CNFR Bound!

The UT Martin Men's team won the Ozark Regional Title and once again qualified for the College National Finals Rodeo in Casper, Wyoming. It is the 41st consecutive year the men's team has competed at the Finals. The UTM cowboys head west ranked 7th nationally with plans to improve on that ranking at the CNFR. However, all points are wiped clean at the CNFR and national championships are based on results at the College Finals only.

This year's qualifiers are bareback riders Tyler Waltz, Tanner Phipps and Colt Kitaif. Will Lummus will compete in the tie down roping and steer wrestling. Clark Adcock qualified in the tie down roping and in the team roping as a heeler, along with his partner John Alley who qualified in the heading.

Nealey Dalton on the women's team also earned a berth at the Finals to compete in the barrel racing. Competitors who finished in the top three in the final regional standings earn an automatic bid to the CNFR.

According to Coach Luthi, "We are blessed to be taking seven student-athletes to the College Finals; six men and one from the women's team. I feel we have a very solid group going. All of them are very capable of doing great things at the Finals. I pray God blesses us with good stock draws and we all continue to keep good attitudes and do our best with what we draw. I know great things are possible with this group!"

Welcome to the 2014 College National Finals Rodeo!

The CNFR is the "Rose Bowl" of college rodeo. It is where the National Intercollegiate Rodeo Association crowns individual event champions in saddle bronc riding, bare back riding, bull riding, tie-down roping, steer wrestling, team roping, barrel racing, breakaway roping, and goat tying. National team championships are also awarded to both men's and women's teams. Over 400 cowboys and cowgirls from over 100 universities and colleges compete in Casper each year. Contestants compete all year in one of the NIRA's 11 regions for a chance to rope or ride at the CNFR.

The top three students in each event, and top two men's and women's teams from the NIRA's 11 regions will qualify for the CNFR.

UT MARTIN'S ANNUAL SPRING GOLLEGE RODEO A ROUSING SUGGESS ONGE AGAIN

The University of Tennessee at Martin men's team captured its seventh top finish of the season while the women's team recorded its second-highest point total of the season at the 46th annual spring college rodeo held before record setting crowds at the Ned Ray McWherter Agricultural Complex and NW (Doc) Robinson Arena in April. The rodeo was again voted "Rodeo of the Year" in the Ozark Region, an honor it has received every year (9) it has been awarded.

The UT Martin men accumulated 875 points, which was 350 more than Missouri Valley College, the second place finisher. The women's team racked

up 180 points, just 85 points behind team winner Missouri Valley College's 265 points.

In bareback riding, Tanner Phipps and Colt Kitaif got the weekend off to a good start, splitting first and second with scores of 79 in the first go. Phipps would go on to earn second place (77) in the short go and first in average (156) while Kitaif placed fourth in the short go (68) and average (147). Tyler Waltz also earned points in the event, finishing third in average (150) after splitting third and fourth in the first go (74) and placing third in the short go (76).

Clark Adcock performed well in calf roping, finishing in second place (19.8 average) after besting all cowboys in the first go (9.6) and splitting fourth and fifth in the short go (10.2). John Alley placed fifth in average (21.0) after splitting fifth and sixth in the first go (10.8) and splitting fourth and fifth in the short go (10.2).

Three UT Martin cowboys enjoyed success in steer wrestling. Alley led the way with a first place showing in average (9.8) after times of 4.9 in both the first go (third) and in the short go (second). Will Lummus (4.6 in first go, second place) and Clay Brewer (5.3 in first go, fourth) also garnered points in the event.

Micayla Gray came on strong late in goat tying, placing fifth in the short go with a 7.8 while splitting fifth and sixth in average with a 15.3.

The UT Martin duo of Ben Walker and Zach Mabry excelled in team roping, finishing in second in average (12.0) after splitting second and third in the short go (5.3) in the first round and placing second in the short go (6.7). Clay Brewer and Greg Sullivan also pieced together a pair of solid performances, splitting sixth place with a 16.1 average.

UT Martin boasted the top two finishers in barrel racing. Nealey Dalton swept first place in the first go (13.52), the short go (13.46) and average (26.98). Right behind her was Dacia Horne, who placed second in the first go (13.59), split second and third in the short go (13.66) and second in average (27.25).



In bull riding, Jerry Rogers concluded a strong rodeo with a first place finish in average (152) after splitting first and second in the first go (74) and claiming top honors in the short go (78).

"We had another amazing rodeo this year!" commented Coach Luthi. "We were fortunate to have fantastic crowds, super stock, lots of great help, and wonderful weather that resulted in three really good performances. On top of that, our men's team won our home rodeo. We have a lot to be thankful for."

Reeca Cooper was deservedly awarded the "Honorary Team Captain" buckle for all her support for the rodeo team over the years. This year had two outstanding inductees into the Rodeo Hall of Fame, Tara Knepper Hallum and Robbie Phillips.

The rodeo team is proud to spotlight David Stone in this newsletter. David graduated from UT Martin in 2008 with a double major in Business Management and Accounting with an impressive 3.87 grade point average.

He came to UT Martin as a walk-on rodeo team member and competed in the calf roping and steer wrestling. David revealed, "I had a love for horses and rodeo growing up but never had a place to rope or practice. I taught myself to rope and won the 4H state calf roping as a junior in high school." He also remembers the help graduate assistant rodeo coach Zach Danison gave him while at UT Martin. "Zach would meet me at 6:00 in the morning to have one-on-one time. He was instrumental in helping me improve in the rodeo arena".

He also recalls how the Dowdy's family took him under their wing and he became part of their family while in college. "They made sure I got extra time to practice in their arena", reminiscences Stone. "Dwayne started my love for steer wrestling as well."

Coach Luthi remembers David as a hard worker in and out of the arena. "I'm not surprised at all by the success he has had", comments Luthi. "I'm very thankful David and Morgan are back in Martin and are involved in helping so many kids on the team. They are both great role models for our rodeo team!"

During his junior year of college David married his high school sweet heart, Morgan. After graduation they moved to Nashville for 2 years while he worked as an accountant at Cummins Diesel. The city life of Nashville wasn't for them, so they moved to Dickson and lived in a bunkhouse of a barn and commuted into Nashville. The horse trainer they lived with competed in AQHA shows and really helped David improve his horsemanship skills and refine the art of roping. Here are some of the results:


Soon their love for Martin and Morgan's job as a Nurse Practitioner in Martin moved them back "home" in September 2010.
