Media Guide

Media Information

The University of Tennessee at Martin sports information office provides the 1991 Pacer Football Brochure as a service to media covering the 1991 Pacer football team. Copies are also used for recruitment of student-athletes and provided to members of the Pacer Club.

Pressbox Credentials: All requests for credentials should be directed to the sports information office. All credentials will be screened to insure a working press box. Only media covering UT Martin and opponents will be allowed. Parking passes are also available.

Photograph Credentials: Same policy as pressbox.

Broadcast Booths: Radio booths are located on the north end extension for the Pacer Radio Network and on the south extension for the visiting network. A television booth is also on the north extension.

Telephones: Phones are available in the media area on the first level of the press box for the filing of stories and are available on a first-come, first-serve basis.

Film Deck: Home filming is on the second level of the north extension and

opponents' filming is on the south extension's second level. Entrance is through the outside steps. There is also space for television stations on the deck.

Statistics: Complete play-by-play, half, final team and individual statistics will be provided about 20 minutes after the game. Play-by-play sheets will be ready each quarter upon request. Other statistical information, such as records, will be provided throughout the contest.

Interviews: All interview requests for Coach McLeary and players during the season must be made in advance through the sports information office. On game day, the Pacer locker room will be open 15 minutes after each game and Coach McLeary will be available 15 minutes after the game. Please contact the SID about any specific indivudals you wish to interview following the game.

General Information: Post-game, pre-game releases, and statistics will be mailed weekly throughout the season.

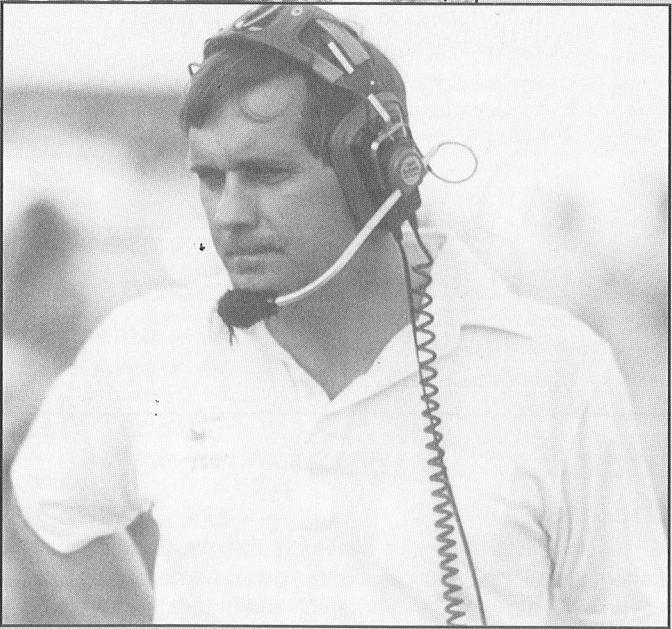

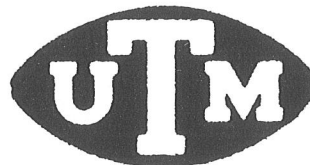

Nickname, Mascot

The term "Pacers" was selected as the official school nickname in 1970 symbolizing The University of Tennessee at Martin as a pacesetter institution. The symbol of the pacer horse, a proud and spirited breed, represents the feeling of strength and pride instilled by the University in the students who enroll and graduate with a quality education.

"Pacer Pete," a costumed-character, adds to the spirit with the Pacer cheerleaders.

Prior to the 1970 athletic seasons, UT Martin sports teams were the Volunteers.

School Colors, Uniforms

Royal blue, orange, and white are the school colors for The University of Tennessee at Martin. Orange and white were the school colors until royal blue was added in 1970, the same year the UT Martin nickname became the Pacers.

The Pacer football team wears either blue or orange jerseys at home. The blue jerseys are trimmed with orange and white numerals. The orange jerseys are trimmed with blue and have white numerals. On away games, the Pacers wear white jerseys with orange numerals and trimmed with royal blue. The game pants are white with an orange stripe and two blue stripes. The Pacer helmets are white with blue and orange stripes.

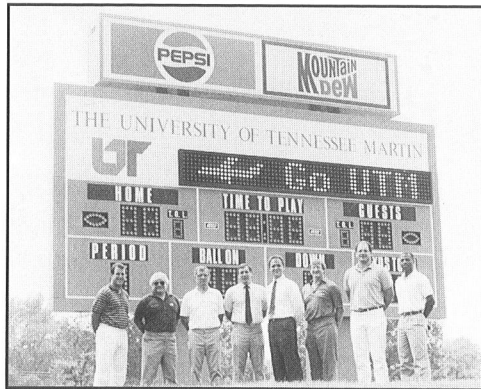

Position Capsule

Defensive Line

The area received a great boost with the welcomed return of Joe Keating. Keating was coming into his own at a defensive end last season. Phillip Robertson could be a dominating figure at tackle. Sophomores Pat Nanney and Mark Zipp had a lot of playing time as freshmen. A key will be finding a second defensive end. Backups will have to be freshmen.

Linebacker

Todd Shanks is the most experienced player and is tough against the run from his middle linebacker spot. Tyrone Lattimore and Gene Davis each saw game action from the outside linebacker spots. Several talented freshmen will be fighting for jobs at outside linebacker.

Secondary

Three out of four starters return in the area. A starter to come through at a cornerback will be one of the early concerns. Charles Wilson anchors the area from his strong safety spot and is an outstanding player. Danny Blackwell is very solid at one of the corners and sophomore O'Dale Satterfield is a promising prospect at free safety. Brian Buckner and Mekel Blackwell saw action last season as freshmen. Mitch Pollard also returns after sitting out last year with a stress fracture.

Special Teams

Ross Barnhart was very efficient handling the kicking chores as a true freshman. Barnhart made his final four field goals of the season. Sophomore Bubba Beasley had a good showing in the spring and should step into the punting job. Several players will receive a look to handle the returns.

Running Back

Scottie Mitchell is a strong inside runner and has accumulated a lot of playing time as a starter each of the past three years. Converted receiver Todd Pope is coming off a knee injury that forced him to miss all of the '90 season.

Offensive Line

Will be a key on how successful the offensive unit will be. Junior All-Academic pick Roger Brown has been a starter and will be a leader on the line. Mike Kirkland started as a freshman until a knee injury in the eighth game. Joe Welch is a young player who must develop at guard. Mike Harris is a transfer who will make an immediate impact. Some top freshmen signees will be backups. Tight ends Oscar Bunch and Laurence McGee are each very solid.

Quarterback

Senior Leonard Williams will trigger the offense and is showing all the signs of being ready for an outstanding senior year after breaking several records last season. Rickey Armstrong and Bubba Beasley each gained experience, starting while Williams was out with a hamstring injury.

Receivers

The most experienced area on the team with all players returning. Robert Thomas is a good player to build around after leading the Gulf South Conference in receptions and receiving yardage. Bunch is a good target from his tight end position. All-GSC academic selection Scott Stidham is a deep threat with his outstanding speed. Senior All-Academic GSC pick Anton Duke is a possession-type receiver with experience. Charles Malone is an emerging sophomore player.

1991 Outlook

The University of Tennessee at Martin football program is all business in approaching its transitional season in 1991 for the upcoming move from NCAA Division II to the Division I-AA level and Ohio Valley Conference membership the following year.

Coach Don McLeary's Pacer program is jumping right into its future level of play. No less than nine Division I-AA schools appear on this year's schedule as the Pacers compete as a Division II independent. The schedule will include seven games against future Ohio Valley Conference opponents.

"We know the direction in which we are headed and we desire to play the teams this season that we are going to be competing with in the future," said McLeary. "It will be a challenging task for us, but we are optimistic about moving to I-AA and the OVC."

To build a program for the future, McLeary and his staff signed 28 high school players during the past recruiting campaign. Many of the freshmen will see immediate action in backup roles and a few could earn starting positions.

"We feel very good about our starters, but our overall depth will be comprised mainly of freshmen," said McLeary. "How successful a team we will be depends on avoiding injuries to key personnel and having our new players gain maturity and experience. We feel the route we went (signing freshmen) will help build some continuity and establish more depth in our program and I feel we did have an excellent recruiting year."

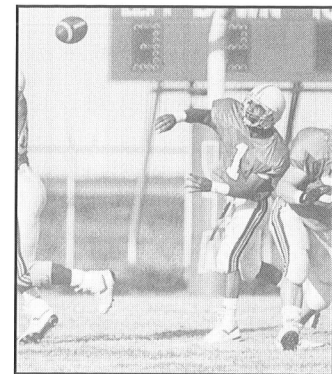
The Pacers suffered through an injury-plagued 1990 season, but came back to end the season with a pair of wins and finish with a 4-7 record.

OFFENSE

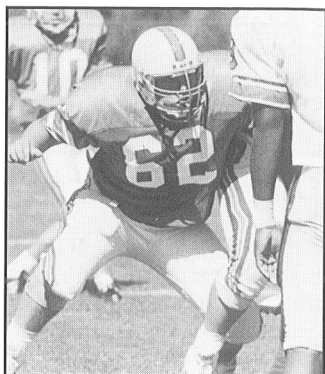
Senior quarterback Leonard Williams (5-9, 165) returns for his second season with the Pacers and is a solid figure to trigger the offensive unit. Williams did not disappoint the Pacer coaching staff after transferring from the junior college ranks.

"We are expecting great things from Leonard this fall," said McLeary. "He had a good first year with our program and now he has a year's experience under his belt and his leadership will be important for us."

Williams missed two games completely because of a hamstring injury and was not at full speed in other games, but still put together impressive statistics. He was 137-246-7 passing for 1,964 yards and 16 touchdowns. He established a new game mark for total offense with 440 total yards gained against Troy State. He also established a new school mark with five touchdown passes in a single game.

Williams will be backed-up by junior Rickey Armstrong and sophomore Bubba Beasley. Both players saw starting duty during the time Williams was out with his injury.

The receiving corps is the team's most experienced area with all the players returning having the benefit of experience.

"We have a good combination of different types of receivers," said McLeary. "We have some who will give us a deep threat and also have some possession-type players who will compliment each other well."

Robert Thomas (6-3, 210) will be a favorite target of Williams and will be in contention for post-season honors. Thomas made 52 catches for 799 yards and six touchdowns in earning first team All-Gulf South Conference as the league's top receiver and will be a man the Pacers will look to get the ball in his hands often.

Tight end Oscar Bunch (6-2, 240) had 30 receptions for 506 yards and four TD's, ranking second on the team behind Thomas. Laurence McGee is also solid at the position and had five catches for 39 yards and a touchdown.

Returning All-GSC Academic selections, senior Anton Duke (5-8, 155) and junior speedster Scott Stidham (5-11, 165), are experienced receivers. Duke made 14 catches for 233 yards and two touchdowns. Stidham had 16 catches for 294 yards and three TD's. Sophomore Charles Malone (6-1, 190) has potential at a receiver. Tom Ruban (6-1, 180), who has played both quarterback and defensive back in his UTM career, will play a receiver as well. Arnie Hicks is a local product and is an incoming freshman.

Seniors Scottie Mitchell (42) and Robert Thomas (81) will be a pair of key weapons in the offensive attack.

Senior Scottie Mitchell (6-0, 200) is a stable force at running back and is a three-year starter. Mitchell is strong inside and will look to improve on his 3.8 yards a rush of a year ago.

Mitchell will be supported by the return of senior Todd Pope (5-8, 165) who missed all of last season due to a knee injury suffered in the 1989 homecoming game. Pope, a former standout in high school as a running back, has played receiver since coming to college.

"Scottie has played a lot and I am looking for a good senior season from him," said McLeary. "Todd's return will be a great help and he will give us a good tandem at running back."

McLeary looks to the offensive line to continue its development behind some talented veterans and young players.

"I feel good about our offensive line's potential," said the Pacer coach. "We have some players who have gained playing time early in their career and a key will be how well our young linemen come along."

All-Academic GSC Roger Brown (6-2, 280) has started each of his first two collegiate seasons and can play either guard or tackle. Brown will be a solid force and leader in the trenches. Sophomore Trevor Hurst (6-2, 255) became a starter in his freshman season and returns at center. He is another player the Pacer coaching staff is looking for great things from in the coming seasons.

Mike Kirkland (6-4, 285) and Joe Welch (6-3, 265) are a pair of promising sophomores. Kirkland is slated to play at strong tackle while Welch will play strong guard.

Jim Tindall (6-2, 250) was on the squad last season and will be in a fight for a starting job along with Mike Harris (6-3, 255). Harris is a sophomore transfer who sat out last season.

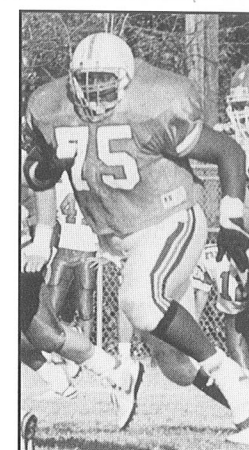
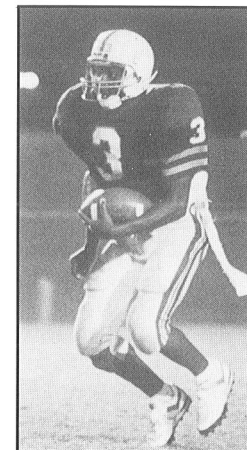
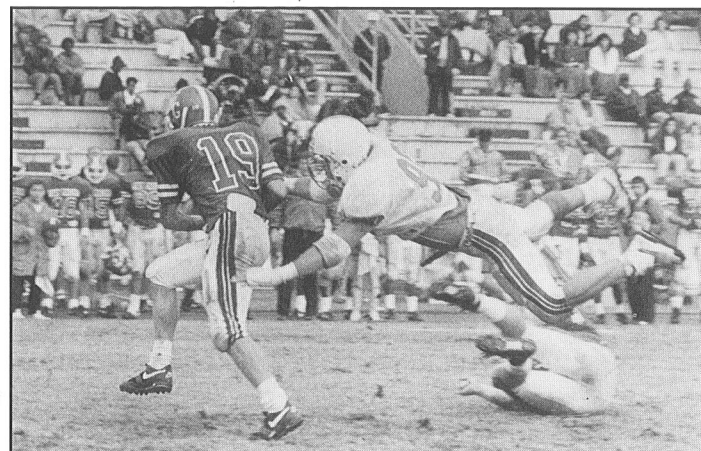
DEFENSE

Finding a defensive end will be an early priority in the defensive line. The area will have experience at three of the four spots.

"Our defensive line will be like what we will be facing in the secondary," said McLeary. "We are solid in three of the four positions and will have to find someone to step in and start at a defensive end. Our backups will be freshmen so they will have to come along quickly."

The defensive line welcomes the return of Joe Keating (6-4, 240) at one of the ends. Keating did not participate in spring practice, but was showing outstanding promise at the end of last season. He had nine quarterback sacks totaling 48 yards in losses.

Senior tackle Phillip Robertson (6-3, 280) will be a key inside. Robertson had 78 total tackles. Sophomores Mark Zipp (6-2, 250) and Chris Nanney (6-1, 240) each saw playing time last fall. Zipp and Nanney, who had a solid spring practice, will share a tackle spot alongside Robertson.

Junior Todd Shanks (5-11, 220) is a returning starter at middle linebacker. He led the team with 85 total stops last fall and will be helped by his playing experience.

Just who will be flanking Shanks at the outside linebacker spots will be a question. Sophomores Gene Davis (6-0, 190) and Tyrone Lattimore (6-1, 190) each saw playing time as freshmen.

"Todd has been helped by his playing experience and will be dependable," said McLeary. "Gene and Tyrone each saw some duty, but we have some outstanding freshmen coming in at the positions who will make immediate contributions."

The secondary promises to be a solid area with three returning starters. Senior Charles Wilson (6-2, 210) at strong safety made 70 tackles and had a team-high five interceptions. Wilson is capable of playing any one of the secondary spots.

Danny Blackwell (5-9, 180) is a returnee at boundary corner. Both Blackwell and Wilson will be in the hunt for post-season honors.

Sophomore O'Dale Satterfield (6-2, 190) has the potential to develop into an outstanding player according to McLeary. He will play free safety. McLeary is looking toward several players to play one of the corner slots.

"We have to have someone come in and take over at a corner," said McLeary. "I feel very good about our three returning starters."

SPECIALISTS

The place-kicking game should be solid with sophomore Ross Barnhart. Barnhart made eight of 11 field goals, including his final four kicks. The team will look to give Barnhart more opportunities to score this season.

Backup sophomore quarterback Bubba Beasley will handle the punting chores. Beasley had a solid spring punting the ball.

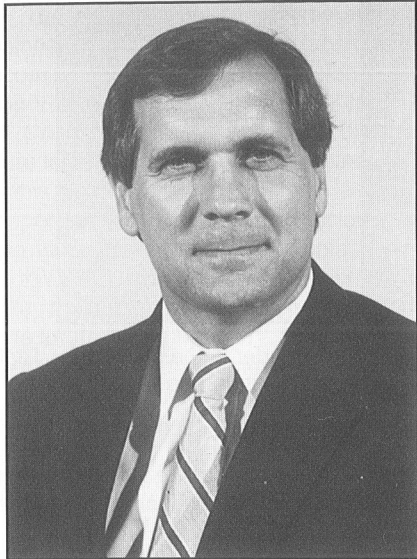
"Ross showed very good consistency and Bubba has the potential to be an outstanding punter," said McLeary.

SCHEDULE

Along with the seven OVC foes, UT Martin will face the strong programs of UT Chattanooga and McNeese State. The Pacers will play Washburn (Kansas) and former GSC rival Delta State, the only Division II schools on the schedule. UTM left the GSC after last season to begin its move toward its new division.

Junior Joe Keating finished 1990 on a strong note and his presence will be valuable at a defensive end.

Don McLeary is leading The University of Tennessee at Martin football program as it moves from NCAA Division II to Division I-AA status and Ohio Valley Conference membership in 1992. The Pacer football program has made tremendous strides toward building a solid foundation under McLeary's guidance and approach.

Along with his head coaching position, McLeary assumed the additional duties as men's athletics director in July 1989.

Upon naming McLeary to his dual position, UT Martin Chancellor Dr. Margaret Perry said, "Don has instilled very high athletic and academic values in his program. For this, he is highly respected, not only at the University, but in the West Tennessee community as well."

A commitment to hard work, a strong emphasis on recruiting, plus the intangibles that play an important role in building a successful program is what McLeary has brought to the UT Martin program. In 1988, the program enjoyed unprecedented success under McLeary in his third season as the Pacers' head coach. The school won its first-ever Gulf South Conference title and made its first appearance in the NCAA Division II national playoffs. The team finished with an overall record of 11-2, recording the most wins ever in a single season for a Pacer squad.

For his work, McLeary was named "GSC Coach of the Year" by his coaching peers in the league.

The 43-year old McLeary made a vow immediately upon taking the head coaching duties on the date of his birthday, Jan. 2, 1986, that the Pacers would play an exciting brand of football. With his version of the run 'n shoot offense, more than 40 school and 20 GSC records have fallen. McLeary followed with a plan to build the offense first in 1986 and then with a revamped defense which emerged in 1987.

Now a little more than five years later, the Pacers are facing another major challenge, but facing challenges is something that McLeary thrives upon.

Don returned "home" to his native West Tennessee to assume the head coaching duties. He was born in Humboldt and went on to star as an All-American high school player at Jackson North Side High. He would also have a very successful collegiate career at The University of Tennessee, Knoxville. McLeary has devoted his career to the coaching profession. Since his graduation from college, McLeary has worked as a coach at all levels — high school, collegiate, and professional. He embarked on his career immediately following his graduation from UTK in 1970.

He came to UT Martin from the staff of the Los Angeles Express of the United States Football League. He received high recommendations for the job, including football legends Sid Gillman and Express head coach John Hadl. He served as the Express receivers' coach and coordinator of special teams.

With the Express, McLeary had the opportunity to work with one of the great offensive coaches in football history in Gillman. McLeary has used part of Gillman's influence in establishing the Pacers' record-breaking run 'n shoot offense.

McLeary also served five years on the staff of the University of Kansas, working as the Jayhawks' receivers coach and special teams coordinator. At Kansas, he began his coaching association with former quarterbacking great John Hadl. McLeary was later asked by Hadl to join him in the pro ranks with the Express.

McLeary's previous head coaching experience came at Ottawa (Kansas) University. He brought new life into the Ottawa program, more than doubling the size of the team's number from the time he took the position. His first team posted the school's first winning mark in seven seasons. His second Ottawa team also had a winning mark and he left the school to move to Kansas.

He has served as an assistant coach at Morehead State University in Kentucky and at UT Knoxville, where he worked with the Volunteers' freshman team. He also has coached at two West Tennessee high schools, White Station in Memphis and Tennessee Academy in Brownsville.

As a prep player for the North Side Indians, McLeary was one of the top prospects ever in Tennessee. He led the state in scoring and was named to a wire service's All-Tennessee team and had his high school career capped off being named to the 1965 Prep All-America team.

After graduating from high school, McLeary went on to an impressive and successful career for the Volunteer football team, playing for coaches Doug Dickey and Bill Battle. With the Vols he was a member of two Southeastern Conference championship teams in 1967 and 1969. The Vols posted the best record of any collegiate team during the four-year period.

He played tailback and was a part of the offensive backfield along with Curt Watson. He played in the 1969 Cotton Bowl, 1969 Gator Bowl, and the 1971 Sugar Bowl. In his final game as a collegian, McLeary tied the historic Sugar Bowl game's record by scoring two touchdowns in the Vols' 34-13 win over the Air Force Academy.

McLeary was the recipient of a pair of prestigious awards while he was a student-athlete at UT Knoxville. In 1970, he received the Mickey O'Brien trophy, presented annually in honor to the senior player who best exemplifies courage and determination in overcoming physical obstacles during his career and makes a valuable contribution to the team. He also was presented the Herman Hickman Scholarship in 1971, presented to a former Vol athlete for post-graduate study.

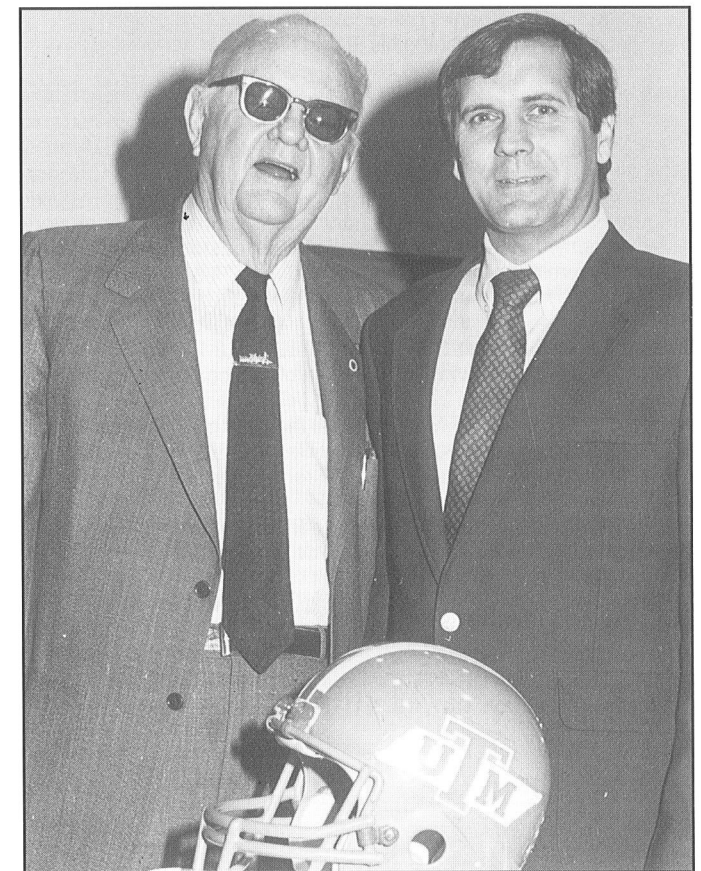
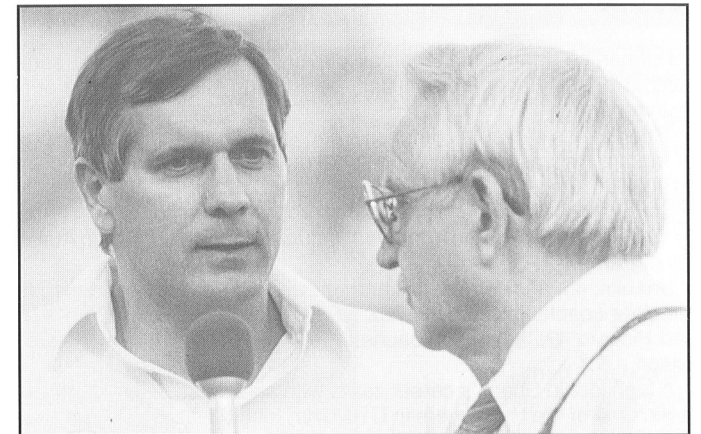
McLeary has a bachelor's degree in health and physical education and a master's degree in educational administration, both earned at UTK.

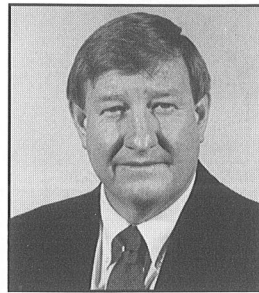

Larry Shanks

Assistant Head Coach,

Former UT Martin star football player Larry Shanks is the senior member on the Pacer football staff, beginning his 10th season at his alma mater.

Shanks has served as defensive coordinator ever since returning to UT Martin. He was given the additional duties as assistant head coach in 1989.

Shanks' contributions to the football program were honored in February 1986 when he became a fifth-year inductee into the UT Martin Athletic Hall of Fame.

Shanks, 45, answered a call and returned to UT Martin, entering the collegiate coaching ranks in 1982 as defensive coordinator for Coach Fred Pickard. He has also coached the defensive linemen all but one season.

A highlight in Shank's career came with his induction into the Hall of Fame. One of the top players in UT Martin football history, Shanks was captain of the one of the school's most successful teams ever. In 1967, UT Martin claimed the NCAA College Division Championship, defeating West Chester State 25-6 in the Tangerine Bowl in Orlando, Fla., in the school's only post-season appearance.

Playing tailback, Shanks gained 2,005 yards on 474 attempts in his career, leading UTM in rushing his junior and senior seasons. His name remains in the record book in several categories and his 126 points scored is fifth in school history. He also was a starter on defense, earning a regular's role in the secondary as a freshman for Coach Robert Carroll.

Shanks came back to the Pacers following a successful tenure as a high school head coach, establishing winning programs at all of his stops.

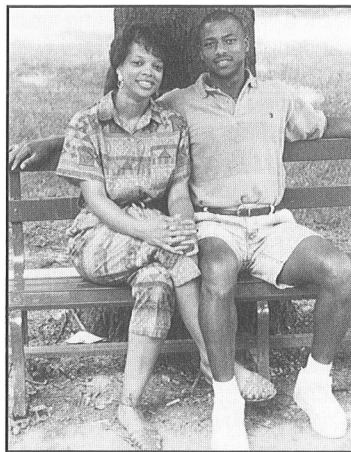
He began his head coaching career following graduation from college at nearby Fulton (Ky.) City High School for two years. He later moved to Houston County High School in Erin. He led Houston County's football program to prominence and his 1974 squad was 7-4 and eliminated in the state playoffs by eventual champion Brentwood Academy.

He returned to the area the following year to begin a seven-year tenure at Union City High School. He posted a 42-27-0 record with the Golden Tornadoes, becoming the winningest coach in the school's history.

His 1976 Union City team advanced to the state playoffs, finishing with a 9-2 mark. He earned a position in the Union City Hall of Honor for his work with the program. Shanks' overall record was 75-47-0 in the high school ranks.

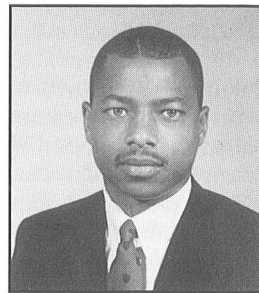
Shanks also owns a master's degree from UT Martin. The McEwen native took a year off from high school coaching in 1972 to serve as a graduate assistant to Carroll.

Defensive Secondary



Jerry Reese, a former Pacer standout defensive back, is in his fourth season as the defensive secondary's fulltime coach.

Reese has been a key part of the football program since his arrival on campus in 1981. He served as a student assistant for one year and as a graduate assistant for two seasons before assuming his new role in June, 1988.

He completed his playing career in 1984. He gained the reputation of being one of the hardest hitters in the Gulf South Conference, despite playing in the 160-pound range. He is high on the Pacer all-time career list in interceptions with 12 career and still holds several punt return records.

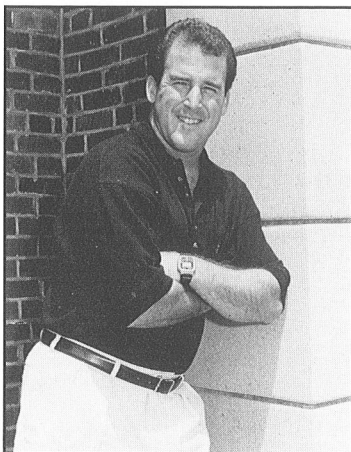
Reese was honored as one of the GSC's top players of the '80's decade. Reese was named to the second team All-GSC Decade team as selected by administrators and media representatives from across the league's region.

He led the GSC in interceptions as a sophomore in 1982 and earned second-team all-league honors as a sophomore and senior. Reese was GSC Defensive Player of the Week three times during his career. He was named team MVP following his senior season.

The 27-year-old Reese came to UT Martin following a standout prep career at Lake County High in his hometown of Tiptonville. He was an all-state selection as both a quarterback and defensive back. The team played for the state championship in three of the seasons and he led the Falcons to the Tennessee Class A state title in 1980, defeating Meigs County 21-7 in the final game. He passed for more than 900 yards and 13 TD's as a quarterback. He also was a starter in basketball and baseball.

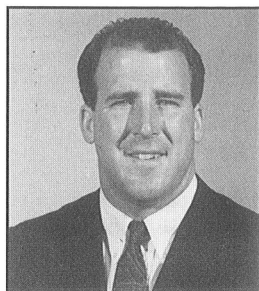
He has his bachelor's degree in health and physical education and earned his master's degree in education, administration and supervision, completing the requirements in 1986.

Todd Kirk is set for his second season as the Pacers' offensive line coach, coming west from the staff of his alma mater, UT Knoxville.

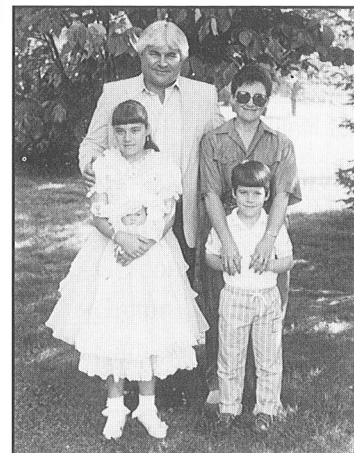

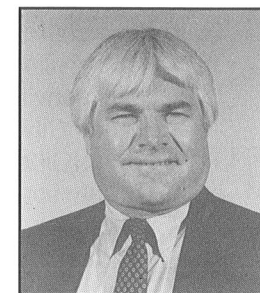
As a high school player for Pennington High, he was an All-Virginia performer. He holds a bachelor's degree in recreation from UT Knoxville.

Morgan Hout joined the Pacer football program last August 1 and begins his second season as the team's offensive coordinator and receivers coach.

The former head coach at Liberty University in Lynchburg, Va., led that program's successful march to the NCAA Division I-AA level. He inherited a program that was 2-9 the year prior to his arrival in 1984. Hired just 10 weeks prior to the season opener, he hired staff and installed offensive and defensive systems, leading the team to a 5-6 first-year mark.

In 1987, in the program's final year of competition on the Division II level, the Flames played seven I-AA schools in posting a 3-7 record.

In 1988, in its first year on the I-AA level, Liberty posted an 8-3 record, marking the second best turnaround of any I-AA school in the nation. The team was ranked in the top 20 and the schedule was also rated as the second toughest in the country. The three losses were a combined total of five points.

He produced eight All-America players in his tenure at Liberty. His five Liberty teams set of tied 50-plus school records. He was named Virginia Division I Coach of the Year in 1988. All 12 seniors from his first Liberty recruiting class have graduated from college.

Prior to his Liberty position, he coached wide receivers at Richmond for Dal Shealy from 1980-84. He was on Jerry Claiborne's Maryland staff from 1974-79, serving as defensive graduate assistant three years and then assuming the ends and receivers position for two seasons. The Terps played in five bowl games while he was on the staff.

After leaving Liberty, he was on the staff of Baylor University in 1989. He was serving on the staff of the Washington franchise of the Arena Football League at the time he was named to join the Pacer staff.

A native of Marietta, Ga., he graduated from Tennessee Temple in Chattanooga. Morgan and his wife, Brenda, have two children Morgan Diane, 11 and Jonathan Christopher, 7.

Lee Wilmot is completing his eighth year as UT Martin sports information director.

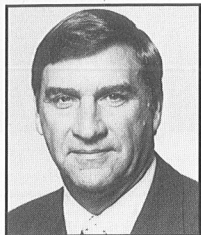

Sports information publications have received 17 national awards from the College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA) the past six years.

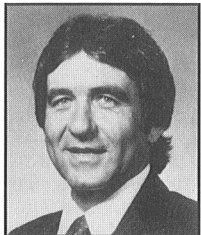

1990 Review

The 1990 UT Martin season ended with the positive way it began for the Pacer football team.

UT Martin closed the season by the same matter in which it opened by posting a pair of victories. However, what was between the wins was numerous injuries and an overall lack of depth which led to seven consecutive defeats for the young Pacer football team.

"We knew going into the season that we would be an improved team, but for us to be successful we would have to avoid injuries and we would be counting on a lot of young players," said Pacer coach Don McLeary. "We were naturally disappointed with our overall record, but pleased with the character our team showed to come back from all the adversity and win the last two games of the season."

Injuries took their toll on the Pacers' limited depth throughout the course of the season. So thin by the end of the season was the fact that only a total of 12 defensive players made the trip to West Georgia for the season's final game.

"We were really thin going down the stretch of the season, but the players hung on and hopefully the extensive play of the younger players along with us winning the last two games will be something that we can build upon," said McLeary.

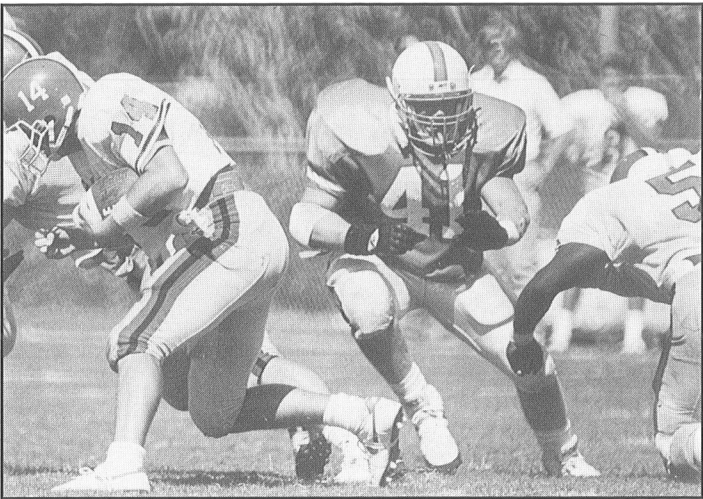


UT Martin played its last season of competition as a member of the Gulf South Conference. A charter member of the league, UT Martin had announced its withdrawal from the GSC to begin its transition period toward I-AA status and Ohio Valley Conference membership in 1992.

"With our plans to move to Division I-AA, we wanted to recruit more freshmen and not sign as many junior college players as we have in the past," said McLeary. "We were pleased with our underclassmen and are looking toward them to be an important part in our move to I-AA."

A record-breaking 73-0 win over Lane College from Jackson, Tennessee was the way the campaign began. The win surpassed the Pacers' biggest win in school history. Players such as quarterback Leonard Williams, receiver Robert Thomas, and defensive back Charles "Pug" Wilson made their presence felt with impressive performances.

A tougher challenge came the next week as the Pacers traveled to Clarksville to play a revived Austin Peay team. UT Martin scored on its first two possessions and went on to defeat the Governors 24-10.



For the better part of the first three quarters, things were looking good for the Pacers in their GSC opener with Valdosta State. UTM led 14-0, before the visiting Blazers bounced back and took advantage of Pacer turnovers for a 28-14 win.

The Pacers lost Williams the next week after he scored a TD and defending national champion Mississippi College broke open a close game for a 44-14 win.

A close game came the following week with Delta State as UTM led early only to be defeated 27-18. North Alabama broke its homecoming jinx by storming past the Pacers 49-0.

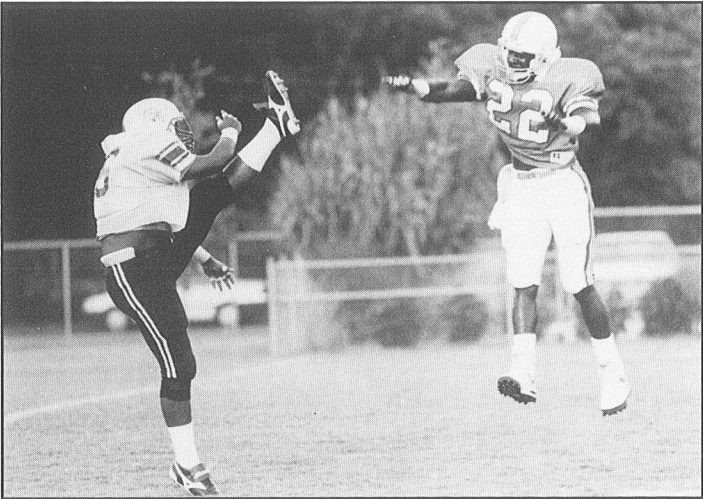
A trip to I-AA power Middle Tennessee resulted in UTM building an early 17-10 lead, but the Blue Raiders displayed their strength in posting a 65-17 win.

Missed scoring opportunities haunted the Pacers as they put on a stubborn performance in a 21-7 loss to playoff-bound Jacksonville State.

A patched-up Pacer squad made the trip to Troy State. Williams had another record-breaking effort, but the Pacers couldn't hold back the Trojans in a 41-33 loss.

Fortunes changed for the Pacers the following week as UTM rallied for a 21-10 homecoming victory over Livingston University on a pleasant fall afternoon.

The Pacers put the caps on the season by posting a come-from-behind victory at West Georgia. UTM scored 14 points in the final period and the Braves scored on the final play of the game to make the final 24-20.

GAME 1

Pacers 73 Lane 0

MARTIN — Tennessee-Martin quarterback Leonard Williams threw for a school record five touchdown passes to lead the Pacers to their biggest win in school history, 73-0 over Lane College in the season opener for both teams.

Williams, a junior college transfer from Jones County (Miss.), threw three of the TD strikes in the first quarter as the Pacers took advantage of the big play and Lane miscues to open a 42-0 halftime lead.

"Lane played an eight-man defensive front and we were able to have several big plays," said Pacer coach Don McLeary. "We were fortunate to get a lot of players playing time and that was very beneficial."

UT Martin scored on its last five possessions of the first half after Williams threw an interception on the Pacers' first play from scrimmage.

Flanker Robert Thomas equaled a school record of his own in his first Pacer performance with three TD receptions from Williams. Thomas had scoring catches of 26, 79, and 23 yards. Thomas' effort equaled William Mackall's three TD receptions vs. Troy State in 1988. Sophomore Scott Stidham and freshman quarterback Bubba Beasley hooked up on scoring passes of 35 and 57 yards.

Lane fumbled once inside its own 5-yard line and had a bad snap from center on a punt attempt, leading to two Pacer TD's. Safety Charles Wilson had a 55-yard interception return for a touchdown with 36 seconds remaining in the first half.

Oscar Bunch caught a 7-yard TD pass on the second play following the high center snap recovered by the Dragons at their own 3-yard line. Other TD's came on a Kowalski Bynum 3-yard TD reception from Williams and scoring runs of one and three yards by Darron Turner.

The win surpassed the Pacers' 70-0 win over Millikin University in 1967, the season in which UT Martin won the Tangerine Bowl and Atlantic Coast College Division championship. The previous high point total in Pacer Stadium was 64 points, scored against Michigan-Northwood in 1968.

CLARKSVILLE, Tenn. — Tennessee-Martin ran its record to 2-0 on the season with a 24-10 win at Austin Peay State before 6,893 fans.

After leading 14-10 at the half, UT Martin added a third-quarter field goal and an early fourth-quarter TD. The Pacers then played shutout defense to help preserve the win. The loss spoiled new APSU coach John Palermo's debut at the Governors' helm.

"Our defense came through in the second half and never gave them a chance to get into the ballgame," said Pacer coach Don McLeary. "Our offense came up with some big plays and we had a much-improved running game, but we self-destructed at times with penalties."

The Pacers had 385 yards total offense. Austin Peay had 202 yards total offense. UTM quarterback Leonard Williams was 10-19 passing for 183 yards and threw two first quarter touchdowns to tight end Oscar Bunch. Bunch had six receptions for 120 yards.

The Pacers also showed a strong ground game, rushing for 202 yards and controlling the football in the second half. Junior Scottie Mitchell of Alamo, coming back from a sprained ankle which kept him sidelined the previous week, led the attack with 125 yards on 14 carries.

Except for an opening scoring drive which ended in a field goal, the other APSU points came on a kickoff return late in the first quarter.

The Pacers scored on their first two possessions of the game. UT Martin marched 62 yards in six plays to take the lead. Williams threw 16 yards to Bunch for the touchdown. Ross Barnhart kicked the PAT to make the score 7-0 with 12:13 left in the opening period.

UT Martin answered quickly after AP's field goal with a 63-yard drive in only four plays. Williams threw to Bunch again for the TD, this time from 14 yards out. Barnhart's PAT gave UTM a 14-3 lead with 1:32 left in the opening period.

APSU came right back with the big play with a 96-yard kickoff return by Samy Hillman.

After a scoreless second period, UT Martin increased its lead to 17-10. Williams threw a 51-yard pass to Bunch on a third down play to the Governors' 5-yard line. APSU held and forced a 21-yard field goal by Barnhart with 5:09 left in the third period.

Darron Turner's 21-yard run sealed the game with 10:54 left in the fourth period. Barnhart's PAT finished the Pacers' scoring.

MARTIN — Senior tailback Ramon Allen rushed for four touchdowns and 199 yards to lead Valdosta State to a 28-14 comeback win over host Tennessee-Martin in a Gulf South Conference football game.

The Pacers had built a 14-0 lead late in the third quarter. Allen scored once at the 4:57 mark of the third quarter and spurred the Blazers with fourth-quarter runs of 10, 14, and 15 yards.

"Valdosta State's experience and strength really showed in the second half and we made some mistakes that really helped them," said Pacer coach Don McLeary. "The momentum of the game turned in their favor and we couldn't overcome it. We gave them excellent field position for their final two scores."

UT Martin marched from its own 31 to the VSC one on its first possession only to be held on downs. UTM carried a 7-0 lead into the halftime after a Scottie Mitchell 6-yard run at the 6:35 mark of the second period. The score came after defensive back Charles Wilson stripped Valdosta State running back Chad Tanner of the ball at midfield and returned it to the Blazers' 35.

The Pacers increased their lead to 14-0 in the third quarter on a 43-yard TD pass from Leonard Williams to tight end Oscar Bunch. Ross Barnhart's second PAT of the game gave UTM a 14-0 lead with 8:56 remaining in the third.

Valdosta State answered with a 69-yard, 10-play drive for its first points. Allen then scored from the five on a pitch from quarterback Tye Cottle which tied the game.

Derick McCant intercepted a Williams pass and returned it 15 yards to the UTM 20. Allen scored on a third down play from the 14 to give the Blazers their first lead.

Another UT Martin turnover led to the Blazers' final touchdown. Williams fumbled while attempting to pass at his own 41. Allen scored five plays later for the fourth time.

The Pacers were without the services of quarterback Leonard Williams in the second half. Williams injured a thigh while scoring a touchdown on a two-yard run with 25 seconds left in the first half. Williams' score had brought UTM to within 17-14 at the time.

"Mississippi College has a good football team, but we made them look a lot better," said Pacer coach Don McLeary. "We were ineffective on offense when Leonard went out and we were again hurt by turnovers. We have to check our character and not drop our heads and quit when adversity hits us."

TROY, Ala. — Troy State scored 20 unanswered points in the fourth quarter to post a 41-33 comeback win over Tennessee-Martin.

The Pacers led 24-14 at the half and by as much as 27-14 in the second half. UTM was leading 33-21 when TSU began its comeback.

The defeat offset impressive statistical numbers by the Pacers. UT Martin had 507 yards total offense to Troy State's 331. UTM also rolled up 28 first downs to Troy's 13.

"It was a very disappointing loss for us," said Pacer coach Don McLeary. "We couldn't hold them off and we made turnovers which were very costly to us. Troy State came back and played harder in the fourth quarter and their depth came through."

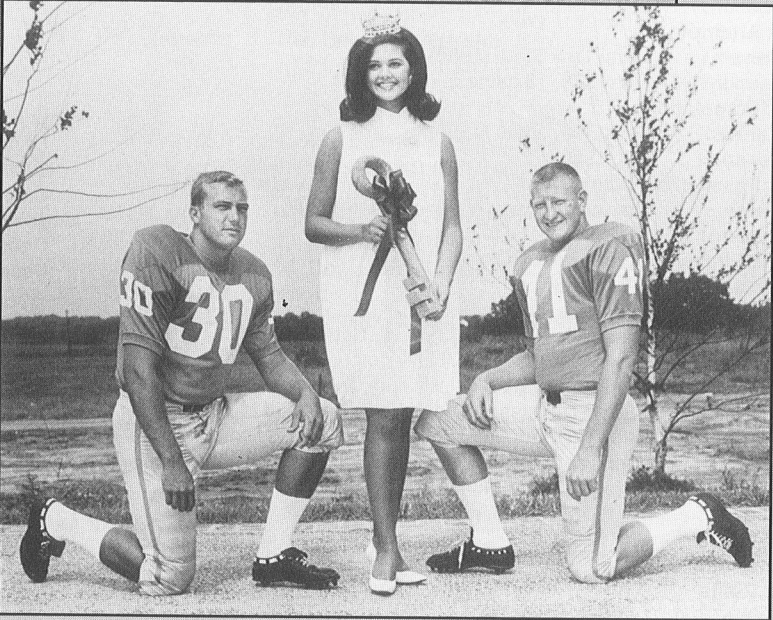
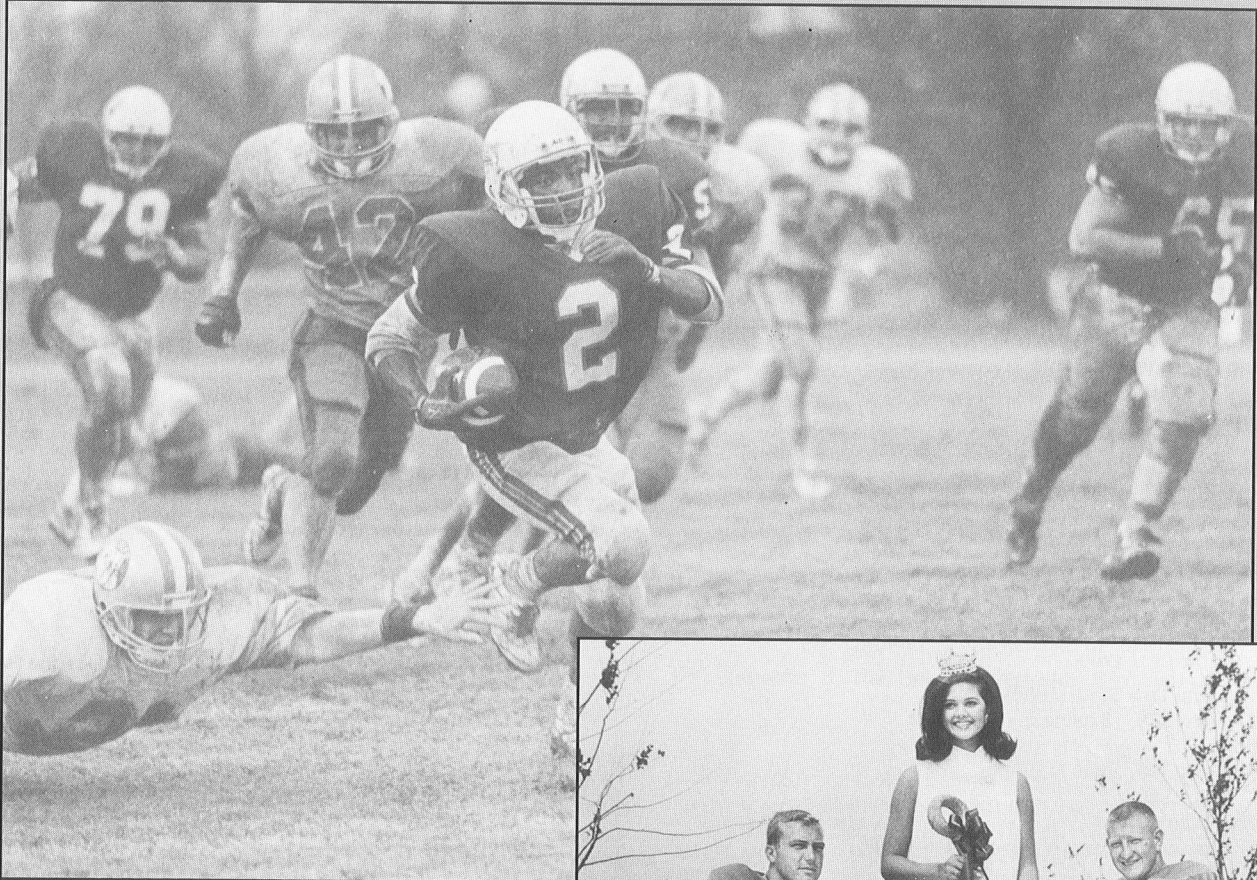

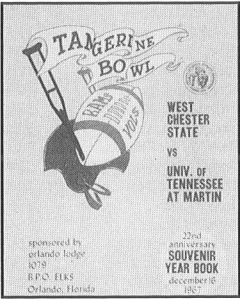
Played mostly in the rain, UTM had 314 yards total offense. UTM led 18-8 at the half. The only West Chester score came from a long punt return.

The Last Time...

UT MARTIN SCORED A TOUCHDOWN ON A PUNT RETURN: came on Nov. 8, 1986 in Troy, Ala. Austin Thompson blocked a Troy State punt and the late Demetres Brown fell on the ball in the end zone for the score. TSU won the wild affair, 50-30, on its homecoming.

AN OPPONENT SCORED A TOUCHDOWN ON A PUNT RETURN: Ironically, in the same game as UTM scored its last TD on a punt return. Troy State's Greg Harris fielded a punt at his own 10 and returned it 90 yards in the second quarter.

UT MARTIN SCORED ON A KICKOFF RETURN: William Mackall returned the second half kickoff 80 yards on Nov. 5, 1988 against Livingston in a rainy Pacer Stadium. The return gave UTM a 31-3 lead on its way to a 41-11 win.

AN OPPONENT SCORED ON A KICKOFF RETURN: North Alabama's Arthur Brandan opened the second half with a 79-yard kickoff return last Oct. 6.

UTM SCORED ON AN INTERCEPTION RETURN: Benny Thompson picked off a deflected pass and returned it 25 yards last Oct. 14 in the Pacers' homecoming game. However, Samford rallied for a 37-33 win. Charles Wilson returned a pass interception 55 yards with 36 seconds left in the 1st half against Lane Sept. 1, 1990.

AN OPPONENT SCORED ON AN INTERCEPTION RETURN: It was the second interception for a TD within a 3-minute span. Jacksonville State's Freddie Goodwin grabbed a Tom Ruban pass, and ran 63 yards giving JSU a 21-0 lead Oct. 21, 1989.

UTM SCORED A SAFETY: Came Nov. 4, 1989, Freshman Joe Keating blocked a Livingston punt through the end zone in Tiger Stadium.

AN OPPONENT SCORED A SAFETY: In 1989, when North Alabama's Henry Thomas tackled Scottie Mitchell in the end zone.

AN OPPONENT BLOCKED A PUNT: was on the Pacers' homecoming in 1985. North Alabama's Bruce Jones helped give the Lions a 38-7 win with his effort.

UT Martin All-Americans

Hugh Lashlee, NJC All-American, 1957 -- an offensive and defensive end originally from Camden, Tenn. He was co-captain of the 1957 team which lost only one game. Majored in Business Administration and now resides in Ft. Worth, Texas. His daughter, Shari, was a 1983 UT Martin graduate and a Pacer cheerleader.

Buddy Long, NAIA All-American, 1958 — an offensive and defensive end originally from Brunswick, Ga. He was co-captain of the 1958 team which went 7-0-1. He majored in education.

Bobby Fowler, NAIA All-American, 1959 — a fullback originally from Ridgely, Tenn. He was captain of the 1958 and 1959 teams. All-time leading ground gainer with UT Martin having accumulated 4,003 career yards rushing. Gained 1,045 yards in 1959 for an average of 130.6 yards a game. First and only UT Martin athlete to have his jersey number (33) retired. He was drafted by the Chicago Bears. Holds numerous Pacer football records. He is a charter member of the UT Martin Athletics Hall of Fame.

Ralph Rutland, Williamson All-American, 1960 and 1961 — a tackle originally from Cherokee, Ala. Served as captain of the 1960 and 1961 Pacer teams. Majored in Liberal Arts at UT Martin.

Darrell Smith, Williamson All-American, 1962 — a fullback originally from Atoka, Tenn. Co-captain of the 1961 and captain of the 1962 Pacer teams. Majored in Liberal Arts and has served as a pilot with Northwest Orient Airlines.

Jim Love, Williamson All-American, 1962 — a wide receiver originally from South Bend, Ind. Majored in Education and has served as a football coach in South Bend.

Julian Nunamaker, NCAA College Division All-American, 1968—a defensive tackle originally from Manning, S.C. Credited with 90 unassisted tackles, 34 assisted tackles, and 28 blocked passes in 1968. Started in four all-star games following his senior year including the College All-Star game that pitted college seniors against the world champion New York Jets. Third round draft choice of the Buffalo Bills. Charter member of the UT Martin Athletics Hall of Fame.

Terry Giltner, Associated Press All-American, 1970 — a linebacker originally from Humboldt, Tenn. Holds the school record for the number of unassisted tackles in a game, in a season, and in a career. First team All-Mid South selection and twice selected as the AP Defensive Player of the Week.

Nate Holmes, Associated Press All-American, 1971 — a tailback originally from Decatur, Ala. Alternate captain of the 1972 team. Rushed for 767 yards in 185 carries as the second-leading rusher in the GSC in 1972. Only back in the conference to receive unanimous selection to the all-conference team. Rushed for 1,395 yards in 329 carries and scored 14 touchdowns in two years. Signed by Miami Dolphins.

Emanuel McNeil, Associated Press, Football News and Gazette All-American, 1988 — A Richmond, Va., product who was one of the most popular and dominating players to ever play at UT Martin. Led the team in tackles two consecutive years. Named GSC Defensive Player of the Year and Football News and Gazette's Player of the Year. Tenth-round draft choice of New England Patriots.

William Mackall, Football News and Gazette All-American, 1988 — The premier receiver in UTM and GSC history. Had 255 career catches and holds many other receiving marks. Drafted in ninth round by Indianapolis Colts. He is a native of Panama City, Fla.

Leon Reed, Football News and Gazette All-American, 1988 — Established numerous passing and total offense records in less than two seasons as a starter. Player of the Year in the GSC in '88. From Senatobia, Miss., signed to play with Winnipeg Blue Bombers of the CFL.

Harris Pritchett, Academic All-American, 1960 — a center originally from Munford, Tenn. Owns Pritchett Angus Farm in Dresden. Majored in Agriculture at UT Martin.

Randy West, Academic All-American, 1974 — a defensive end originally from Memphis, Tenn. First team All-GSC Academic selection in 1974.

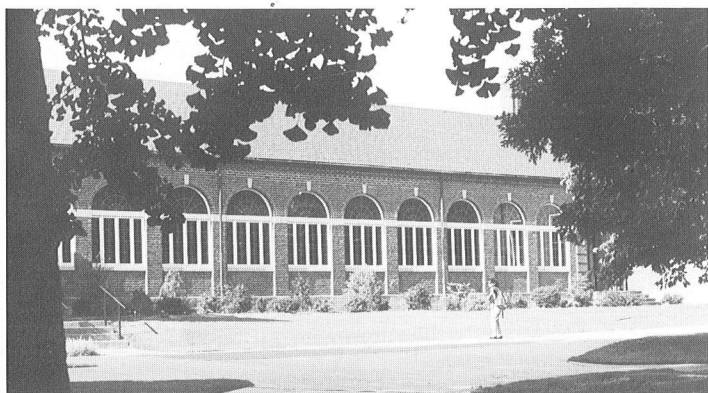

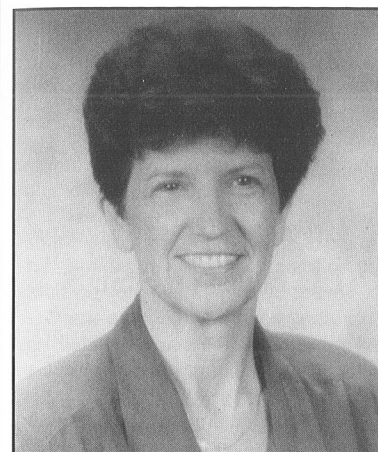

UT Martin is considered a residential campus because more than 65 percent

Administration



Chancellor Dr. Margaret N. Perry

Dr. Margaret N. Perry became the first woman chief administrator of a four-year public college in Tennessee when she assumed the role of chancellor at UT Martin in July, 1986. Dr. Perry joined the UT System from Tennessee Technological University where she served as associate vice president of Academic Affairs.

She boasts an extensive background with the UT System as a student, faculty member and administrator and seven years as an administrator at Tennessee Tech in the State Board of Regents.

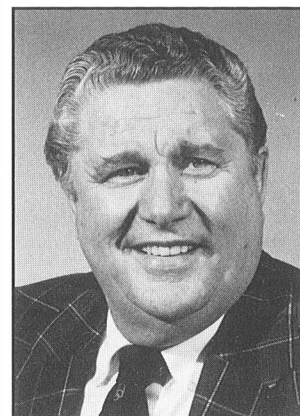
Dr. Perry, a native of Waynesboro, received her undergraduate degree from the University of Tennessee at Martin Branch in dietetics in 1961. She obtained her master's and doctorate degrees from The University of Tennessee, Knoxville, in 1963 and 1965, and went on to serve as Associate Dean of the College of Home Economics.

From 1973 to 1979, she served as Dean for Graduate Studies at UTK. During these years Dr. Perry developed a peer review program for doctoral programs and was administrator for approximately 7,000 graduate students. While at UTK, Dr. Perry also served on numerous boards and committees including

the Board of Directors for the University of Tennessee Faculty Club, Board of Directors for the Knoxville Early Childhood Development Center, and the University of Tennessee Alumni Board of Governors. She led program sessions for the National Meeting of Council of Graduate Schools in Phoenix, New Orleans, and Orlando and chaired a seminar on Careers in Science for Women.

From 1979 to her appointment at UT Martin, Dr. Perry served as Associate Vice President for Academic Affairs at Tennessee Tech. She initiated a contract for a faculty/student exchange program between Northeast University of Technology in Shenyang, China and Tennessee Tech. She implemented a plan for student outcomes assessment and performance funding which resulted in almost \$1 million per year in formula funding and won her an AACU Mitau Special Commendation for Innovation and Change in Higher Education.

Dr. Perry and her husband Dr. Randy Perry, who joined UT Martin as Dean of Engineering Technology and Engineering from the engineering faculty at Tennessee Tech, are the parents of two sons, Paul, and Sam.



Athletics Director Emeritus Ray Mears

Ray Mears officially retired as men's athletics director at UT Martin effective July 1, 1989 but remains at the University in the role of Athletics Director Emeritus.

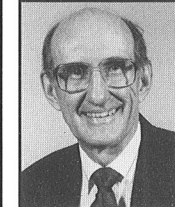
Mears assists present AD and football coach Don McLeary in various development and promotional activities. All of UTM's men's athletics programs have been nationally-ranked at times during Mears' tenure. He came to Martin in March, 1980 after an illustrious basketball coaching career at UT Knoxville.

Mears is credited with helping the UT Martin athletics department grow and excel in many areas. He is widely-known for his promotional and motivational skills.

As UTK's basketball coach, he led the Vols into basketball prominence rolling up 278 wins to only 112 losses in 15 seasons. Combined with a 121-23 record which included a national championship at Wittenberg, his record as a coach was 399-125 for a .747 winning percentage ranking him 13th on the all-time collegiate basketball coaching honor roll.

He has been inducted into the Tennessee Sports Hall of Fame, Wittenberg Hall of Honor, and the Knoxville Sports Hall of Fame.

Coach and wife, Dana, are the parents of three sons, Steve, Mike and Matt.



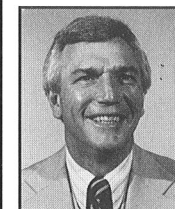
Faculty Representative Dr. Ernie Blythe

Dr. Ernie Blythe, a professor of geology at The University of Tennessee at Martin, serves as chairman of UT Martin's Athletics Board and has been a faculty representative to the board since 1979.

Pacer Club Director Robert Carroll

Robert Carroll, winningest coach in UT Martin history, serves as Director of the Pacer Club, a non-profit organization to provide UT Martin athletic teams with financial assistance. He is also assistant vice-chancellor of alumni affairs for the state-wide UT system.

The Pacer Club has played a major role in the growth of UT Martin's athletic program under Carroll's leadership. He has organized several fund-raising projects for the athletics department.

Carroll coached UT Martin to 85 victories and four ties in 18 years from 1957 to 1974. His 1967 team compiled a record of 10-1 and defeated West Chester State in the Tangerine Bowl 25-6, the Pacers' only bowl appearance. He was a standout as a player for both UTMB and later at Wymoing where he was an Academic All-American.

He was assistant AD from 1974 to 1979 prior to his present position. He was inducted into UT Martin's Hall of Fame in 1983, and he is married to the former Kay Pritchett of Dresden. They have three children, Steve, Cliff and Kayla.

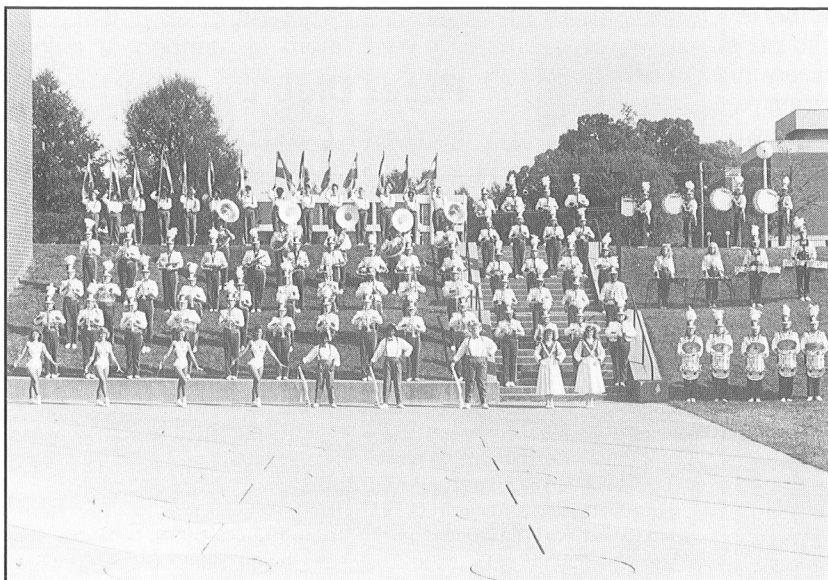

Pacer Stadium, Facilities

The Stadium

The Pacers play their home games in Pacer Stadium, which has undergone a major renovation job the past three years. The stadium and football complex are located on the northeast portion of campus.

Designed to be "A Showplace in Dixie," landscaping work has continued since the last two seasons on the area around the football stadium. The project is designed to give the University one of the nicest Division II complexes in the nation.

The stadium will accommodate about 8,000 fans with nearly 1,900 of the seats chairback. About 1,200 of these seats are located on the new east side. The east side seats are located on the slanted roof of the ROTC building which was completed prior to the 1987 season.

There are 650 chairback seats on the west side. There may be more chairback seats added to the west side in the coming years.

There are berms located on the south end of the end zone to give the stadium a bowl look. Also trees, hedges, and walkways located on the inside and outside of the stadium add greatly to the appearance.

The stadium press box also received a major facelift. The first floor accommodates the working media. The press box extensions on the south side houses the visiting radio and coaches while on the north end the Pacer Radio Network and broadcast crew for WLJT-TV have booths.

The second level houses the public address announcer and scoreboard operator. Chancellor Margaret Perry also has a box complete with theater type seats where she can entertain 25 guests. The Pacer coaches also have their booth on the second level. Filming decks are on the outside of the second level.

Underneath Pacer Stadium is the Pacer Club room. Pacer Club members gather at halftime in this area.

The Pacer Stadium playing surface consists of hybrid bermuda grass found on golf greens. Field drainage and sideline improvements were also a part of the renovation. There is a drainage system below the surface. The players' boxes are astro-turf on each sideline.

Stadium Renovation Project

The renovation of Pacer Stadium was made possible through a combination of state funding and a stadium drive for private gifts. The state of Tennessee in 1985 provided funding to construct an ROTC facility on the east side of the stadium.

With the assistance of alumni, faculty, staff, and friends, \$350,000 was contributed to install the chairback seats, complete restroom and concession facilities on the east side, improve the west side seating, and enlarge the press box.

Football Complex

The UT Martin football operation is housed in a building complex which totals more than 25,000 square feet. A significant portion of the building is a large work-out area of about 5,000 square feet. The surface is a Parkway wood floor.

A recent addition to the building was a large meeting area built on what was the stage located above the workout area. Assistant coaches offices are located on each side of the meeting room. Coach Don McLeary's office, secretary and a coaches' meeting room is on the workout level and located up the stairs to the right upon entering the main outside entrance to the building.

There is a newly remodeled weight room in the west end of the building's lower level. The 3,300-square foot room has an extensive variety of weight machines and equipment and will continue to grow. The air-conditioned locker room has space for about 100 athletes and new lockers were built prior to the '89 season. Training room and equipment room areas are on the lower level.

Practice Field

The practice field area is 15,804 square yards and adjoins the northwest side of Pacer Stadium. There is one north-south regulation practice field with the remainder of the area divided into practice drill areas. The practice field has a variety of grass types to provide a good surface throughout the year. There is a 40-foot tower located on the south end for observation and videotaping of practice.

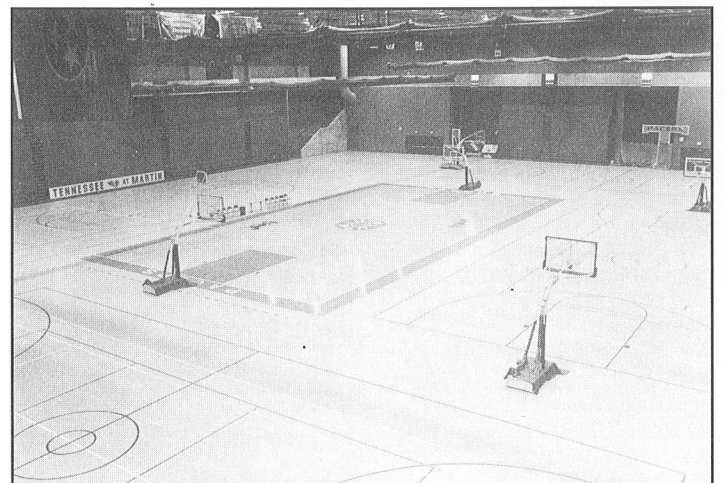

Pacers on the Air

The Pacer Radio Network

Pacer football can be heard on The University of Tennessee at Martin's Pacer Radio Network, which blankets Northwest Tennessee and carries into neighboring states.

Bill Haney, the color commentator for Pacer football, is coordinating this year's network. Haney has been reestablishing the network as one of the largest in Division II football.

Haney and play-by-play announcer Tom Britt have more than 50 years of combined experience in the broadcast field and are the voices of UT Martin athletics. The popular duo return for another year of Pacer football on the radio and will assume the additional duties of handling the tape-delayed television broadcasts.

Britt enters his 12th year as play-by-play man for football broadcasts and is regarded as one of the state's top broadcasters. He calls the color commentary during basketball season. Britt serves as sports and news director for WMXX-FM and WDXI-AM radio in Jackson.

Haney is a 36-year veteran of West Tennessee radio. He is in his tenth year with the network and calls the play-by-play for Pacer basketball games. He was one of the forerunners of establishing high school, college, and professional sports broadcast in the area.

The season's format for Pacer football games will include the Coach Don McLeary Show before each game, a scouting report on the Pacers' game, and reports on other games. The coverage will also include special halftime features with halftime and postgame comments from Coach McLeary.

Pacer Television Replays

The University of Tennessee at Martin works in association with Public Broadcasting station, WLJT-TV, Channel 11, to carry all 11 Pacer football games.

The Pacers are believed to be the only Division II school in the nation to have all 11 games broadcast. The tentative time is 9 p.m. each Sunday night.

WLJT-TV has its offices and studios located on the UT Martin campus with its transmitter located near Lexington. The PBS station offers quality educational and entertainment programs.

Staff members of WLJT-TV along with UTM students work the technical end of the replays.

Bill Haney and Tom Britt, the veteran radio voices of Pacer football and basketball, will also handle the television side this fall.

The Don McLeary Radio Show

Each Monday evening during the course of the 1991 Football season, "The Don McLeary Radio Show," can be heard on the Pacer Radio Network. Originating from the studios of WCMT in Martin, PRN coordinator Bill Haney will host the hour-long program from 6-7 p.m. The show will feature interviews with the Pacer head coach, assistant coaches, players, and other features. WCMT is the flagship station for PRN.

The Don McLeary TV Show

After a two-year absence, "The Don McLeary Television Show," returns this year on WBBJ-TV in Jackson and also on WLJT-TV, West Tennessee's Public Broadcasting Station. WBBJ sports director Buddy Pearson will host the weekly program which will have game highlights, interviews with Coach McLeary, previews of the upcoming game, and other features. WBBJ will have the show each Sunday night at 10:30 while WLJT will telecast the program at an announced time later in the week.

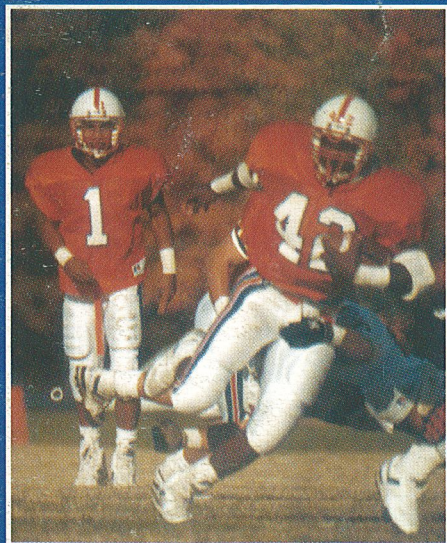
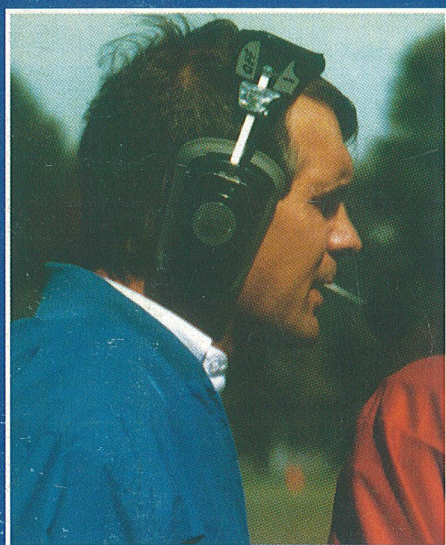
