MEMBERS OF THE MEDIA

The 1977 UTM Football Guide has been prepared as an aid to your coverage of University of Tennessee at Martin football.

The publication answers virtually any questions you might have concerning the University, Pacer football, and related information. The brochure index is a helpful aid in locating items of interest. We especially refer your attention to the player sketches for such bits of information as academic classification, experience, major area of study, height, weight, and hometown.

Admission to the press box in Pacer Stadium is granted to the working press and radio, visiting scouts, and statisticians. Request for press box seats should be sent to the Sports Information Office at least two weeks prior to the date of the game to allow sufficient time for return mailing. Late requests will be handled on a space available basis.

Due to the limited space in the press box, front row seats are reserved for stat crews. The back row accommodates working press and scouts. A film deck is located outside the working press area.

Requests for broadcast privileges should be addressed to the Sports Information Office, UTM Athletic Dept. (901-587-7504). In order to have sufficient time to make broadcast arrangements, all requests should be submitted at least five days prior to the broadcast.

Photographers may take pictures from the sidelines during the game if they keep away from the coaching area. Sideline passes are available upon request in the press box.

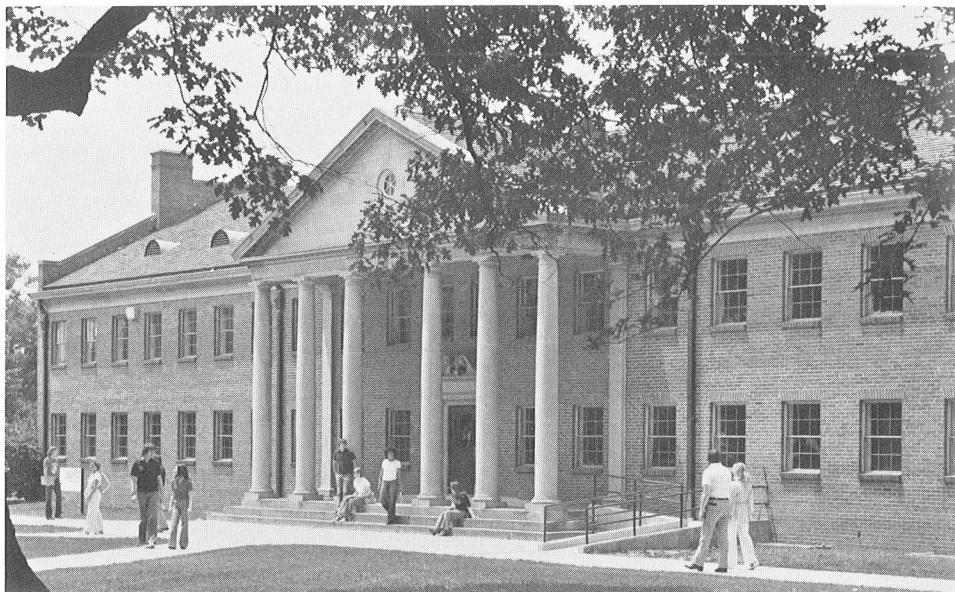

3. To review periodically and advise the Chancellor and Athletic Department on matters such as personnel, budget, ticket policies, student fees, schedules, conference memberships, recruitment policies, facilities and public relations.

HISTORY

The University of Tennessee at Martin, one of five primary campuses in the UT system, is situated in the northwestern part of the state about 125 miles northeast of Memphis and 150 miles northwest of Nashville. A coeducational institution, UTM has an approximate enrollment of 5,200.

The school traces its origin back to Hall-Moody Institute, established by the Baptists of Martin in 1900. It gained junior college status in 1927, when the state legislature passed a bill stipulating that the school be operated by The University of Tennessee. UT Junior College became a senior college in 1951. The name of the institution was changed to The University Martin Branch, and it offered bachelor's degree programs in agriculture and home economics. In 1967, the school officially became The University of Tennessee at Martin.

The roles and function of UT Martin are similar to those of The University of Tennessee at Knoxville including instruction, public service, and research. But in terms of emphasis and focus, UTM is primarily a residential campus, committed to the offering of superior quality undergraduate programs.

Academically, UTM offers programs of study leading to the bachelor's degree in more than 50 specialized fields. These are offered through the schools of Agriculture, Business Administration, Education, Home Economics, and Liberal Arts, and Engineering and Engineering Technology. The Department of Nursing, organized in 1970, offers the Associate of Arts degree in Nursing preparatory to registered nurse certification. In addition, UTM offers the Master of Science degree in Education, with three majors, and in Home Economics, in four concentration areas.

The physical plant, including a 200-acre main campus and a 700-acre farm which is a unit of the UT Agricultural Experiment Station, has a replacement value of \$95 million.

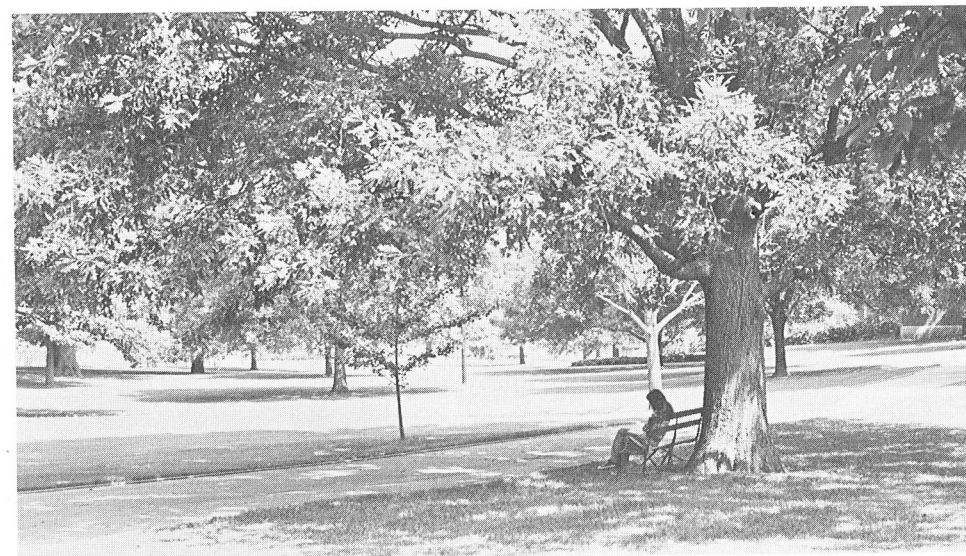

Dr. Larry T. McGehee
CHANCELLOR

Dr. Larry T. McGehee has been Chancellor of The University of Tennessee at Martin since December 1971. He is the fourth executive officer to head the campus since it became a part of The University of Tennessee in 1927.

Prior to joining UTM, Dr. McGehee had served The University of Alabama six years as Academic Vice President, Associate Professor of American Studies, Executive Vice President, and Executive Assistant to the President.

Before his appointment to the Alabama staff, he was acting director of the Ecumenical Center for Continuing Education at New Haven, Connecticut, and was a graduate teaching assistant and research assistant at Yale Divinity School.

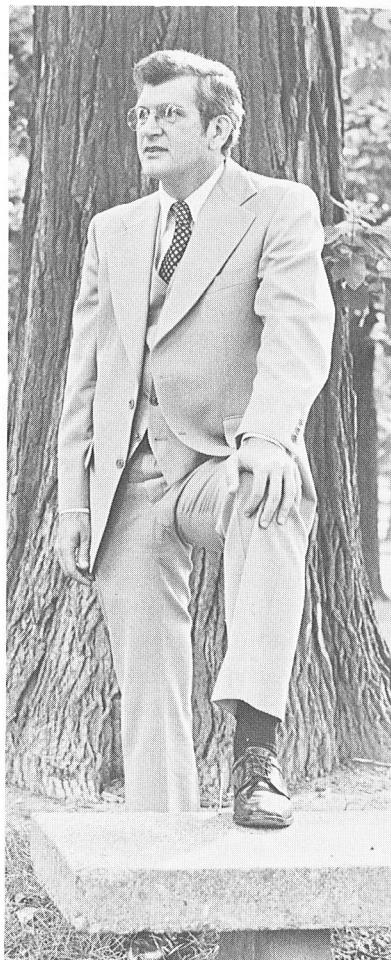
A native of Paris, Tennessee, Dr. McGehee received the B.A. degree in English from Transylvania University in Lexington, Kentucky, in 1958. He received the B.D., M.A., and Ph.D. degrees in religious studies from Yale University, during which time he held the esteemed Danforth Fellowship.

Dr. McGehee is a curator of Transylvania University, past chairman of the West Tenn. Heart Fund, past member of the Danforth Fellowship Selection Committee, the American Council on Education Intern Selection Committee, and the Rotary Club District Selection Committee for Student Fellowships, past president of the Gulf South Athletic Conference, and serves on an HEW advisory panel to establish an HEW Summer College Intern Program.

Chancellor McGehee is the author of numerous professional articles as well as short stories and poetry, and he is a noted speaker. He received international acclaim for his three-minute commencement address at The University of Alabama in 1972.

Active in civic and church affairs, Dr. McGehee is a member of the Martin Rotary Club and serves as a deacon in the First Christian Church (Disciples) in Martin.

Dr. McGehee is married to the former Elizabeth Boden of Louisville, Kentucky and they have two daughters, Elizabeth and Molly.

DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS
HEAD BASKETBALL COACH

Bob Paynter has made a tremendous impact on The University of Tennessee at Martin athletic scene since being named director of athletics and head basketball coach in 1971.

During the 1976-77 season, Paynter's squad rolled to an impressive 18-10 record for the most wins ever in a single season for a Pacer basketball team. A highlight of the season was a five-game European tour.

Paynter will face his toughest basketball schedule to date during the upcoming year with such opponents as powerful Tennessee State, the University of San Diego, plus member schools from the rugged Gulf South Conference. However, Paynter has the knack for meeting formidable challenges, and the Pacers are expected to field another top-flight team.

One of the most respected figures in the southern small college athletic community, his record as a coach and administrator has been just as impressive as the mark he made as a collegiate basketball player and successful high school coach and administrator.

His background in athletics, both as a player and a coach, spans four decades. He served as an officer in the Mid-South Athletic Conference and was instrumental in the realignment of the newly created Gulf South Conference which boasts a four-state membership.

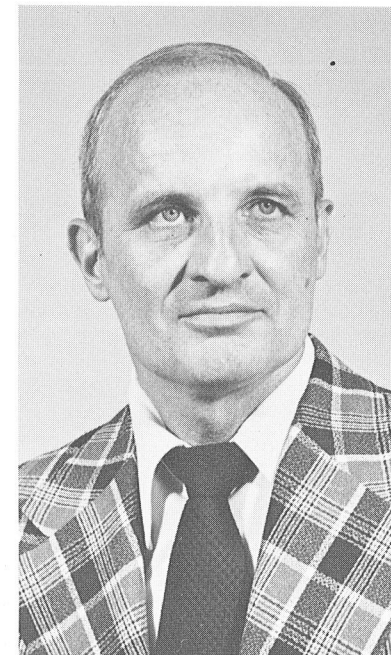
A native of Richmond, Kentucky, he was a standout player at Madison High School and Eastern Kentucky University where he lettered as a freshman basketball player. Transferring to St. Mary's College in 1944 as a V-12 cadet, he earned a letter as a starting guard. With the war's end and abandonment of the V-12 program, he was transferred to the Naval ROTC unit at Marquette University where he lettered in 1945-46. He concluded his collegiate playing career at St. Mary's where he captained the 1946-48 cage teams and was a two-time All-Minnesota guard.

His coaching experience includes 14 years as head coach at the University School at East Tennessee State University. His career record as a cage tutor stands at 389 wins against 219 losses. Seven of his final years as a prep coach, his teams advanced to regional competition and in 1963 reached the TSSAA state tournament quarterfinals. Nineteen athletes who prepped under his tutelage advanced to college ranks and two achieved all league honors in the Ohio Valley Conference.

He was named also to a Fulbright Exchange Teacher's post at Leeds, England. While abroad he played on the Leeds University basketball team that placed second behind Cambridge in All-England competition.

Paynter holds the bachelor's degree from St. Mary's, the master's degree from Eastern Kentucky, and a doctorate in education from UT Knoxville.

He is married to the former Wilma Bogan, and they have one son, Todd.

ASSISTANT ATHLETIC DIRECTOR

Bob Carroll, the man who lifted UT Martin football from a fledgling junior college program into national prominence as a senior institution, embarks on his twenty-first year with the Pacers.

After serving as UTM's head football coach for eighteen years, he gave up the coaching reins following the 1974 season, and immediately went to work in an administrative capacity working primarily with the budget, scheduling, travel arrangements, and coordinating the new Varsity Squad for athletic donors.

Carroll was elected to head the Pacer football fortunes in 1957 and was faced with rebuilding a sagging grid program which had not posted a winning season since 1950.

Combining his experience as a student junior college player at UTM and major college player at the University of Wyoming where he earned Academic All-American honors in 1954, he developed a highly respected football program. His overall record of 85-82-4 ranks him as the winningest coach in UTM history and only one other coach has a superior won-loss record.

Nine of Carroll's charges were named to small college All-American teams including Hugh Lashlee (1957), Buddy Long (1958), Bobby Fowler (1959), Ralph Rutland (1960 & 1961), Darrell Smith (1962), Jim Love (1962), Julian Nunamaker (1968), Terry Giltner (1970), and Nate Holmes (1971). Harris Pritchett (1960) and Randy West (1974) were named to academic All-America teams.

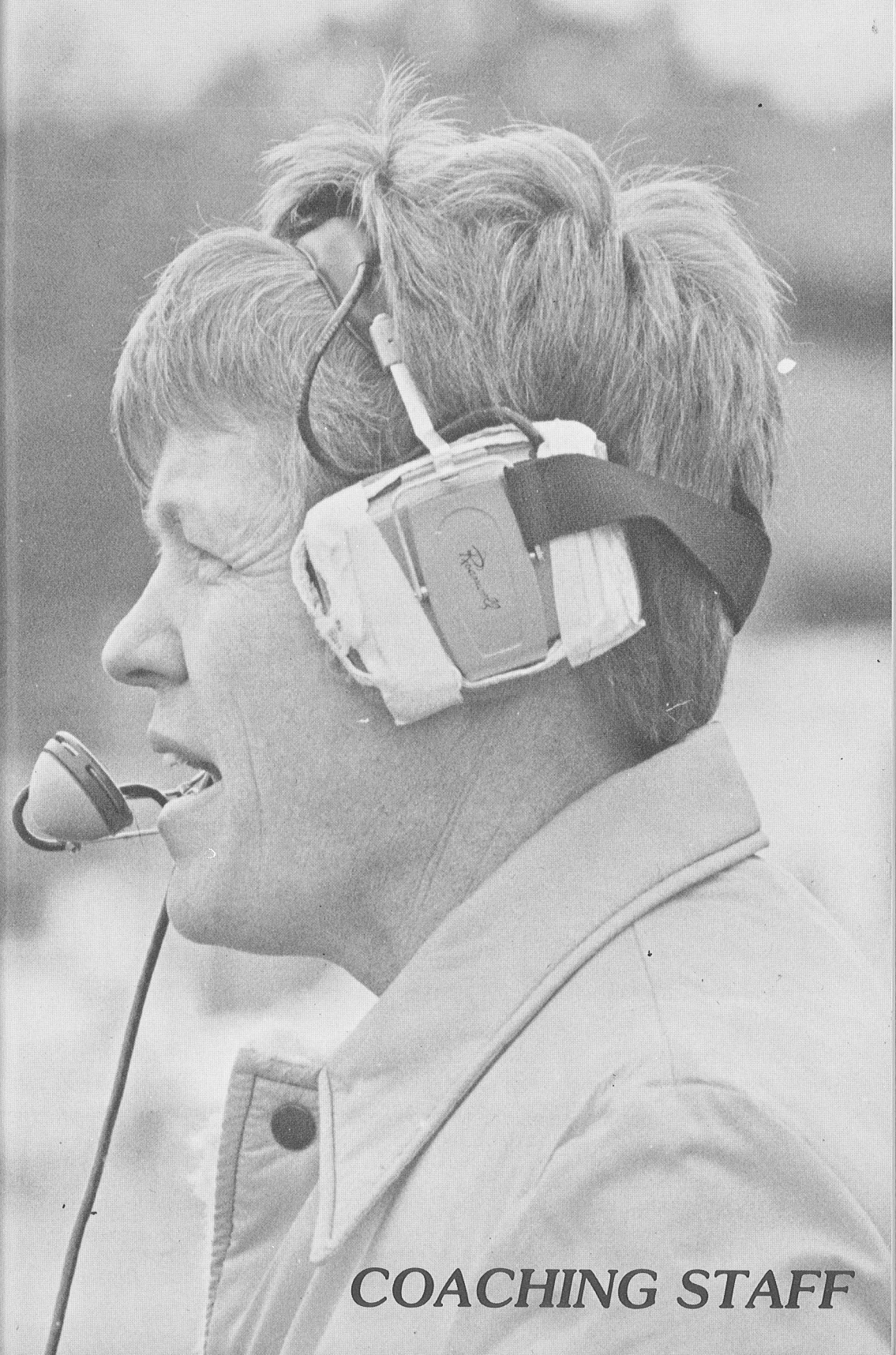
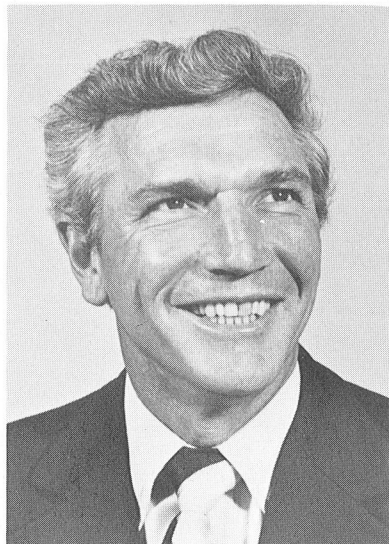
Sixteen of Carroll's players signed professional football contracts. Julian Nunamaker, the only college division player ever to start in four consecutive post-season all-star games, signed with the Buffalo Bills; Gene Sides, holder of the NCAA college division record for the longest punt (69 yards in the 1967 Tangerine Bowl) signed with the Houston Oilers; Joe Taffoni with the Cleveland Browns; Bobby Hayes and Gordon Lambert with the Denver Broncos; Ron Lewellen with the Oakland Raiders; Bobby Fowler with the Chicago Bears; and Nate Holmes with the Miami Dolphins to mention a few of the standouts.

Bob Carroll's dream of national recognition came true in 1967 when his team won the NCAA Atlantic Coast College Division Championship by defeating West Chester State (Pa.) 25-8 in the Tangerine Bowl.

Following an outstanding prep career at Milan High School, he came to the then University of Tennessee Junior College where he was the team's MVP for two consecutive years and was captain as a sophomore. From there he answered the call of Phil Dickens of Wyoming where he earned a starting role on the 1956 Cowboy crew that defeated Texas Tech in the Sun Bowl.

A Marine Corps veteran, Carroll holds a B.A. degree with honors from Wyoming and a M.S.S. degree from The University of Mississippi.

He is married to the former Kay Pritchett, and they have three children, Steve, Cliff and Kala.



COACHING STAFF

George MacIntyre
HEAD FOOTBALL COACH

As he embarks on his third campaign at the Pacer helm, George MacIntyre faces the unenviable task of improving on the 8-3 record of 1976. However, sixteen starters return, and MacIntyre has an optimistic gleam in his eye.

His squad led the Gulf South Conference last season in scoring, rushing offense, and total offense. The defense was equally tough, finishing second in scoring defense, rushing defense, and total defense. It will be a formidable undertaking to improve on 1976, but MacIntyre and his staff are eagerly awaiting the challenges of the upcoming season.

MacIntyre has accomplished a remarkable rebuilding feat with the Pacer football program. He posted a 2-8 record in 1975, but his efforts were rewarded last year with the best mark for the Pacers since 1967.

At 36 MacIntyre is no stranger to rebuilding programs. In his 13-year collegiate coaching career he has been associated with revamping efforts at Miami (Florida), Tampa, Clemson, and Vanderbilt.

A native of Jacksonville, Florida, MacIntyre was a standout athlete and student leader at Andrew Jackson High School where he earned All-Florida honors in both football and baseball. He captained his 1956 prep football team and served as president of the high school senior class.

He attended the University of Miami (Florida) and earned three letters as a Hurricane quarterback and defensive back. He was awarded the bachelor of science degree in 1961.

Following his collegiate playing days, he returned to his hometown and served from 1961-62 as a defensive assistant at Terry Parker High School. From 1962-63 he was a player-coach while in the U.S. Army and then returned to Terry Parker where he was an offensive assistant for a single season.

MacIntyre began his collegiate coaching career in 1964 when he joined Miami's grid staff as freshman coach and head recruiter under Charlie Tate. He remained in that capacity for four seasons before accepting the position of head defensive coach at Tampa under Fran Curci, presently head coach at the University of Kentucky.

In 1970 he became Clemson's defensive secondary coach under Cecil "Hootie" Ingram.

Prior to being named UTM's head coach in December of 1974, he coached defensive backs under Steve Sloan at Vanderbilt and played a vital role in the Commodores' banner 7-3-1 season and trip to the Peach Bowl against Texas Tech.

MacIntyre is a popular speaker and is called on throughout West Tennessee for appearances at civic clubs and high school groups.

He is a member of the First Baptist Church of Martin and is active in youth work.

He is married to the former Elizabeth Harvey of Jacksonville and they have two sons, Michael and Matthew.



Vester Newcomb
OFFENSIVE COORDINATOR/
OFFENSIVE LINE

Vester Newcomb, 45, coordinates the offense and tutors the offensive line for the Pacers. A major reason for the outstanding record in 1976 was the superb job Newcomb has accomplished.

A native of Liberty, Mississippi, he is a veteran of 16 years of coaching, including 11 years at the high school level and 6 years in the collegiate ranks.

A graduate of Liberty High School, he played two seasons at Southwest Mississippi Junior College, two years of interservice football while in the forces, and completed his playing career at the University of Miami.

His coaching career began in 1958 at Miami Senior High School where he coached the defense. His high school squad won three Florida prep championships and was twice named national champions between 1958-62.

Between 1963-65 he coached in the Mississippi prep circles at McComb High School and Liberty High School before joining the Miami staff as freshman coach in 1966. After four seasons on the Hurricane staff, he entered private business but returned to high school coaching ranks for two seasons at Miami Senior High. Just prior to his appointment to the Pacer staff, he served for two years as athletic director and head football coach at Blacksburg High School in Blacksburg, Virginia.

Coach Newcomb is married to the former Charleen Smith of Summit, and they have two sons, Larry and Mac, and a daughter, Linda.

DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR/
SECONDARY

Ron McCrone, 31, serves as defensive coordinator and secondary coach on the UTM staff.

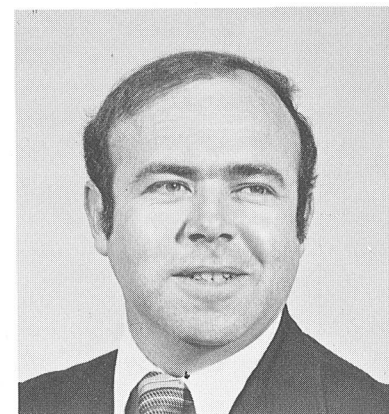
During the 1976 season, the Pacer defense, under McCrone's guidance, finished near the top of the GSC in most categories. With his secondary returning intact, the 1977 group should be equally tough.

He attended high school in Jacksonville, Florida, where he was a standout football and baseball player. Following graduation from high school, he attended Gordon Military College in Barnesville, Georgia, and completed his collegiate career at the University of Florida in 1968. He was a member of the Gators 1967 Orange Bowl team.

He began his coaching career in 1968 as defensive backfield coach at Paxton High School in Jacksonville and served from 1969-70 as defensive backfield coach at Gordon Military College.

During the 1971 season, he was head coach at Gordon and then served one-year stints at Florida as defensive end coach under Doug Dickey, as defensive backfield coach at Tampa under Dennis Fruzel, and then moved to Southern Mississippi where he coached the defensive line under P. W. "Bear" Underwood.

McCrone is married to the former Mary Sue MacIntyre and they have a son, Jeffrey, and a daughter, Kelly.



Fred Pickard
LINEBACKER COACH

Fred Pickard, 39, joined the UTM staff from Terry Parker High School in Jacksonville, Florida, where he was head coach for eight years.

A native of Columbia, Tennessee, Pickard attended Columbia High School where he was a standout athlete. He earned All-Middle Tennessee honors and was the state's second leading scorer in 1956.

He selected Florida State for his collegiate career and was twice an honorable mention All-America selection while starring at the tailback and fullback positions. Following the 1958 campaign, he was named to the Williamson All-America team.

After a brief stint in the Canadian Football League, Pickard returned to his alma mater and served for one season as assistant freshman coach with the Seminoles. In 1962, he joined the Terry Parker football staff as an assistant coach and served in that capacity for four seasons. In 1967 he was named head coach at Terry Parker and directed the school's grid program for eight years, compiling a 48-29-3 record against top-flight competition.

Known as a fierce competitor during his playing days, Pickard has instilled this same competitiveness into his linebacker corps, and this group is noted for its solid and tenacious play.

Married to the former Katherine Wilkinson of Tavenier, Florida, they have a daughter, Tracy, and a son, Clay.

Billy Ware, 39, coaches the defensive ends and coordinates UTM's Fellowship of Christian Athletes.

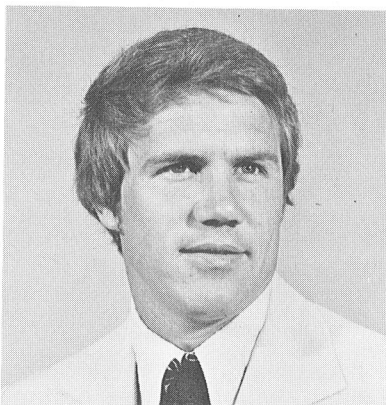

Don Wiggins, 28, coaches the Pacer wide receivers and recruits parts of Georgia and West Tennessee.

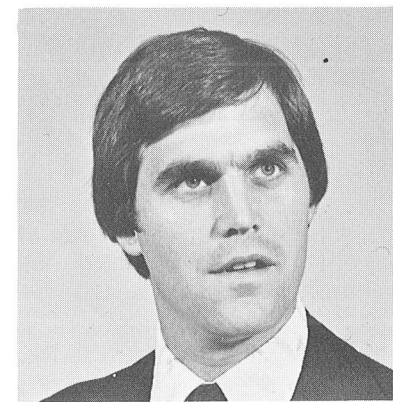
Wiggins joined the UTM coaching staff in 1976 from Sandersville, Georgia, where he served for three years as assistant coach at Washington County High School.

Crook and his wife Kathleen have three daughters Debbie 14, Laurie 13, and Katie 6.

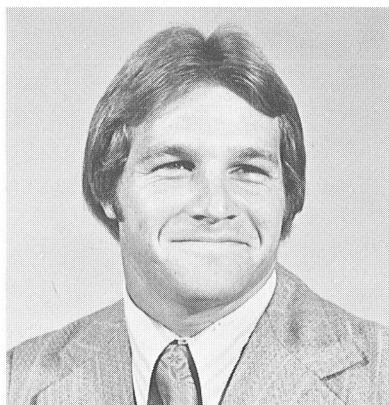


Gary Guthrie

In addition to his field duties, he will assist Coach Crook with housing. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. J. R. Guthrie of Humboldt.



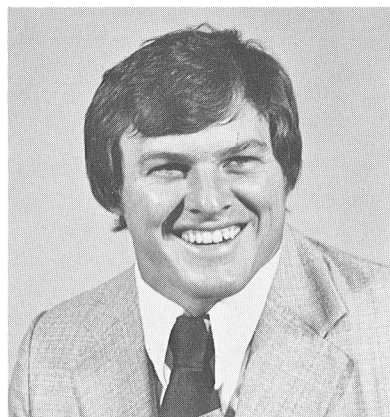
Randy Latta

Ray Bickerstaff HEAD TRAINER - EQUIPMENT MANAGER

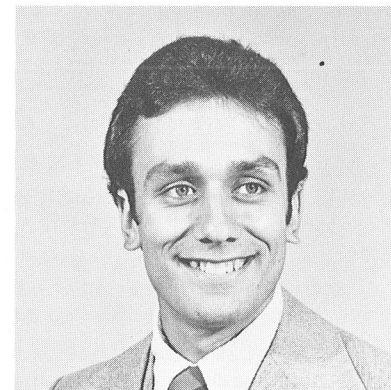
Ray Bickerstaff, 25, enters his third year as the institution's first full-time trainer for intercollegiate athletics and also supervises the operation of the equipment room.

Bickerstaff is married to the former Alice Gregg of Nashville.



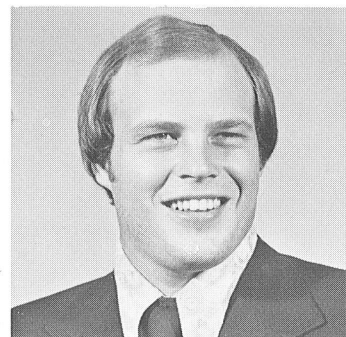

After playing four outstanding years of football for UT Martin, Bill Staehs and James Collins join the Pacer staff as student assistant coaches.

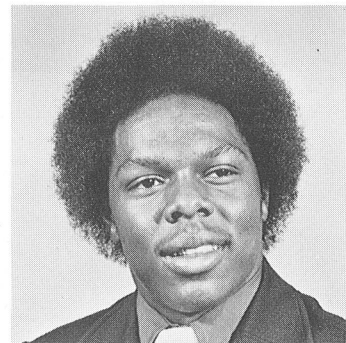
Both men will be responsible for scouting and for running the scout team. In addition, Collins will assist with housing.

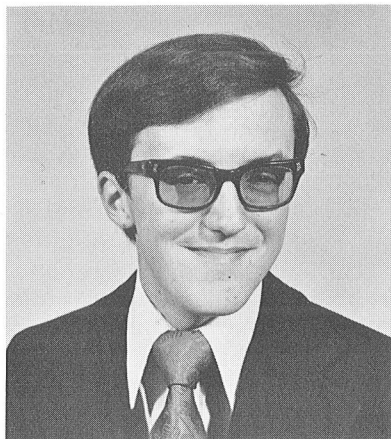
Chuck Rogers begins his third year with the UTM athletic department in a new position with the Office of Sports Information.

He is a senior majoring in Chemistry and is the son of Mr. & Mrs. J. G. Rogers, Jr.



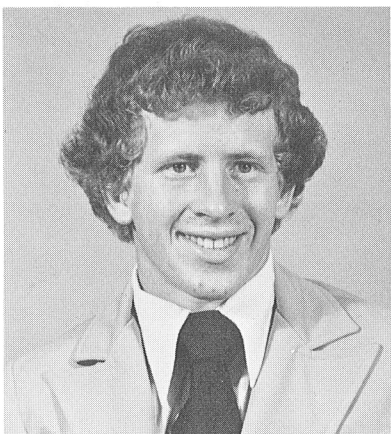

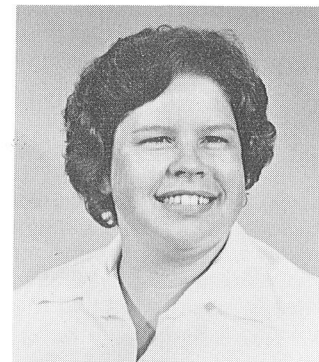

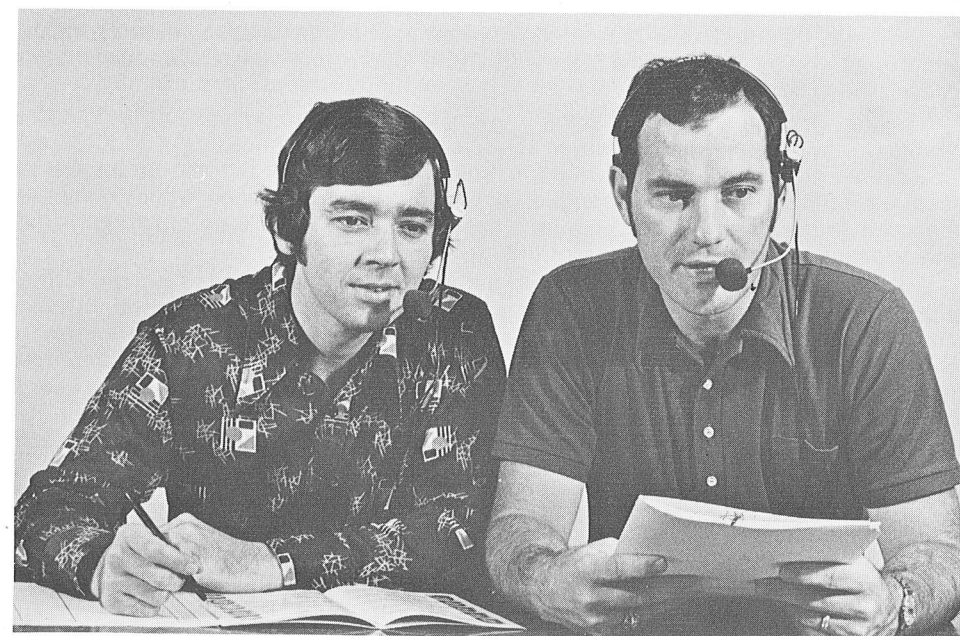

HISTORY OF THE GULF SOUTH CONFERENCE



Recognized as the finest NCAA Division II athletic league in the United States, the Gulf South Conference begins its seventh year of existence in an attempt to do even better during 1977-78.

Last year saw numerous GSC student-athletes receive All-America recognition. Several of those athletes signed professional contracts and played in various All-Star football games.

Football has gained the majority of national attention for the Gulf South Conference during its brief existence. Its first grid champion, Livingston University, won the 1971 NAIA national title. According to the leading football boards, most GSC football teams have a higher power rating than many so-called "major" schools.

Although football has been in the limelight for the GSC, the league has excelled in other sports. The GSC was represented in national post-season competition in six of its seven sports last season, which has been the case almost every year. Troy State University won the 1977 NCAA Division II golf championship, Delta State University won its third straight AIAW large college national women's basketball title, and Southeastern Louisiana won the AIAW small college national women's basketball crown. For the second straight year four GSC baseball teams were selected for the NCAA playoffs and Delta State placed third in the Division II World Series. The Gulf South conference had three of its athletes in the 1976 Olympic Games.

The league was born in the summer of 1970 when representatives from six institutions convened in Birmingham, Ala., to form the Mid-South Athletic Conference, a forerunner of today's GSC.

Tennessee-Martin, Delta State (Miss.), and Alabama institutions Jacksonville State, Florence State (now North Alabama), Troy State, and Livingston University comprised the charter membership of the infant athletic organization. Scheduling problems in that first year permitted only competition for a football championship which was won by Jacksonville State with a 10-0 record, including an Orange Blossom Classic bowl victory.

Growing pangs necessitated expansion in 1971. With the collapse of the old Gulf States Conference -- which left seven schools without conference ties -- Southeastern Louisiana and Nicholls State joined the ranks of the one-year old Mid-South and the league's official name was changed to Gulf South Conference which combined elements in the names of both conferences. Dr. Vernon F. Galliano of Nicholls State was elected as the first president of the new GSC.

Following the first year under the new setup, GSC officials voted to expand further, admitting Northwestern Louisiana and Mississippi College in 1972, thereby upping membership to 10 institutions. Northwestern Louisiana, however, withdrew from the conference last year in order to move into the NCAA Division I classification. Dr. Aubrey K. Lucas of Delta State was chosen president of the GSC for its second year of operation and has been followed by Dr. Larry McGehee of Tennessee-Martin, Dr. Earnest Stone of Jacksonville State, Dr. Clea Parker of Southeastern, Dr. Ralph Adams of Troy State, and Dr. Lewis Nobles of Mississippi College, the current GSC president. Dr. Galliano is the president-elect.

Southeastern Louisiana won the league's first All-Sports Trophy in 1972-73. Other winners of the prestigious award include Northwestern Louisiana in 1973-74, Troy State in 1974-75 and 1976-77 and Nicholls State in 1975-76. Another honor of note is the annual presentation of the Commissioner's Trophy, which goes to the top student-athlete in the GSC. Mark King of Troy State won the initial award in 1975, Billy Hood of Delta State and Anthony Saway of Mississippi College shared the trophy in 1976, and Bryan Rodgers of Delta State won the honor in 1977.

CANDID COMMENTS BY COACH MAC



HOW DO YOU FEEL THE 1977 TEAM WILL COMPARE WITH LAST YEAR'S SQUAD?

Each year a team will have a little different personality. During spring practice I felt we might have a little meaner disposition than last year. We definitely have more confidence. Improving on last year's record will present quite a challenge, but our players have indicated a willingness to sacrifice to attain this goal.

WHAT ARE SOME OF THE WEAKNESSES OF THE 1977 TEAM WHICH ARE OF MAJOR CONCERN?

We must determine who our punter or placekicker will be. Gary Davis showed promise as a punter in the spring, and freshman Mike Poteete will have a good chance to be our kicker. However, both are inexperienced.

Another area of concern is a lack of depth in the offensive and defensive lines.

Finding an adequate long snapper is another problem area. We have several candidates for this extremely important assignment, and hopefully one of these will demonstrate the necessary consistency.

Finally, we must come up with a replacement for Larry Washington. This will be quite a task.

IN WHAT AREAS DO YOU THINK THE SQUAD IS STRONGEST?

Our strongest areas should be the quarterback position, the receiving corps, the defensive secondary, and the linebacker positions.

Alvin Smalls and Donnie Sherman are proven performers at quarterback as are linebackers Danny Watkins and Jim Hardegree. Our defensive secondary, consisting of David Williams, Clay Blalack, Jim Randolph and Mark Carroll, returns intact, and Ralph Ervin, Ron George, Mike Webb, Leon Kelly and Darell Whitmore give us an outstanding group of receivers.

DO YOU FEEL ANY OF THE FRESHMAN SIGNEES CAN GIVE IMMEDIATE HELP?

We are counting on at least seven to provide backup help in the offensive and defensive lines. Dennis Smalls will be a threat as a wide receiver with his great speed (9.4 on the 100), and Dennis Brown will be a big help at linebacker. Some of the others could also forge to the front during fall drills.

HOW DO YOU VIEW BEING LISTED AS ONE OF THE TEAMS FAVORED TO WIN THE GSC?

It is a good feeling to be listed high in the pre-season polls, and our team will have to work harder and be tougher in order to live up to these expectations. The mental condition of the team will be my major concern as we get ready to play each week.

The Pacer Bunch Packs A Punch In '77

With the return of 16 starters from last season's 8-3 squad, the Pacers shape up as a definite title contender in the Gulf South Conference.

The Pacers' potent veer attack will be handled by senior quarterback Alvin Smalls (6-1, 180) who led the GSC in total offense and passing in 1976. Donny Sherman (6-1, 180) is fully capable and will see considerable action at quarterback.

The Pacer offense, tops in the GSC in 1976 in total offense, rushing offense and scoring, has an abundance of talented runners including Ronnie McClellan (5-7, 180), Henry Williams (5-9, 220), Tim Martin (6-0, 190), Mike Gipson (5-8, 165), Richard Giebeig (5-10, 185), and Wayne Dowell (6-2, 205).

Wide receivers Ronald George (6-1, 190) and Ralph Ervin (5-10, 175) are proven performers and should give the Pacers a potent aerial attack.

The offensive line is well-manned with all-GSC returnee Jon Gentry (6-1, 221), Lanny Williams (6-2, 222), Darell Whitmore (6-4, 201), and Glenn Mollman (6-0, 215) leading the way.

The defense, which ranks second in the GSC last season in total defense, rushing defense and scoring defense, will be headed by Danny Watkins (6-2, 235), the 1976 GSC Defensive Player of the Year. End Jack Chaney (6-2, 223), tackle Larry Newcomb (6-3, 235), and linebacker Jim Hardegree (6-2, 222) are other standouts in the "sack pack".

All-GSC performers David Williams (6-3, 195) and Clay Blalack (5-9, 180) return to the secondary along with the other two starters. Jimmy Randolph (6-0, 190) and Mark Carroll (5-10, 165).

Several candidates are vying to replace Mickey Hamilton, the leading kicker in the GSC last season, but none forged to the front during spring drills. Gary Davis (6-1, 180) is the heir apparent to the punting duties as he demonstrated excellent ability in the spring.

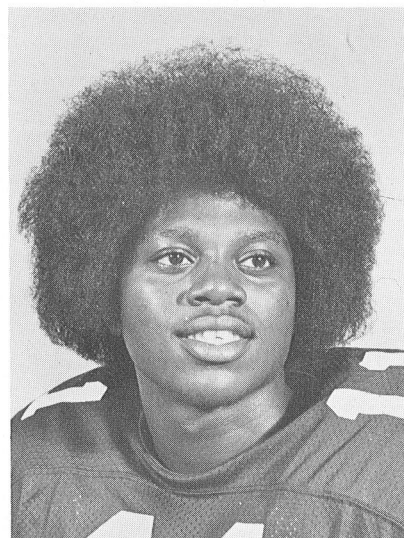

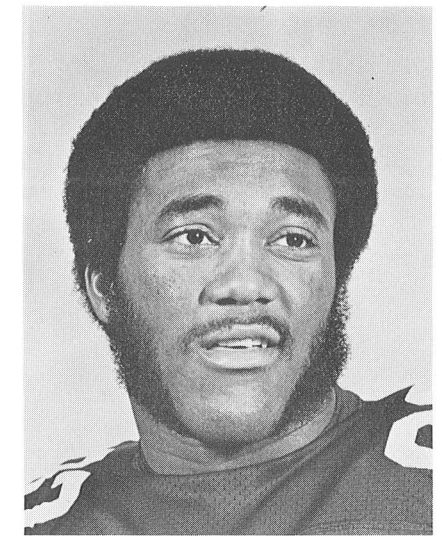
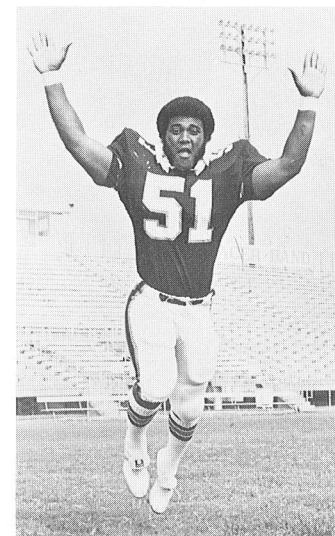
If 1977 is anything at all like '76, Alvin should be an outstanding professional prospect.

H. KIRK GRANTHAM MEMORIAL ATHLETIC ENDOWMENT FUND

The H. Kirk Grantham Memorial Athletic Endowment Fund was established January 12, 1974, culminating six years of work by Hall-Moody alumni, former Grantham athletes, and alumni of UT Junior College to perpetuate the memory of the institution's first coach and athletic director.

Remembered as a man who instilled in hundreds of athletes and others a sense of fair play, honesty, and perseverance toward attaining perfection, the permanent memorial fund will be used for athletic scholarships and other awards to athletes who have demonstrated the academic competence, athletic ability and ideas stressed by the former coach.

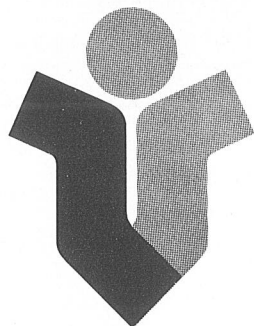
Income from the endowment will be used to further The University of Tennessee at Martin's rapidly growing athletic program and to memorialize the name and memory of H. Kirk Grantham.

Coach Grantham who served as UTM's first coach until 1932 and continued his service through 1937 as director of athletics literally laid the cornerstone for one of the South's fastest growing small college athletic programs.

The groundwork has been laid for a permanent endowment scholarship fund memorializing his dedication and service to the institution and a goal of \$40,000 set.
