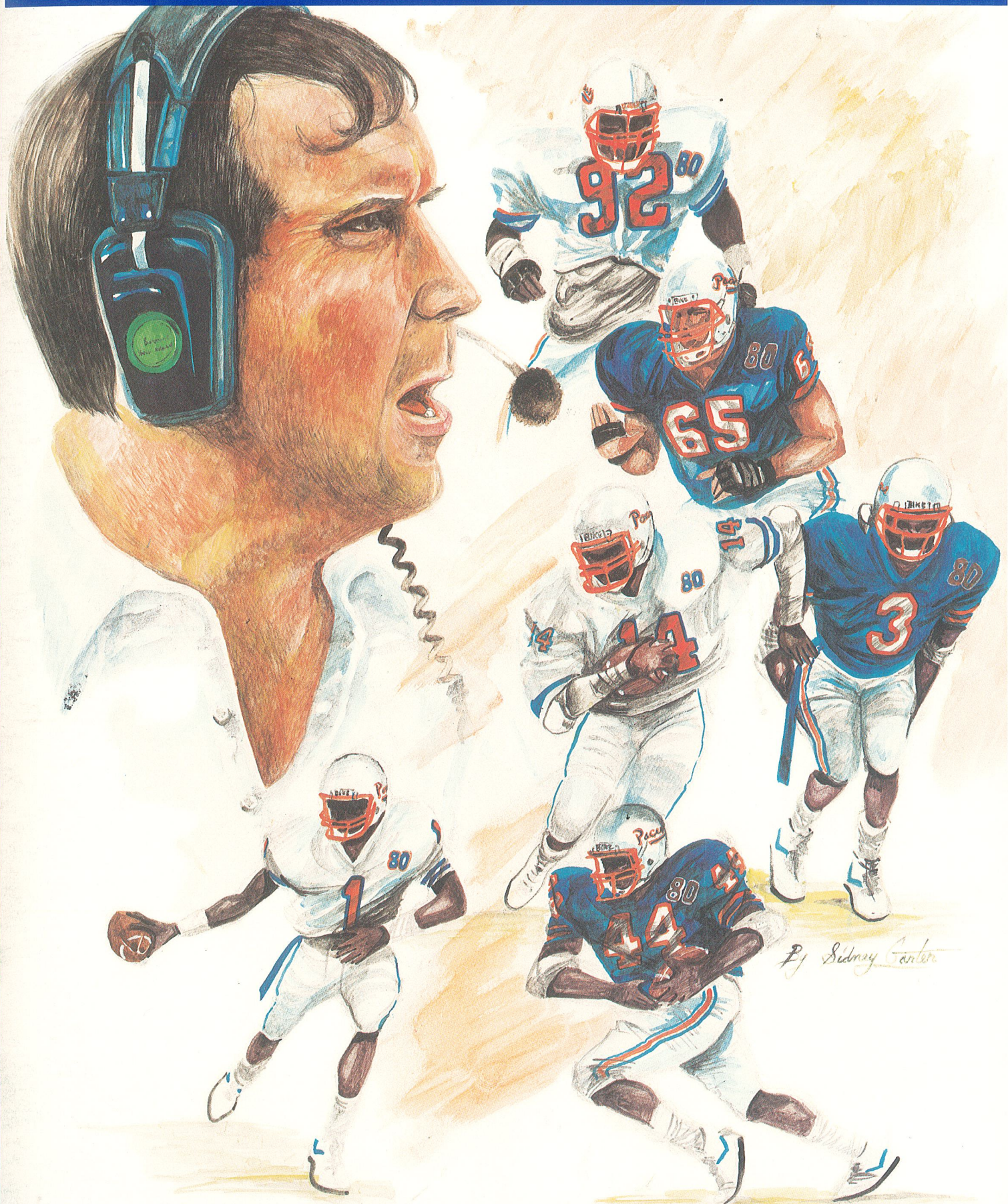

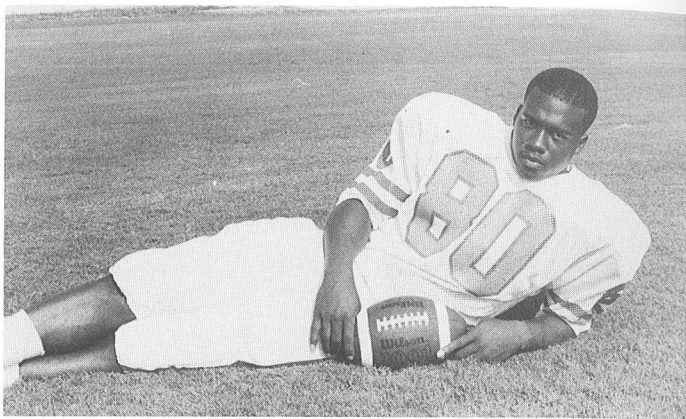
In Memory Of...

Demetres Brown

The day of December 16, 1987 was a sad one for The University of Tennessee at Martin football family. On that Wednesday afternoon, Demetres Brown died unexpectedly at his home in Covington.

A 19-year old sophomore, Demetres was a good football player and an outstanding person. He is missed by all associated with the Pacer football program.

The 1988 football season will be dedicated to the memory of Demetres. All Pacer players will have Demetres' jersey number of 80 on their helmets this season.



Media Information

The University of Tennessee at Martin sports information office provides the 1988 Pacer Football Brochure as a service to media covering the 1988 Pacer football team. Copies are also used for recruitment of student-athletes and provided to members of the Pacer Club.

Pressbox Credentials: All requests for credentials should be directed to the sports information office. All credentials will be screened to insure a working press box. Only media covering UT Martin and opponents will be allowed. Parking passes are also available.

Photograph Credentials: Same policy as pressbox.

Broadcast Booths: Radio booths are located on the north end extension for the Pacer Radio Network and on the south extension for the visiting network. A television booth is also on the north extension.

Telephones: Phones are available in the media area on the first level of the press box for the filing of stories and are available on a first-come, first-serve basis.

Film Deck: Home filming is on the second level of the north extension and opponents filming is on the south extension's second level. Entrance is through the outside steps. There is also space for television stations on the deck.

Statistics: Complete play-by-play, half, final team and individual statistics will be provided about 20 minutes after the game. Play-by-play sheets will be ready each quarter upon request. Other statistical information, such as records will be provided throughout the contest.

Interviews: All interview requests for Coach McLeary and players during the season must be made in advance through the sports information office. On game day, the Pacer locker room will be open 15 minutes after each game and Coach McLeary will be available 15 minutes after the game.

General Information: Post-game, pre-game releases, and statistics will be mailed weekly through the season.

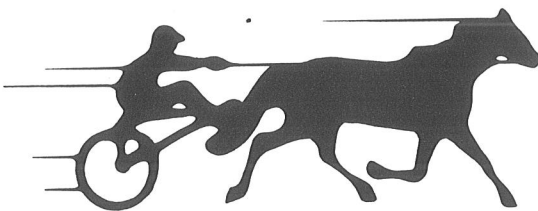

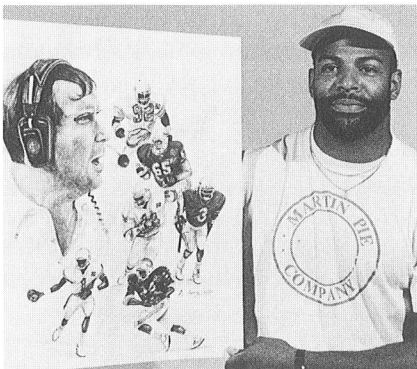

Pacer Traditions

Nickname, Mascot

The term "Pacers" was selected as the official school nickname in 1970 symbolizing The University of Tennessee at Martin as a pacesetter institution. The symbol of the pacer horse, a proud and spirited breed, represents the feeling of strength and pride instilled by the University in the students who enroll and graduate with a quality education.
Since the fall of 1981, a pacer horse, "Chuckie" with a driver and sulky, has been present at all home games.
Prior to the 1970 athletic seasons, UT Martin sports teams were the Volunteers.

School Colors, Uniforms

Royal Blue, orange, and white are the school colors for The University of Tennessee at Martin. Orange and white were the school colors until royal blue was added in 1970, the same year the UT Martin nickname became Pacers.
The Pacer football team will wear blue jerseys at home, trimmed with orange and white numerals. On away games, the Pacers wear white jerseys with orange numerals and trimmed with royal blue. The game pants are white with an orange stripe and two blue stripes. This will mark the third season the Pacers will wear white helmets with "Pacers" in blue script trimmed with orange. All helmets will have the number "80" in memory of teammate Demetres Brown who died last December.

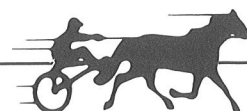
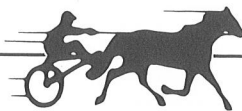
Defensive Line Strength of defensive unit. Could be the strongest in the GSC. Has experienced players and solid depth. All-America candidate Emanuel McNeil, leads the unit and is a dominant player in the GSC. End Jerome Rinehart is also very solid and ready for his senior season. Sam Dudley came back from a knee injury and progressed and will play an end this season. Fall camp will find a battle for the other tackle starting slot. Junior Tony Hamilton had a good spring practice and Todd White, a pleasant surprise in his redshirt freshman season, will look to rebound from a spring practice shoulder injury. Senior Richard Farris is a steady veteran at end.	Running Back John Burch gives the Pacers an all-around threat. Capable of going the distance on any given play. Must stay healthy. Scottie Mitchell is a promising redshirt freshman who worked as a receiver last fall. Austin Thompson is used primarily in short yardage situations. Dwayne Hamlett is a freshman recruit with potential.
Linebacker Defensive position with least experience. Has players with potential, but unproven. Will be an area of concentration in fall camp. Senior Tim Felter has most experience. James Monds and Michael Matthews will play the middle or "Mike" slot. Matthews a highly-touted lineman makes the switch, but has been plagued by injuries. Juniors Darrin Madison and Tim Bacon have athletic ability at "Willie". Late signee Ron Roberts will play the "Sam" and possibly the "Mike" slot.	Offensive Line Probably the biggest area of emphasis because of inexperience. The physical quality of players is there, but must adapt to the caliber of GSC play. Two senior starters, GSC all-second team guard Grady Andrews and 1986 second team pick Tony Burton anchor the line. Sophomore Tim Billings has come on at center and Travis Jones has come along at a tackle. Help also expected from redshirt junior college transfer Tim Nickens and three other JC newcomers.
Secondary Received a big blow with the loss of Levon Johnson in spring game. Also starter Guy Kelley lost due to academics. Junior Benny Thompson has two years starting experience behind him. Seniors Greg Watkins and all-academic GSC Willie Ng are seasoned. Sidney Carter saw action at cornerback and on the special teams. JC transfers David Belford, Roland Delaney, and Darrell Warren will need productive first-year seasons.	Quarterback Leon Reed will be the catalyst of the offense. Had record-breaking year despite starting only seven games. A threat both running and passing which gives extra dimension to team. Also a good field leader. Sophomore Mitch Lowery moved into backup role with good spring practice.
Special Teams Junior Joey Elmore makes the Pacer punting game solid. Question mark still remains on kicking game where job is open heading into fall practice. Big-play threat William Mackall will handle the bulk of the kick return duties and also will return punts for the first time. The kick return will be an area of early work as several players will get a look to help Mackall.	Receivers William Mackall, coming off a 90-reception season, will again be a main target. Capable of making good things happen anytime he touches ball. Corps is solid with sophomore Kowlaski Bynum, JC transfer Clovis Wright and converted defensive players Mark Guy and Ernest Jackson, who have made the transition. Junior Jeff Morrison and redshirt Anton Duke have made strides and will add to depth. JC speedster Andre Langley missed spring drills and will look for progress early in fall camp.

1988 Outlook

Third-year Pacer head coach Don McLeary is placing high expectations on his team after two years of solid rebuilding work.

The UT Martin football team came up one game short in posting the school's first winning season in 10 years. With the return of top veterans and the arrival of key junior college personnel, the progress of the program promises to continue in 1988.

Strong finishes in each of the past two seasons have been a highlight. The 1987 finish saw the Pacers post two comeback wins in the fourth quarter as the team won three of its final four games with the lost a tussle to eventual Gulf South Conference and national champion Troy State.

The experience gained by the returning players, plus the feeling of McLeary that his team now knows how to win are important going into the season.

"We enter the season a much more experienced team than we have been," the Pacer coach said. "We know what to expect of our competition and type of players that we need. Very importantly, however, is that we learned how to win the close games down the stretch of the season."

The Pacers and all of Division II football will be undergoing a change. The scholarship limit has been lowered from 45 to 40 total this fall.

"The scholarship limit makes it tough, especially in terms of developing depth," said McLeary. "I expect the league to be very balanced and the

championship will be decided down the stretch. I also expect a lot of close games in the league this season and knowing how to win will be important.

"I see us competing with any team on our schedule and realistically I could not say that the first two seasons. We must be fortunate to limit our injuries."

The Pacer offensive unit features outstanding players at the skill positions. Quarterback Leon Reed (5-11, 180) became the team's starter in the fifth game of the season and emerged as an impact player. Directing the run and shoot offense, Reed set several school single game and seasonal records and set a GSC record by completing 63 percent of his passes. He ended the season as the GSC leader in both passing (17.4 completions a game) and total offense (210.6 a game).

"Leon is such a threat throwing or running the football," said McLeary of the Senatobia, Miss. senior. "He is a very good field general and gives us an extra dimension and is the catalyst of our offense."

Reed will have an arsenal of other weapons. William Mackall (5-8, 180) shattered the GSC record with 90 receptions good for 710 yards. He is the top returning receiver in all of Division II. Lining up as a motion back, Mackall is a man the Pacers will continue to employ very much. He will show his versatility by returning both kickoffs and punts and will line up as a halfback in short yardage situations.

A solid corps of receivers compli-

ment Mackall. Junior college transfer Clovis Wright, sophomore Kowlaski Bynum, and converted senior defensive players Mark Guy and Ernest Jackson form a solid pack. Another newcomer Andre Langley has the credentials, but must bounce back after an off-season operation. Junior Jeff Morrison will add depth.

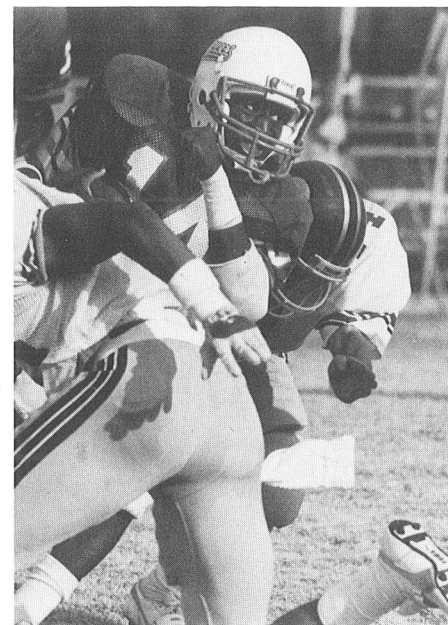
Another focal point of the Pacers' offense will be senior running back John Burch (6-1, 200). Burch rushed for 796 yards and caught 47 passes for 407 yards making him the top all-purpose back in the GSC and among the top five in each category. Burch is another player capable of going the distance on any given play. Redshirt freshman Scottie Mitchell and junior Austin Thompson will backup Burch.

One of the tasks this season is to improve the offensive line. The area is one of the biggest areas of concern going into the season because of the overall inexperience.

"We have quality players along the offensive front, but not having Gulf South experience is a concern," said McLeary. "The physical ability is not a concern."

Seniors Grady Andrews (6-1, 250) and Tony Burton (6-2, 295) each have made the GSC second team in their careers. Andrews is a consistent player and Burton is a dominating blocker.

Sophomore Tim Billings (6-1, 240) is a highly regarded prospect at center. Travis Jones (6-4, 265) made tremendous progression. Tim Nickens (6-2,

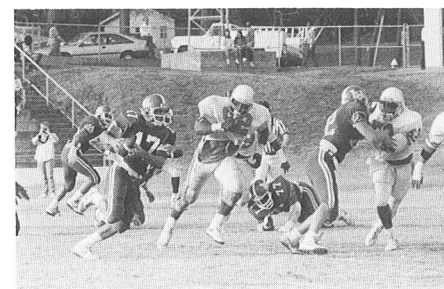
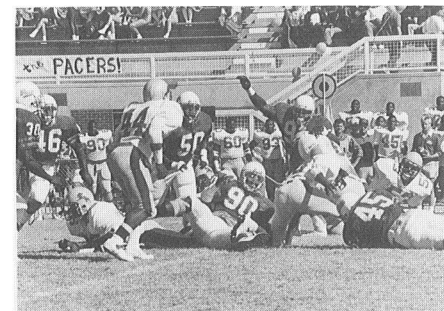


260) must come back from a knee injury and his healthy presence could be a big boost. Charles Laster (6-3, 250) was slowed by a neck injury in the spring, but should bounce back for a solid senior season. David Boland (5-11, 255) is a versatile player who can swing between guard and tackle. Four junior college transfers who will also be given a long look in pre-season drills.

The Pacers' defense jelled as the season began. The 1988 unit will be anchored by a solid defensive line. Tackle Emanuel McNeil (6-3, 275) made careers. Andrews is a consistent player and Burton is a dominating blocker. The move from end to tackle and the result was the emergence of a dominant defensive player in the GSC. McNeil led the 1987 squad in total tackles despite playing inside.

Opposing offenses will have more than McNeil to worry about up front. Defensive end Jerome Rinehart (6-4, 240) has very good speed and quickness and will be especially effective in the pass rush. (6-3, 255) plagued by a bothersome knee injury early in the season grew stronger and will be a complete player at an end. Two improving players junior Tony Hamilton (6-0, 260) and sophomore Todd White (6-3, 235) each gained experience last season and will battle at a tackle spot.

Senior Richard Farris (6-2, 220) is a valuable team member able to rotate between either end spot. Another end Louis Palmer (6-2, 235) will improve



with game play.

"Our defensive line can be the strongest in the GSC," said McLeary. "Big Mac" is outstanding and we have very good players in the area."

The main focus attention for the defensive unit during pre-season practices will be the linebacking corps. Only senior Tim Felter (6-2, 230) has any game experience to speak of in the group.

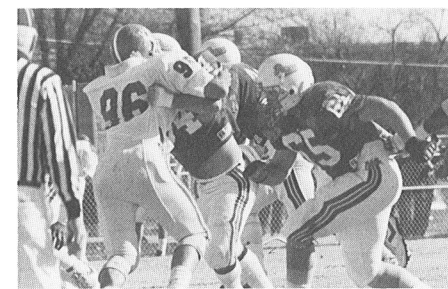
"We will concentrate on our linebackers," said McLeary. "We have players who we think that can come through, but it is an unproven group."

One of the main points of emphasis will be to find a new leader for the group. Last year's leader Paul Randolph is now giving pro football a shot.

Leadership may come from junior Michael Matthews (5-10, 230) at the middle position. Matthews, a promising defensive lineman, has been plagued by injuries the past two years. He is looking for a healthy season and will make the transition and has the leadership qualities the staff is looking for. Junior James Monds (6-0, 220) holds the starting job going into fall camp.

Felter will play the strongside or "Sam" position. Late junior college signee Ron Roberts (6-1, 235) will also be called upon to produce at "Sam" and possibly the "Mike" position.

The "Willie" position has Darrin Madison (6-5, 220) an all-around player who should progress nicely. Junior Tim Bacon (6-0, 205) enjoyed a good spring



and will contribute as well.

The secondary must regroup from a spring game knee injury that sidelined safety Levon Johnson for the season. The unit returns experienced players, plus junior college transfers set to fit into the picture right away.

Greg Watkins (6-4, 200) and 1987 GSC All-Academic Willie Ng (5-10, 190) have the senior experience at the free safety and strong safety positions.

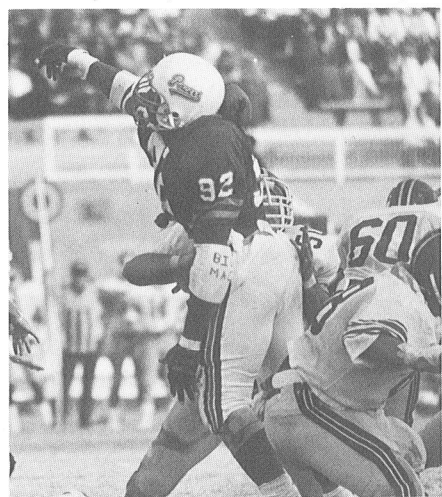
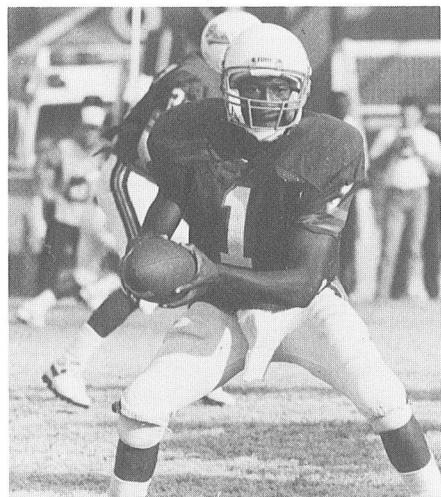
Junior college transfers Roland Delaney (5-9, 175) and David Belford (5-10, 175) will man the field corner positions. Darrell Warren (6-2, 190) is capable of playing several positions.

Junior Benny Thompson (6-1, 190) is a returning three-year starter at boundary corner. Senior Sidney Carter (6-1, 190) is the backup and one of the team's top special teams' players.

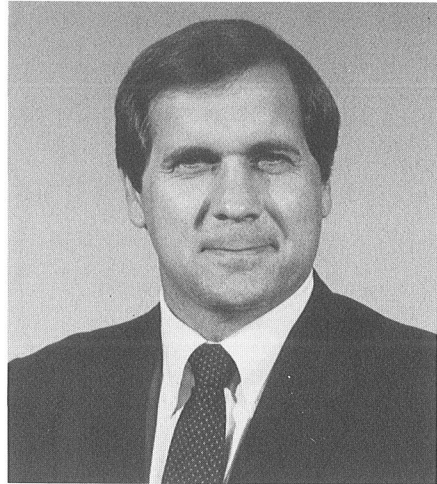
The punting game should be solid with junior Joey Elmore (6-2, 200). Elmore has yet to have a punt blocked and set a school record his freshman year for best average in a season.

The place kicking job remains a question. Junior Ki Tok Chu (5-9, 155) is being challenged by junior college transfer Todd Hinsberger (5-6, 155). The battle for kicker promises to be interesting in the pre-season.

Along with the eight-game GSC slate, the Pacers will play two Division I-AA opponents in Murray State and Samford and a solid NAIA team in Henderson State from the Arkansas Intercollegiate Athletic Conference.

Don McLeary, Head Football Coach

Don McLeary is leading the resurgence of The University of Tennessee at Martin's football program. The program has made tremendous strides of advancement under McLeary's guidance.

McLeary will look for continued progress in 1988, his third season as the Pacers' head coach. A commitment to hard work, a strong emphasis on recruiting, plus the intangibles that play an important role in building a successful program is what McLeary has brought to the UT Martin program.

The 40-year old McLeary made the vow immediately upon taking the head coaching duties on the date of his birthday, Jan. 2, 1986, that the Pacers would play an exciting brand of football. With his version of the run 'n shoot offense, 40 school records and 15 Gulf South Conference records have fallen. McLeary followed with a plan to build the offense first in 1986 and then with a revamped defense which emerged on the scene in 1987.

Now, just more than two years later, the Pacers appear to be on the verge of success, seeking a prosperous 1988 campaign.

Don returned "home" to his native West Tennessee to assume the head coaching duties. He was born in Humboldt and went on to star as an All-American high school player at Jackson North Side High. He would also have a very successful collegiate career at The University of Tennessee, Knoxville.

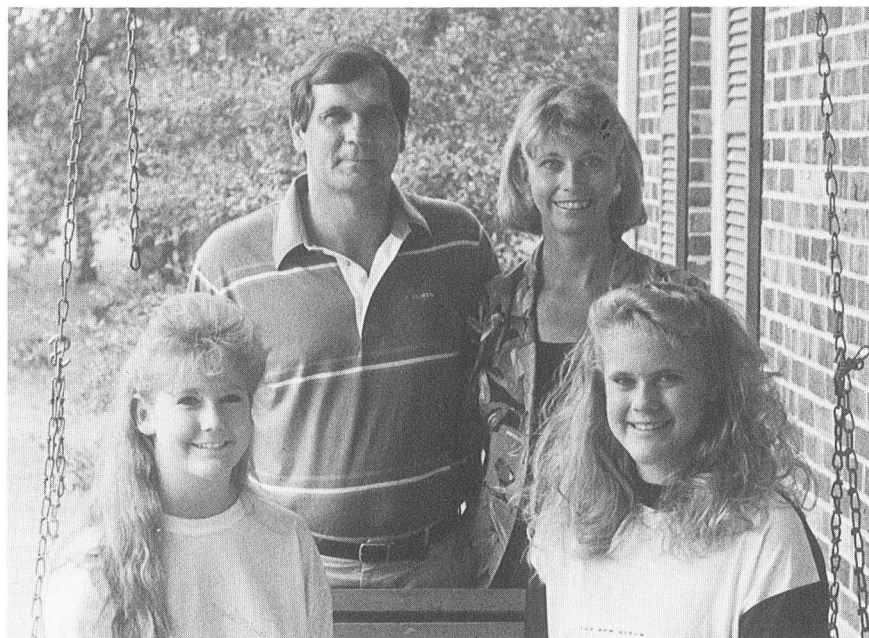
McLeary has devoted his career to the coaching profession. Since his graduation from college, McLeary has worked as a coach at all levels,—high school, collegiate, and professional. He embarked on his career immediately following his graduation from UTK in 1970.

He came to UT Martin from the staff of the Los Angeles Express of the United States Football League. He received high recommendations for the job, including football legends Sid Gillman and Express head coach John Hadl. He served as the Express receivers' coach and coordinator of special teams.

With the Express, McLeary had the opportunity to work with one of the great offensive coaches in football history in Gillman. McLeary has used part of Gillman's influence in establishing the Pacers' record-breaking run 'n shoot offense.

McLeary also served five years on the staff of the University of Kansas, working as the Jayhawks' receivers coach and special teams coordinator. At Kansas, he began his coaching association with former quarterbacking great John Hadl. McLeary was later asked by Hadl to join him in the pro ranks with the Express.

McLeary's previous head coaching experience came at Ottawa (Kansas) University. He brought new life into the Ottawa program, more than doubling the size of the team's number from the time he took the position. His first team posted the school's first winning mark in seven seasons. His second Ottawa team also had a winning mark and he left the school to move to Kansas.

He has served as an assistant coach at Morehead State University in Kentucky and UT Knoxville, where he worked with the Volunteers' freshman team. He also has coached at two West Tennessee high schools, White Station in Memphis and Tennessee Academy in Brownsville.

As a prep player for the North Side Indians, McLeary was one of the top prospects ever in Tennessee. He led the state in scoring and was named to a wire service's All-Tennessee team and had his high school career capped off being named to the 1965 Prep All-America team.

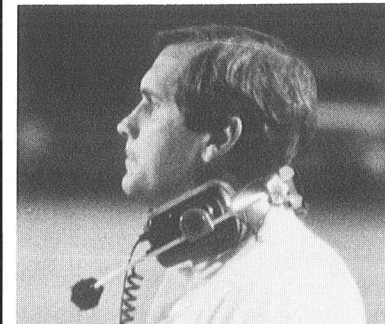
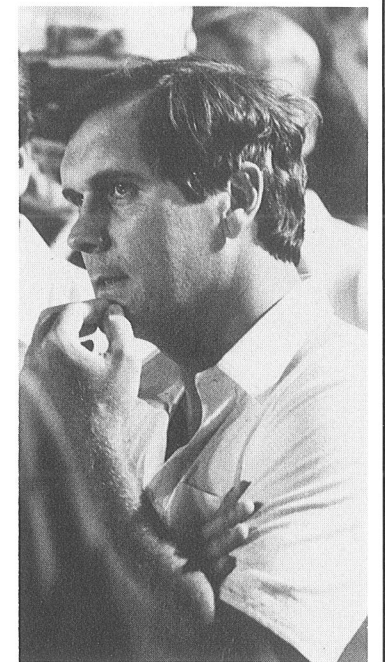
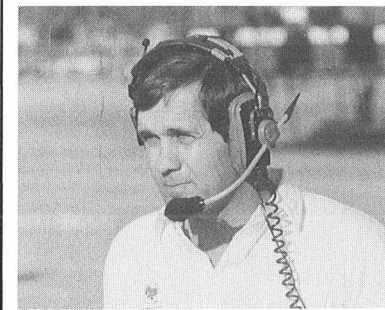
After graduating from high school, McLeary went on to an impressive and successful career for the Volunteer football team, playing for Coaches Doug Dickey and Bill Battle. With the Vols he was a member of two Southeastern Conference championship teams teams, in 1967 and 1969. The Vols posted the best record of any collegiate team during the four-year period.

He played tailback and was a part of the offensive backfield along with Curt Watson. He played in the 1969 Cotton Bowl, 1969 Gator Bowl, and the 1971 Sugar Bowl. In his final game as a collegian, McLeary tied the historic Sugar Bowl game's record by scoring two touchdowns in the Vols' 34-13 win over the Air Force Academy.

McLeary was recipient of a pair of prestigious awards while he was a student-athlete at UT Knoxville. In 1970, he received the Mickey O'Brien trophy, presented annually in honor to the senior player who best exemplifies courage and determination in overcoming physical obstacles during his career and makes a valuable contribution to the team. He also was presented the Herman Hickman Scholarship in 1971, presented to a former Vol athlete for post-graduate study.

McLeary has a bachelor's degree in health and a master's degree in educational administration, both earned at UTK.

Don is married to his high school sweetheart, the former Mary Carolyn Graves of Jackson who is a teacher at nearby Dresden Junior High School. They are the parents of three children: Matt 18, Stacy 16, and Holly 13.



Questioning Coach McLeary

Are you pleased with the progress the program has made the last two years and where are you in your rebuilding plans?

There are many facets of a football program to be considered. I think you must build a program on discipline, good work ethics, and character.

In this respect, I am pleased with the last two years' progress. We have become more competitive and will continue to improve if we build on these philosophies.

There are many positive signs of progress within the program. This is my main concern.

What kind of expectations do you have about the upcoming season?

I am very optimistic about our prospects for the upcoming season. I always look to a new season with high expectations and with new enthusiasm.

What will be effect of the NCAA decision to limit Division II schools to 40 scholarships as far as UT Martin is concerned?

The decision to limit Division II schools to only 40 scholarships makes it very hard to build a football program. Our competitors in this area

have a big advantage over UT Martin in that they can offer more aid to the high school talent throughout West Tennessee.

They also can redshirt more players and not have to depend on freshmen to play for them. It makes our recruiting extremely difficult when we have to compete against these odds.

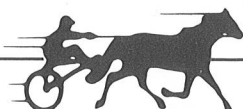
Your schedule again promises to be tough with two NCAA Division I-AA opponents and a strong NAIA foe, not to mention the eight-game Gulf South Conference slate. What has been your impression of the GSC in your first two seasons?

The Gulf South has got to be the toughest Division II football conference in America.

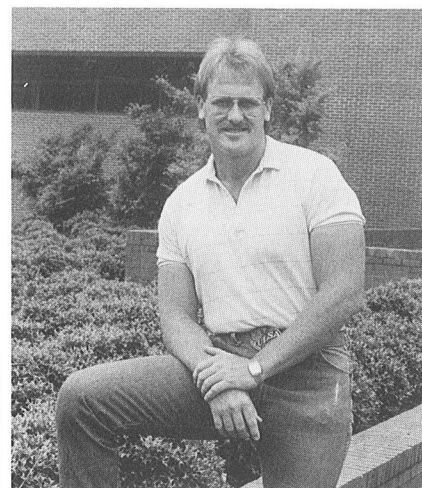
The coaches and players in the conference are of the highest quality and that makes for a very competitive league.

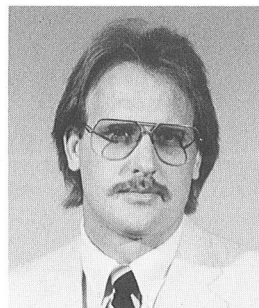

Denver Johnson enters his third season as offensive line coach and assistant head coach for Don McLeary. His offensive line has opened the way for the Pacers' record-breaking run 'n shoot offense.

A former collegiate star and professional player, the 29-year old Johnson was the first new staff member named by coach Don McLeary in December, 1985.

Johnson came to UT Martin, making a commitment to the Pacers' rebuilding program after having an opportunity to continue his pro playing career. He worked as a graduate assistant coach at Oklahoma State prior to coming to Martin. Johnson assisted coaching the offensive line and the team played in the annual Gator Bowl Classic.

Before going to Oklahoma State in the summer of 1985, Johnson played professional football. He played the 1985 spring season with the San Antonio Gunslingers of the United States Football League until the franchise experienced financial troubles midway through the season.

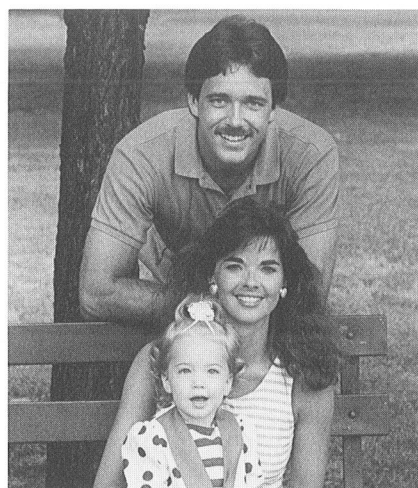
Johnson played the 1983 season with the Los Angeles Express of the USFL where he first met McLeary who was a member of the Express offensive staff. Johnson was traded to the Houston Gamblers during the 1984 season and started the final six games for the Gamblers and their record-breaking run 'n shoot offense.

His professional career began when he was selected by the Tampa Bay Buccaneers as the team's third pick of the 1981 National Football League draft. Selected in the eighth round, Johnson spent a season on the injured reserve list before signing with the USFL.

Johnson earned four letters while playing collegiately for Tulsa, playing three different positions in his career, tight end, guard, and tackle. He was named all-Missouri Valley Conference his junior and senior years at guard and tackle. As a senior, Johnson was an Associated Press second team All-America and United Press International third team All-America as a tackle. He captained Tulsa's first of six straight MVC championship teams in 1980.

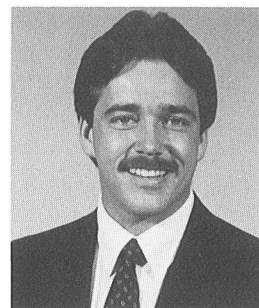
Johnson was also a third team academic All-America selection. He received the university's president award, given annually to Tulsa's top student-athlete and citizen and was one of three winners of the Rex Martin Memorial Trophy, presented to the top athlete from Tulsa, Oklahoma, and Oklahoma State.

Denver, who graduated with honors with a degree in business management, worked in the Oklahoma oil fields while he was a player. He enjoys boating and motorcycles in his spare time. He is single.

Todd Berry begins his third season as offensive coordinator and coach of the quarterbacks and receives.

The Pacers have broken or tied 41 school and 15 Gulf South Conference marks in the first two years of the run 'n shoot offense. Berry, 28, has an outstanding football background.

He was groomed into the sport at an early age. His father, Reuben, enjoyed a long and successful tenure as a coach, including building Northeastern Oklahoma A & M into a perennial national junior power and a stint at the helm of the Saskatchewan Roughriders of the Canadian Football League.

Berry was born in Springfield, Mo., and graduated from high school in Miami (Okla.). At Miami High, Berry was an all-state quarterback. He was the leader in total offense in the state his senior season until he broke an ankle midway through the schedule.

He signed a grant-in-aid to play collegiately at Tulsa. Berry served in a backup role his freshman and sophomore seasons, but suffered a career-ending knee injury. He was still a part of the program as a student assistant coach with Golden Hurricane his final two years.

Along with being on the football team, he was also a member of the university's varsity track team, competing in the 100, 200, and 440-yard dashes.

A Dean's List graduate, Berry completed his degree requirements in 1983, earning a bachelor of science degree in marketing.

Following his college graduation, Berry joined Johnny Major's staff at UT Knoxville as a graduate assistant coach. He coached the Volunteers' tight ends and team had a 9-3 record, winning an appearance in the Tangerine Bowl.

In the summer of 1984 Berry coached with his father at Saskatchewan for three months where he was in charge of the defensive backs. He returned to Tulsa in the late summer as a full-time assistant on current Arizona State coach John Cooper's staff. Berry coached the receivers and coordinated the school's recruiting efforts in Arkansas.

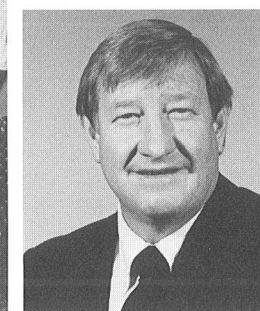
After Cooper departed for Arizona State, Berry moved to Oklahoma State as a graduate assistant for the 1985 season. He coached the running backs and quarterbacks for the Cowboy team which made its second consecutive Gator Bowl appearance.

Former UT Martin star running back Larry Shanks is the senior member on the Pacer coaching staff, in his seventh season at his alma mater.

Shanks contributions to the football program were honored in February 1986 when he became a fifth-year inductee into the UT Martin Athletic Hall of Fame.

Shanks, 43, answered a call and returned to UT Martin, entering the collegiate coaching ranks in 1982 as defensive coordinator for Coach Fred Pickard. He coached the defensive line for four years, coached the linebackers one year, and returned to the line in 1987.

A highlight in Shank's career came with his induction into the Hall of Fame. One of the top players in UT Martin football history, Shanks was captain of the school's most successful team ever. In 1967, UT Martin claimed the NCAA College Division Championship, defeating West Chester State 25-6 in the Tangerine Bowl in Orlando, Fla., in the school's only post-season appearance.

Playing tailback, Shanks gained 2,005 yards on 474 attempts in his career, leading UTM in rushing his junior and senior seasons. His name remains in the record book in several categories and his 126 points scored is fifth in school history. He also was a starter on defense, earning a regular's role in the secondary as a freshman for Coach Robert Carroll.

Shanks came back to the Pacers following a successful tenure as a high school head coach, establishing winning programs at all of his stops.

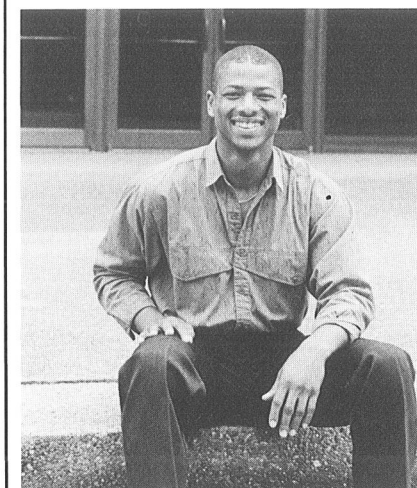
He began his head coaching career following graduation from college at nearby Fulton (Ky.) City High School for two years. He later moved to Houston County High School in Erin. He led Houston County's football program to prominence and his 1974 squad was 7-4 and eliminated in the state playoffs by eventual champion Brentwood Academy.

He returned to the area the following year to begin a seven-year tenure at Union City High School. He posted a 42-27-0 record with the Golden Tornados, becoming the winningest coach in the school's history.

His 1976 Union City team advanced to the state playoffs, finishing with a 9-2 mark. He earned a position in the Union City Hall of Honor for his work with the program. Shanks overall record was 75-47-0 in the high school ranks.

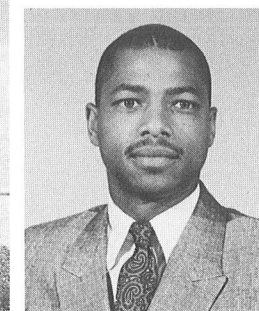
Shanks also owns a master's degree from UT Martin. The McEwen native took a year off from high school coaching in 1972 to serve as a graduate assistant to Carroll.

Reese was elevated to his new position in June. He served as a student assistant for one year and as a graduate assistant the past two seasons.

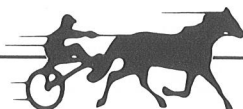

He led the GSC in interceptions as a sophomore in 1982 and earned second-team all-league honors as a sophomore and senior. Reese was GSC Defensive Player of the Week three times during his career. He was named team MVP following his senior season.

The team played for the state championship in three of the seasons and he led the Falcons to the Tennessee Class A state title in 1980, defeating Meigs County 21-7 in the final game. He has his bachelor's degree in health and physical education and earned his master's degree in education administration and supervision, completing the requirements in the spring.

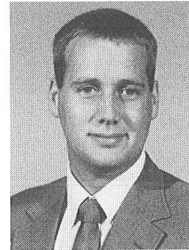
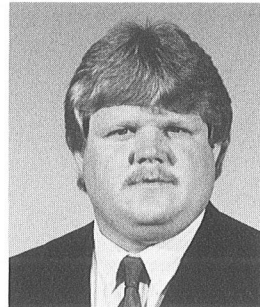

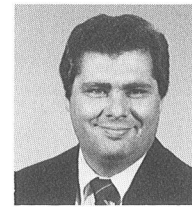
He completed his bachelor's degree in secondary education-social studies last December and will work toward his master's in education administration and supervision.

Donnie is married to the former Valerie Homra. They reside in nearby Fulton, Ky.

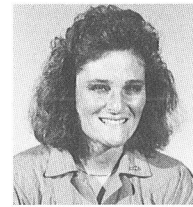

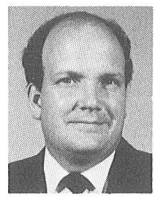

Sports information publications have received two firsts, two seconds, and one fifth place award in national contests sponsored by the College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA) the past three years.



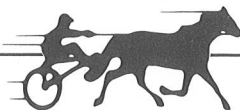

The University of Tennessee at Martin is committed to excellence in undergraduate education and the development of the individual. The University prides itself on the outstanding quality of its academic programs and the warm, friendly relationships that exist between faculty and students.

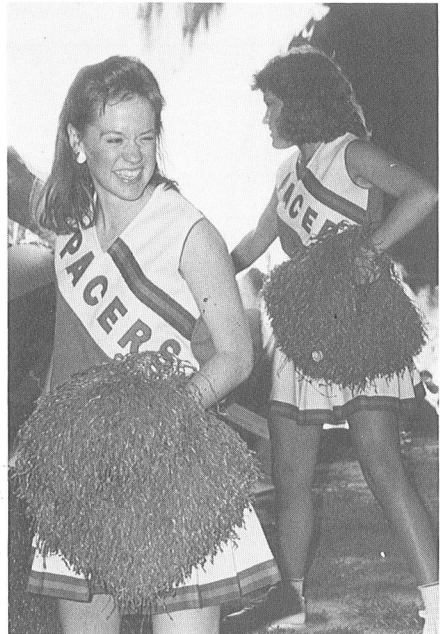
The University's programs for students with skills' proficiencies—the qualified admissions program and the Student Learning Center—have become national models. A new program for the University's academically talented students, the University's Scholars Program, offers interdisciplinary inquiry and individual research projects for participants, all who have ACT test scores from 28 to 36.

The UT Martin campus is called the

prettiest in the state, one that is listed on a botanical firm's national register as a botanical garden. It is small enough for a student to walk to any building on campus in five to ten minutes, yet it is situated in a town of about 9,000 population.

UT Martin is considered a residential campus because more than 65 percent of the students live on campus. There are always plenty of campus activities for students. Administration



Chancellor Dr. Margaret N. Perry

Dr. Margaret N. Perry became the first woman chief administrator of a four-year public college in Tennessee when she assumed the role of chancellor at UT Martin last July 1. UT President Edward J. Boling calls Dr. Perry's credentials "an impressive mix of academic and administrative skills." Dr. Perry joined the UT System from Tennessee Technological University where she served as associate vice president of Academic Affairs.

She boasts an extensive background with the UT system as a student, faculty member and administrator, and seven years as an administrator at Tennessee Tech in the State Board of Regents.

Dr. Perry, a native of Waynesboro, received her undergraduate degree from The University of Tennessee at Martin Branch in dietetics in 1961. She obtained her master's and doctorate degrees from The University of Tennessee, Knoxville, in 1963 and 1965, and went on to serve as Associate Dean of the College of Home Economics.

From 1973 to 1979, she served as Dean for Graduate Studies at UTK. During these years Dr. Perry developed a peer review program for doctoral programs and was administrator for approximately 7,000 graduate students.

While at UTK, Dr. Perry also served on numerous boards and committees including the Board of Directors for the University of Tennessee Faculty Club, Board of Directors for the Knoxville Early Childhood Development Center, and the University of Tennessee Alumni Board of Governors. She led program sessions for the National Meeting of Council of Graduate Schools in Phoenix, New Orleans, and Orlando and chaired a seminar on Careers in Science for Women.

From 1979 to her appointment at UT Martin, Dr. Perry served as Associate Vice President for Academic Affairs at Tennessee Tech. She initiated a contract for a faculty/student exchange program between Northeast University of Technology in Shenyang, China and Tennessee Tech. She implemented a plan for student outcomes assessment and performance funding which resulted in almost \$1 million per year in formula funding and won her an AASCU Mitau Special Commendation for Innovation and Change in Higher Education.

Dr. Perry and her husband Dr. Randy Perry, who joined UT Martin as Dean of Engineering Technology and Engineering from the engineering faculty at Tennessee Tech, are the parents of two sons, Paul 18 and Sam 17.



Athletic Director Ray Mears

Ray Mears' outstanding contributions to collegiate athletics continues to be honored.

Mears, men's athletic director at The University of Tennessee at Martin since March 1980, is recognized for an illustrious coaching career in college basketball. He was inducted into both the Wittenberg Athletic Hall of Honor and the Knoxville Sports Hall of Fame this past summer. He was inducted into the State of Tennessee Sports Hall of Fame in February, 1985.

The UT Martin athletics department has seen growth since his arrival on campus. He was director of athletic promotions at UT Knoxville before joining UT Martin in his present position.

Under Mears' guidance, the UT Martin athletic department has enjoyed success at an all-time high. In his first year, 1980, season ticket sales for football increased 200 percent over the previous year's figures. Season ticket sales increased another 10 percent in 1981, bringing the total number of season ticket sales to around 1200.

Similar success has surrounded the basketball program. The year before his arrival, revenue from basketball ticket sales amounted to little more than \$5,000. During the 1982-83 season, the basketball team produced \$73,650 in revenue.

In fund raising, UT Martin has also seen vast improvement in Mears' reign. Financial improvements to the athletics program has seen gain each year since Mears' arrival.

Mears has also been instrumental in assembling a quality staff. His support is reflected in the success of UT Martin's teams.

As a member of the Gulf South Conference, UT Martin finished in a second-place tie for the 1985 GSC All-Sports Trophy, the University's highest finish in the race for that award. A member of the GSC since 1971, UTM won its first league championship in 1982 as the men's tennis team rolled to the title. Since then, UTM teams have won league titles in basketball 1982, in rifle 1983, 1984, 1985, and 1986, and three more times in tennis, 1983, 1984, and 1985.

In addition to its success in the GSC, UT Martin has gained recognition at the national level. The men's tennis team was ranked seventh nationally along with the rifle team in 1985. The Pacer baseball team finished the 1985 campaign ranked thirteenth nationally and the basketball team emerged last season with a national ranking of 17th. Individuals participate annually in NCAA Division II National Championship events.

Mears has also seen to the recognition of former UT Martin athletes as he chaired the committee which created the UT Martin Athletics Hall of Fame. The Hall of Fame has received tremendous response in its first five years of inducting members.

Mears' days of promotion and public relations extended back to his coaching career. He took over as head basketball coach of the University of Tennessee Knoxville in 1962 after leading Wittenberg to the 1961-62 college division national title.

At UT Knoxville, Mears led the Vols into basketball prominence. He coached UT teams to 278 wins against only 112 losses in 15 seasons. Combined with a 121-23 record at Wittenberg, Mears' career record included an amazing 399 wins against 135 losses for a career winning percentage of .747. He held the top spot in the nation for two years as the winningest active basketball coach. At the time of his retirement in 1978, he trailed only North Carolina's Dean Smith as having the best winning percentage among active coaches.

UTK established a pattern of first division finishes in the Southeastern Conference. The Vols won or shared the SEC title in 1967, 1972, and 1977. The Vols finished in second place seven other times. The 1967 SEC title was the school's first in 24 years. Mears was SEC Coach of the Year in 1967 and 1977, he was third in national coach of the year balloting.

"Ray Mears Boulevard" was named in the coach's honor in Knoxville recently.

Mears played college basketball at Miami (Ohio) University, graduating from there in 1949 with a bachelor degree in education. He later earned a master's degree at Kent State while coaching at a high school in the Cleveland area. He is a member of the Miami University Athletics Hall of Fame and is one of the reasons Miami is recognized nationally as the "Cradle of Coaches."

Mears was born on November 8, 1926, at Dover, Ohio, and is married to the former Dana Davis. They have three sons: Steve, 31, Mike, 30, and Matt 21.

Pacer Stadium, Facilities

The Stadium

The Pacers play their home games in Pacer Stadium, which has undergone a major renovation job the past two years. The stadium and football complex are located on the northeast portion of campus.

Designed to be "A Showplace in Dixie" landscaping work has continued since last season on the area around the football stadium. The project is designed to give the University one of the nicest Division II complexes in the nation.

The stadium will accommodate about 8,000 fans with nearly 1,900 of the seats chairback. About 1,200 of the seats are located on the new west side. The west side seats are on the slanted roof of the ROTC building which was completed prior to the 1987 season.

There are 650 chairback seats on the east side. There may be more chairback seats added to the east side in the coming years.

There are berms located on the south end of the end zone to give the stadium a bowl look. Also trees, hedges, and walkways on the in and outside of the stadium add greatly to the appearance.

The stadium press box also received a major facelift. The first floor accommodates the working media. The press box extensions on the south side houses the visiting radio and coaches while on the north end the Pacer Radio Network and broadcast crew for WLJT-TV have booths.

The second level houses the public address announcer and scoreboard operator. Chancellor Margaret Perry also has a box complete with theater-type seats where she can entertain 25 guests. The Pacer coaches also have their booth on the second level. Filming decks are on the outside of the second level.

Underneath Pacer Stadium is the Pacer Club room. Pacer Club members gather at halftime in the area.

The Pacer Stadium playing surface consists of a hybrid bermuda grass found on golf greens. Field drainage and sideline improvements were also part of the renovation. There is a drainage system below the surface. The players' boxes are astro-turf on each sideline.

Stadium Renovation Project

The renovation of Pacer Stadium was made possible through a combination of state funding and a stadium drive for private gifts. The state of Tennessee in 1985 provided funding to construct an ROTC facility on the east side of the stadium.

With the assistance of alumni, faculty, staff, and friends, \$350,000 was contributed to install the chairback seats, complete restroom and concession facilities on the east side, improve the west side seating, and enlarge the press box.

Football Complex

The UT Martin football operation is housed in a building complex which totals more than 25,000 square feet. A significant portion of the building is a large work-out area of about 5,000 square feet. The surface is a Parkway wood floor.

An addition last year to the building was a large meeting area built on what was the stage located above the workout area. Assistant coaches offices are located on each side of the meeting room. Coach Don McLeary's office, secretary and a coaches' meeting room is on the workout level and located up the stairs to the right upon entering the main outside entrance to the building.

There is a newly remodeled weight room in the west end of the building's lower level. The 3,300-square foot room has an extensive variety of weight machines and equipment and will continue to grow. The air-conditioned locker room has space for about 100 athletes. Training room and equipment room areas are on the lower level.



Practice Field

The practice field area is 15,804 square yards and adjoins the northwest side of Pacer Stadium. There is one north-south regulation practice field with the remainder of the area divided into practice drill areas. The practice field has a variety of grass types to provide a good surface throughout the year. There is a 40-foot tower located on the south end for observation and videotaping of practice.

Pacers on the Air

The Pacer Radio Network

Pacer football can be heard on The University of Tennessee at Martin's Pacer Radio Network, which blankets Northwest Tennessee and carries into neighboring states.

Bill Haney, the color commentator for Pacer football, is coordinating this year's network. Haney was quickly re-establishing the network as one of the largest in Division II football during the summer months. A total of 10 stations had agreed to join the network by mid-June.

Haney and play-by-play announcer Tom Britt have about 50 years of combined experience in the broadcast field. The popular duo return for another year of Pacer football.

Britt enters his eighth year as play-by-play man for football broadcasts. He calls the color commentary during basketball season. Britt serves as sports and news director for WMXX-FM and WDXI-AM radio in Jackson.

Haney is a 33-year veteran of West Tennessee radio. He is in his ninth year with the network and calls the play-by-play for Pacer basketball games. He was one of the forerunners of establishing high school, college, and professional sports broadcast in the area. He is county executive in Gibson County.

The season's format for Pacer football games will include the Coach Don McLeary Show before each game, a scouting report on the Pacers' game and reports on other games from around the Gulf South Conference. The coverage will also include special halftime features and halftime and post-game comments from Coach McLeary.

The University of Tennessee at Martin works in association with Public Broadcasting Television station, WLJT-TV, Channel 11, to carry all 11 Pacer football games.

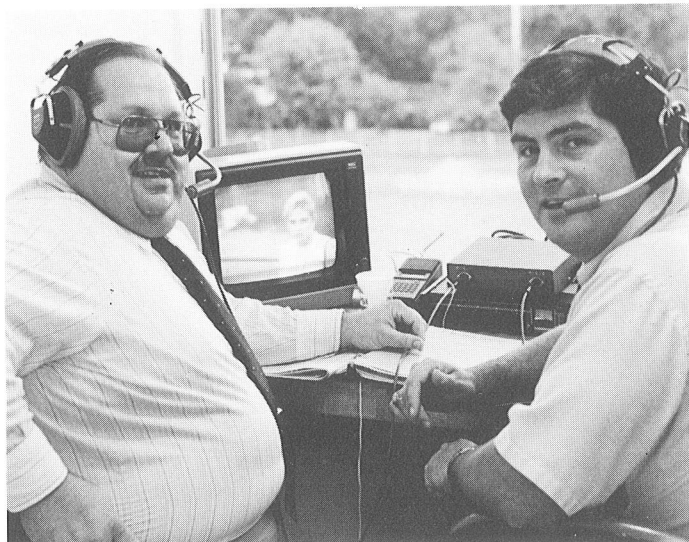
The Pacers are believed to be the only Division II school in the nation to have all 11 games broadcast. The tentative time is 9 p.m. each Sunday night.

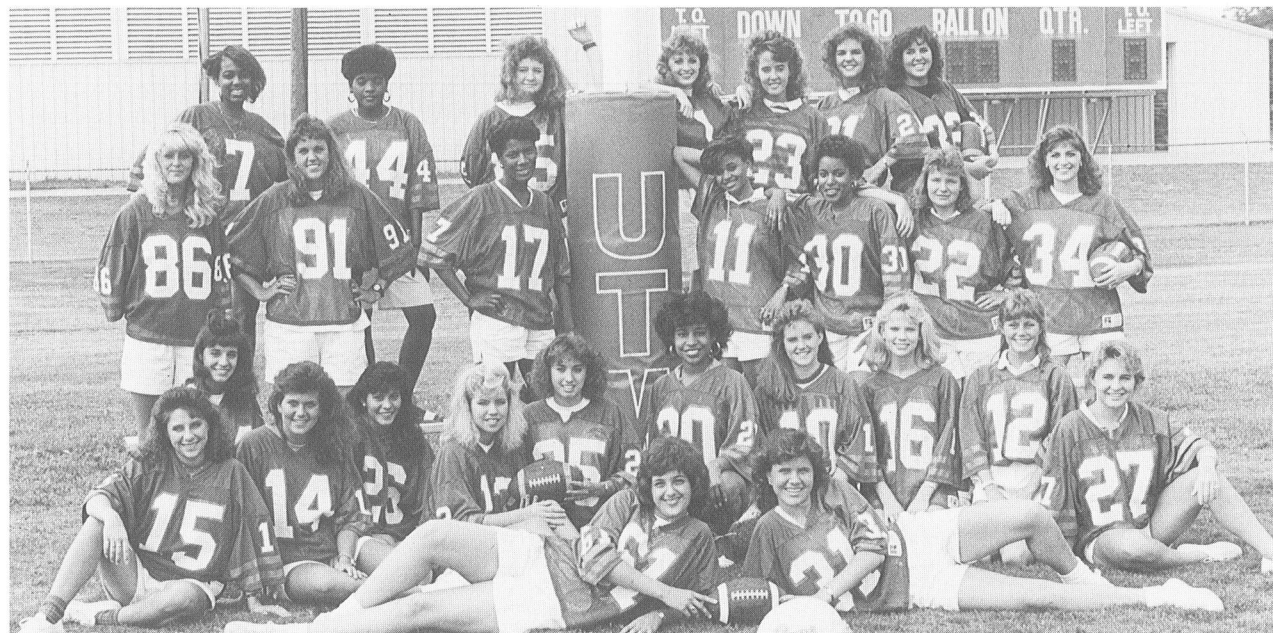
WLJT-TV has its offices and studios located on the UT Martin campus with its transmitter located near Lexington. The PBS station offers quality education and entertainment programs.

1987 Review

UT Martin's 1987 football season began in September with a feeling that the program would continue its strides forward. By the time late November had rolled around, the hope had come true, leaving optimism for more progression in 1988.

Coach Don McLeary's second year of his rebuilding plan saw the Pacers post a strong finish, winning three of their final four games. While the overall improvement was in great evidence, reflections on the season showed that the final win-loss count could have been different. There were tough mid-season losses that prevented the school from posting the winning mark.

However, with the strong finish and McLeary saying his team "was beginning to learn how to win" the season ended on a positive note.

Talented players already on hand were complimented by the arrival of experienced junior college players who made an impact on both sides of the football. For the first time in recent UT Martin football history there was a large number of juniors and seniors on the team roster.

The run 'n shoot offense continued its assault on the record book in 1987. Junior college transfer quarterback Leon Reed became the team's starter in the fourth game and set a school game record for total offense and passing in his very first start. He would establish new season marks in each of those categories as well.

Record-breaking receiver William Mackall and versatile running back John Burch were standouts at the skill positions. Second-teamer All-GSC Grady Andrews led a veteran offensive line.

A beefed-up Pacer defense jelled during the course of the season. Several players gained invaluable experience.

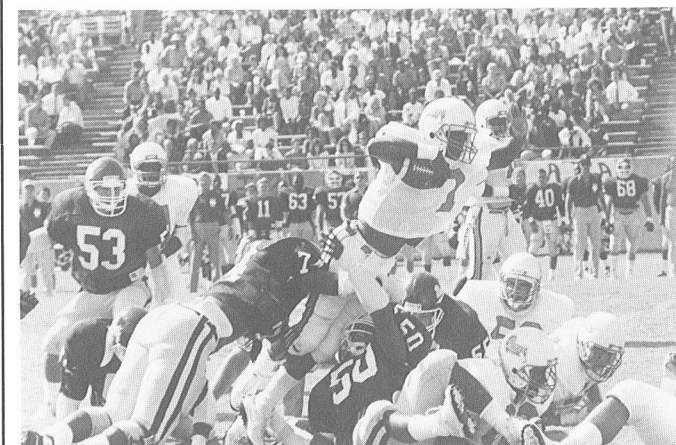
Defensive tackle Emanuel McNeil emerged as a dominant defender in the league. Linebacker Paul Randolph concluded his Pacer career. Defensive end Laurie Sinclair came on to have a strong season and other newcomers Jerome Rinehart and Sam Dudley were names that became familiar over the course of the season. The secondary was also filled with new faces, led by second-team All-GSC Levon Johnson.

Injuries also took their toll. Pre-season All-America Orlando Miles had a dislocated elbow the week prior to the first game and missed the first three games.

The season got underway with the eagerly awaited renewal of a rivalry with nearby and Division I-AA member Murray State of the Ohio Valley Conference. The Pacers led 6-3 after the first quarter, but the Racers depth proved to be too much as the hosts exploded for 21-second quarter points on their way to a 34-6 win.

The Pacers would play their first game in renovated Pacer Stadium the following week and the chore ahead promised to be tough. Austin Peay would be the opposition after knocking off Big 8 Kansas State the preceeding week.

Austin Peay led 10-7 after the period but the Pacers gained momentum in the second quarter. UT Martin dominated play on both sides of the ball in the second half, forcing APSU turnovers. The offense sealed the game away as John Burch electrified the gathering with a Gulf South conference record 98-yard TD run. When the final gun sounded, the Pacers had a 30-10 win.



An opening kickoff return of 96 yards for a touchdown led the Pacers fast start at rival Southeast Missouri State in a 25-13 victory. The play of the special teams and a big play defense were the keys as the Pacers won two games in a row for the first time since 1983. •

The longest trip of the season to the conference opener and first day game followed the next week as the Pacers journeyed to Valdosta State. The Pacers led 10-7 at halftime on the strength of a 59-yard run by quarterback Leon Reed. The Blazers kept the Pacers in check the second half and used ball control offense to claim a 24-10 win.

The Pacers were their own worst enemy in Pacer Stadium against Mississippi College. Fumbled punts and an interception for a TD along with a late 60-yard run by MC freshman standout Fred McAfee enabled the visitors to escape with a 34-24 win. Reed made his first start at quarterback, setting single game passing and total offense marks. The Pacers had 432 yards to MC's total output of 290.

A game-saving tackle on John Burch by Delta State with less than two minutes remaining preserved the Statesmen's 17-14 win and put the clamps on a frustrating afternoon for the Pacers. The Pacers were again hurt by the turnover. UT Martin again dominated the statistics for the second week in a row.

Nationally-ranked and unbeaten North Alabama, who would later falter down, handed the Pacers a frustrating 3-0 loss in a defensive struggle. Both defensive units had standout days, but a late drive to set up a 40-yard field goal on the last play of the first half gave the Lions the win.

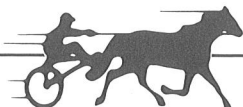
It was a determined UT Martin team that finally overcame all the misfortune the next week at Jacksonville State. Beginning what would be a strong finish down the stretch, the Pacers recorded their third win in series history 28-17, scoring the winner late in the fourth quarter. Senior reserve running back Cedric Hosea had the big day for the Pacers, scoring three TD's including the game winner.

Homecoming 1987 was played on a perfect day for football. Eventual Division II national champion Troy State displayed its power, but the Pacers hung tough as the Trojans left town with a 31-21 win.

The Pacers fought the uphill battle at Livingston from the beginning, but prevailed, scoring the game winner on a Reed to Henry Allen eight-yard pass with 19 seconds left in the half to the host Tigers before coming back with the late rally.

West Georgia and the Pacers had entered this year's meeting with four closely contested games since the Braves entered the GSC. UTM had been on the short end all four times, but the Pacers won 17-12. The Pacers had their best offensive outing of the season, but never put the game out of reach. John Burch had 197 yards rushing and 136 yards in receptions on the afternoon.

Mackall, McNeil, and Randolph were named first team all-conference players while Andrews, Johnson, and Reed were on the second team. Andrews and defensive back Willie Ng were academic All-GSC players.

The University of Tennessee at Martin is a charter member of the conference which now has nine member institutions and was born in

the summer of 1970 in Birmingham, Ala. Representatives from six institutions—Delta State University, Florence State University (now North Alabama), Jacksonville State University, Livingston State University (now Livingston University), Troy State University, and The University of Tennessee at Martin convened to form the Mid-South Conference, and scheduling problems allowed only a league football schedule to be played the first season.

In 1971, the league became the Gulf South Conference and admitted two schools, Southeastern Louisiana and Nicholls State (La.). Current member Mississippi College joined the league in 1972 along with Northwestern Louisiana. Northwestern left two years later followed by the remaining Louisiana schools in 1979.

The league continued with seven members until 1981 when the league's presidents voted to admit Valdosta State (Ga.) College. West Georgia became the newest member in June, 1983.

The GSC sponsors championships in football, baseball, tennis, basketball, golf, cross country, and rifle for men and basketball, volleyball, tennis, softball, and cross country for women.



The commissioner of the Gulf South Conference is G.E. "Sonny" Moran, named in the Fall of 1987, succeeding Ralph McFillen. Dr. Hugh Bailey, Valdosta State president, is the GSC president for 1986-88. Bryan Arnold is the league's sports information director.

UT Martin All-Americans

Hugh Lashlee, NJC All-American, 1957 — an offensive and defensive end originally from Camden, Tenn. He was co-captain of the 1957 team which lost only one game. Majored in Business Administration and now resides in Ft. Worth, Texas. His daughter, Shari, was a 1983 UT Martin graduate and a Pacer cheerleader.

Buddy Long, NAIA All-American, 1958 — an offensive and defensive end originally from Brunswick, Ga. He was co-captain of the 1958 team which went 7-0-1. He majored in education at UT Martin.

Bobby Fowler, NAIA All-American, 1959 — a fullback originally from Ridgely, Tenn. He was captain of the 1958 and 1959 teams. All-time leading ground gainer with UT Martin having accumulated 4,003 career yards rushing. Gained 1,045 yards in 1959 for an average of 130.6 yards a game. First and only UT Martin athlete to have his jersey number (33) retired. Was drafted by the Chicago Bears. Holds numerous Pacer football records and was a charter member of the UT Martin Athletics Hall of Fame.

Ralph Rutland, Williamson All-American, 1960 and 1961 — a tackle originally from Cherokee, Ala. Was the captain of the 1960 and 1961 Pacer teams. Majored in liberal arts at UT Martin.

Darrell Smith, Williamson All-American, 1962 — a fullback originally from Atoka, Tenn. Co-captain of the 1961 and captain of the 1962 Pacer teams. Majored in liberal arts and has served as a pilot with Northwest Orient Airlines.

Jim Love, Williamson All-American, 1962 — a wide receiver originally from South Bend, Ind. Majored in education and has served as a football coach in South Bend.

Julian Nunamaker, NCAA College Division All-American 1968 — a defensive tackle originally from Manning, S.C. Credited with 90 unassisted tackles, 34 assisted tackles, and 28 blocked passes in 1968. Started in four all-star games following his senior year including the North-South Bowl, the Coaches All-American Game, the Senior Bowl Game, and the College All-Star Game that pitted college seniors against the world champion New York Jets. Third round draft choice of the Buffalo Bills. Charter member of the UT Martin Athletics Hall of Fame.

Terry Giltner, Associated Press All-American, 1970 — a linebacker originally from Humboldt. Holds the school record for the number of unassisted tackles in a game, in a season, and in a career. First team All-Mid South selection and twice selected as the AP Defensive Player-of-the-Week.

Nate Holmes, Associated Press All-American, 1971 — a tailback originally from Decatur, Ala. Alternate captain of the 1972 team. Rushed for 767 yards in 185 carries as the second-leading rusher in the GSC in 1972. Only back in the conference to receive unanimous selection to the all-conference team. Rushed for 1,395 yards in 329 carries and scored 14 touchdowns in two years. Signed by the Miami Dolphins.

Harris Prichett, Academic All-American, 1960 — a center originally from Munford. Owns Prichett Angus Farm in Dresden. Majored in agriculture at UT Martin.

Randy West, Academic All-American, 1974 — a defensive end originally from Memphis. First team All-GSC Academic selection in 1974.

\$34,500 in 1975-76; \$45,000 in 1976-77; and \$50,000 annually in 1977-78, 1978-79, and 1979-80. The past four years, the financial support to the University through the PACER CLUB has reached more than \$100,000 annually.

The growth of the PACER CLUB has been remarkable and has made a difference in the growth of the UT Martin athletics program. However, spiraling costs of operating a first-class athletics program have made intensifying all efforts a necessity.

NCAA Division II colleges often do not receive financial support from television contracts, bowl appearances by conference members, and big gate receipts that larger colleges enjoy. That makes the PACER CLUB a necessity on covering costs the money obtained through gate receipts, student activity fees, and state appropriations cannot cover. It gives Pacer athletics and UT Martin itself the chance to continue making strides toward the top.

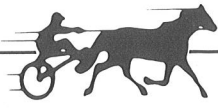
