The school's new Physical Education Building is located off the campus quadrangle, and is the first building of a planned auxiliary campus.

In 1951, the institution was made a senior college by legislative enactment and its name was changed to The University of Tennessee Martin Branch. At the present time, the school is rapidly growing, with three new buildings being completed this year and a new stadium started this year. UTMB offers degrees in liberal arts, agriculture, business administration, education, and home economics. In addition to these degrees, two years of journalism and the two years of basic engineering are offered.

DR. PAUL MEEK

Vice-President of The University of Tennessee In Charge of the Martin Branch

Dr. Paul Meek, Vice-President of The University of Tennessee in charge of the Martin Branch, has been head of the school since 1934. From its beginning in 1927, the school has had only one other chief administrative officer.

Vice-President Meek is a native of Weakley County and served as superintendent of Harlan, Ky., city schools before coming to UTMB. He did both his graduate and undergraduate work at The University of Tennessee, Knoxville.

He has served as president of the Tennessee College Association and is a member of the Tennessee Edu-

cation Association and National Education Association. Dr. Meek is also a member of the Martin Rotary Club, of the Weakley County Chamber of Commerce, and has served as chaplain of the local post of the American Legion.

For a number of years he has been an active member and a lay leader in his church. At the present time, he is a member of the Board of Education of the Memphis Conference of the Methodist Church. Lambuth College, in recognition of his outstanding work as a religious leader and educator, awarded Dr. Meek the honorary degree of Doctor of Laws in 1959. This past year he was elevated from the position of dean to the position of vice-president.

During his tenure of office as administrative head, Vice-President Meek has seen the annual enrollment of UTMB grow from less than 100 to 1,500. By 1965, the enrollment is charted to climb to 2,000. At the present time, the institution ranks about seventh in the state in the number of first-time freshmen enrolled during the fall quarter.

Dr. Meek has always been an enthusiastic booster of athletics at UTMB while holding high interests in all functions on campus. He makes a habit of meeting and learning the names of a large number of students and becomes personally acquainted with them during their stay at UTMB.

James C. Henson

ATHLETIC DIRECTOR

J. C. Henson has served as athletic director of UTMB since 1957. Prior to that time he was UTMB's football coach for nine years. Professor Henson also serves as director of physical education and health and acts as tennis coach. Under his leadership, athletics at UTMB have expanded into a program of spring sports including track, tennis, baseball and golf.

Professor Henson was born in Okolona, Mississippi, and lived in the near vicinity for a number of

years. While attending Mississippi State, he earned four letters in football and three in track. He was starting tackle on the Maroon team of 1935 that beat Alabama's Rose Bowl team and Army's hitherto undefeated team. He captained the track team his senior year at State.

Professor Henson coached high school football in Alabama and Mississippi for a short time and served as head coach of the football team at Mississippi Junior College. Upon coming to UTMB in 1946, he was made assistant to Coach Paul Hug. The next year he took the reins as head football coach, a position he held for nine years. He was basketball coach from 1947 until 1952. He assumed the duties of athletic director in 1957 and has held the rank of full professor since September of 1960. In addition, he serves UTMB as chairman of health and physical education in the Education department.

Henson received the bachelor of science degree at Mississippi State and later the master of science degree in education there. He also holds the master of arts degree in health and physical education from Alabama.

Increasing enrollment has led to degree expansions in the Department of Education with an endorsement in health and physical education. Crowded facilities of the old physical education building, expanded course offerings and an increasing number of students to be served by the departments created the need for facilities. A modern physical education building was completed this year. It is surrounded by 25 acres of land set aside for athletic purposes. Professor Henson played a leading role in planning the needed facility for UTMB.

HEAD COACH

Robert Carroll begins his seventh season as head football coach at UTMB this fall. Coming here on his first coaching job, he has proven by the record he has compiled that he is not only a winning coach but also a progressive and an accomplished one.

In the past six seasons his teams have won 34, lost 16, and tied one. He lost only one game in his first two seasons at UTMB. Since that time the caliber of Vol opponents has gone up. For example, Harding

College and Middle Tennessee State were added to the already rocky 1963 schedule.

In 1957, Coach Carroll came to Martin after an outstanding career as a player at UTMB and at The University of Wyoming. J. C. Henson, present athletic director at UTMB, coached Carroll prior to his transfer to Wyoming. Playing under Phil Dickens, Carroll was a member of the 1956 team that defeated Texas Tech in the Sun Bowl.

Carroll's football playing did not interfere with his studies. In 1954, he was named to the Academic All-America team. He graduated from Wyoming in 1956 with honors. He was a member of Psi Chi, national honorary psychology fraternity. He served in the Marine Corps during 1951 and 1952 and was discharged with the rank of sergeant. He is a native of Milan, Tennessee.

Carroll prefers a high-scoring team both on the field and in the classroom. He pays strict attention to the academic progress of his men. The head coach believes in hard-nosed football and demands absolute devotion to duty from his players.

In August of 1962, he received his masters' degree in history from The University of Mississippi. He is well-qualified for his work both by his experience and his keen understanding of the game and is respected by football men all over the state.

GROVER PAGE, LINE COACH

Grover Page, former center and teammate of Coach Carroll and end coach Ross Elder at The University of Wyoming, has done an excellent job as line coach since his arrival at UTMB in 1959.

Page lettered two years at Wyoming and helped lead the Cowboys to first place in the Skyline Conference in 1956. This was the team that defeated Texas Tech in the Sun Bowl.

He attended Georgia Military College before transferring to Wyoming and was named to the Junior College All-America team.

After being discharged from the Army in 1958, Page coached prep football and basketball at Aiken, S. C.

ROSS ELDER, END COACH

Currently serving his fifth season as end coach on the Vol staff, Elder was a three-year letterman at Wyoming. He was unanimously elected to All-Skyline Conference end his senior year. In 1956 he played in the Blue-Gray game at Montgomery, Ala.

A versatile man, he coaches track and is an avid golfer, often competing against his colleagues, Page and Carroll. He does a very capable job scouting for the Vols.

Elder coached football at Worland, Wyo., High School. He assisted Phil Dickens at Indiana University while working on his masters' degree prior to his arrival at UTMB.

OTHER PERSONNEL

TED SINES (Freshman Coach)

Sines will make his debut as a coach this fall. A senior in secondary education, he played four years at UTMB as a quarterback and halfback. Lettering for his third time last season, Sines was switched to halfback to aid the Vols after injuries weakened the backfield. A constant hustler, he has a deep love for football. He will be working with incoming freshmen and men who have been red-shirted. With the fine attitude that he has, he will help the coaches and the 1963 Vols a great deal.

CURTIS SHELTON (Equipment Manager)

Shelton will begin his fourth year as manager for the Vols. A senior in education, he has been with the team for a long time and knows exactly what the needs of the squad are. Responsible for the upkeep of equipment and the daily assignment of uniforms, he also finds time to excel in tumbling and all athletic events. He worked with Jim Love last year on the parallel bars.

SONNY GILBERT (Equipment Manager)

Gilbert will be sharing the job as manager this season. Forced to retire as an active player because of an injury in the Arkansas State Teachers game last year, he was a starting guard on the Vols' All-VSAC team. Gilbert, a senior, is majoring in P. E.

PAUL YOUNG (Trainer)

Young begins his first year as head trainer for UTMB. A hard worker, he aided trainer Jeff Branham last spring and gained much experience in applying medical care to injuries. An all-round athlete in high school, he is a great sideline booster of the Vols.

DAVID DUNCAN (Sports Information Director)

Duncan is serving his first year as sports information director. Filling the vacancy left by long time Vol SID Ronnie Gill last Spring, he works daily with athletic information concerning UTMB sports. Working in close cooperation with local radio station WCMT, and the city's Weakley County Press, he also serves as sports editor of The Volette and the yearbook. Responsible for the publicizing of UTMB sports, he coordinates these activities through the public relations office. He is a sophomore in Liberal Arts.

1963 Football Outlook

UTMB's football squad, returning with a VSAC championship trophy and a good 6-3 record, must face a rebuilding season in 1963. Inexperience looms as the major problem confronting the coaches going into the opening game.

Much will depend on the sophomore and junior members of the squad who played a considerable amount of ball last year. Losing the entire starting backfield and key ends and tackles, the team must feature young but capable returning lettermen at the vacated spots.

Billy Watson, senior punting and passing ace, will return to fill the gap left by graduated All-VSAC'er Vernon Prather. Billy is experienced and smart and should make a good field general. Gene Brodie, Tom Pickens, and Jerry Gage will carry the bulk of the backfield work. Brodie is an experienced veteran and should have an outstanding season. Pickens and Gage are young but have been coming along nicely.

Veteran Scott Boehringer, an end who has played good ball for the Vols, must provide the necessary punch to replace Little All-Americán end Jim Love. The bright spot on the '63 team is the inner line. It holds the depth that is lacking in the backfield. Tackle Jim Nunley, a senior who started last season, along with defensive stand-out John Federico, provide a good front line. Sophomore guards Lorry Ruth and Nenion Conley, who played exceedingly well last year, will flank center Jerry Bethune. Bethune, as well as Nunley, were honorable mention all-conference last year.

Losing 15 lettermen and returning with 17, the Vols' spring practice was spent in blocking fundamentals, passing, and defense. Head Coach Robert Carroll indicated that the defense looked very strong, especially in the line with several transfers coming through real well. He added that the offense was spasmodically weak and must be corrected, if the Vols plan to have another good year.

Together with the inexperience problem, the Vols face the toughest slate in their football history this season. Adding Middle Tennessee and Harding to the 1963 schedule increased the competition greatly. The schedule now contains three Ohio Valley Conference foes, Middle Tennessee, Murray, and Austin Peay. Coach Carroll summed it all up by saying, "The squad appears to be filled with desire and a love for the game. If the young boys come through I think we'll surprise somebody."

speedy red-shirt Scotty Gunter.

Joe Roberts iced the game in the final frame with a 6-yard scoring punch, after Tom Pickens had snagged another Orange pass and raced 45 yards back to the 12 yard line. Both interceptions came off sophomore quarterback Howard Finley who performed exceptionally well at his special position, defensive back.

Tackles Jim Nunley and John Federico, guards Lorry Ruth and Nenion Conley, and center Jerry Bethune produced exciting, grinding line play. The boys will be starting this fall and are expected to carry the bulk of the defensive duties. Scott Boehringer performed well hauling in a 31 yard pass at his end post. Gene Brodie, sparked by a 67-yard spurt, led the teams in rushing with 93 yards. Tom Pickens followed with 63. Quarterback Billy Watson led the passing category with three out of nine completed.

UTMB'S GROWING ATHLETICS

In keeping with the tremendous expansion program being carried on at The University of Tennessee Martin Branch, progress in the Athletic Department has bolted ahead.

Since 1958, UTMB's caliber of opponents has been steadily rising. Pitted against larger schools respected for their strength, the Vols have produced many winning seasons and have won the strong support of students and fans all over West Tennessee.

With the school growing rapidly in the various areas of learning, the Physical Education Department exceeded its bounds several years ago. This year dreams became a reality. A more than adequate football stadium, to be started this fall, will be a valuable adjunct to athletics at UTMB, along with the new Vol Physical Education Building which includes a sunken basketball arena. These two large steps forward boost sports enthusiasm at UTMB to new heights.

The proposed stadium, pictured on the cover, will be built on the present playing field and will seat approximately 5,061 fans. Dressing rooms, showers, and rest room facilities will be located under the seats. The \$125,000 needed for the construction of the stadium was raised through contributions of alumni, fans, and supporters throughout Tennessee, illustrating the strong backing and support UTMB enjoys. For several years football fans have had to stand on the sidelines or crowd into the bleachers. Late this year adequate room will be found for all.

UTMB's beautiful, new Physical Education Building is the first building to be situated on the new campus planned to adjoin the present quadrangle. A total of 4,500 people can be seated in the sunken basketball arena to watch the Vols play on a spacious hardwood floor. Several doors and lobbies will permit fast entrance and departure, while plenty of parking space will greet the fans across the street. The remainder of the huge building will accommodate athletic offices, class rooms, and men's physical education. Two smaller "gyms" will house classes in conditioning, tumbling, etc.

These additions illustrate the rapid growth of The University of Tennessee Martin Branch, an institution of which athletics is an integral part.
