## **YHAWK**

The University of Tennessee at Martin women's soccer program has called Skyhawk Field its home since 1998. It is a 120x75 Bermuda pitch with a press box and permanent seating for over 500 fans along the west sideline. Fans also circle the field with trucks, lawn chairs and couches to create a festive atmosphere that is intimidating to opponents.

On Nov. 4, 2012, UT Martin provided a bit of history against Austin Peay in the OVC Tournament Championship. In that match, the raucous crowd of 773 fans cheered on the Skyhawks to a thrilling 2-0 victory passing the program's all-time record for single-game attendance. In fact, five of the Skyhawks nine home games ranked amongst the top crowds in Skyhawk Field history.
Prior to the 2012 season, Skyhawk Field saw the

addition of field lights making conditions appropriate for night markhes. The first match played under the lights was on Aug. 17, 2012, against Southeastern Conference power Vanderbilt. Although the Skyhawks dropped the match 2-0, the night marked the first of three night games for the Skyhawks in 2012 in addition to hosting the 2012 Ohio Valley Conference





In the summer of 2010, Skyhawk Field received a massive facelift. New colorful wind screens were also added to give the field a professional exterior look, and new brick barriers were also built around both benches. Another new feature added are a pair of large tents that have been placed over the two adjacent sets of bleachers that sandwich the main bleachers. This provides a comfortable, shady climate for fans of all ages to enjoy.

The first match played at Skyhawk Field, was on Sept. 4, 1998, against Ohio Valley Conference foe Tennessee Tech. Although the Skyhawks dropped a tough 1-0 decision in that match, they came roaring back for the first home win in program history on their next try - a 2-1 win over OVC opponent

Morehead State on Sept. 12, 1998. Over the years, the Skyhawks have put together a 71-50-6 record while playing in front of the home crowd. However, UT Martin has enjoyed a tremendous home-field advantage over the last several seasons. Since 2002, the Skyhawks are 66-23-7 in matches played at Skyhawk Field, having lost only nine

matches on their home turf in the last six seasons. In that dominant decade, UT Martin has posted a winning home record in all but one season, while only losing five times in its last 26 conference matches.

In 2009, the Skyhawks matched the best home start to any season by beginning the year 6-0-0, and ended the season with the highest single-season home winning percentage (.857) in program history. The 2010 squad followed that with a five-match home winning streak, which included shutouts in all five matches and conference wins over Austin Peay, Jacksonville State and Tennessee Tech.

Skyhawk Field has also been home to the PUMA Skyhawk Invitational from 2002-2007 and 2009, as well as the first round of the Ohio Valley Conference Tournament in 1999, 2003, 2008 and hosted the 2012 Tournament in its' entirety.



Take Exit 108 North (Parker's Crossroads) to Highway 22. Follow Highway 22 to Martin. Exit onto Skyhawk Parkway and turn right at the first traffic light onto University Street. Make a right at the first traffic light onto Mt. Pelia Drive, then turn onto Pat Head Summitt Drive. Skyhawk Field is located off of Pat Head Summitt Drive.

#### From I-40 East (Memphis, Tenn.)



The University of Tennessee at Martin soccer program has grown into one of the top programs in Ohio Valley Conference history behind the work of head coach Phil McNamara, who enters his fifth season at the helm after being named UT Martin's fourth head coach on March 23, 2010

McNamara has continued to build an impressive resume throughout his time at UT Martin as he led the Skyhawks to a piece of conference history in 2013. The Skyhawks picked up their fourth consecutive OVC title, including two regular season and tournament championships, after rattling off an 8-2 record in conference play to win their second consecutive season crown. The Skyhawks became the first team in conference history to pull off such a streak.

The Skyhawks saw five players take home six OVC awards, highlighted by three All-OVC first

team selections for Mariah Klenke, Aoife Lennon and Hannah Fessenden while Alyssa Curtis earned second team honors. Lennon was joined by classmate Ellie Myrick as All-Newcomer selections.

second team honors. Lennon was joined by classmate Ellie Myrick as All-Newcomer selections. Three players took home All-Tournament honors as Lennon and Fessenden both joined Lucy Pater. As a whole, six Skyhawks took home either All-OVC or All-OVC Tournament accolades in 2013. One year after McNamara took the Skyhawks to the NCAA Tournament for the first time in program history, he posted arguably the best season in school history in 2012. UT Martin captured its first outright Ohio Valley Conference regular season championship on its way to a new program record for single-season winning percentage (.659, 13-6-3). In the NCAA Tournament, the Skyhawks pushed Southeastern Conference power Kentucky to the limit before a narrow 1-0 loss in overtime. For his efforts, McNamara garnered 2012 OVC Coach of the Year honors. He also presided over five players who were All-OVC performers, including Saphyra Coombs-James - the program's first-ever OVC Freshman of the Year. All in all, eight of McNamara's players earned All-OVC or All-OVC Tournament accolades in 2012.

McNamara's second season at UT Martin was a banner year, as the Skyhawks captured their first-ever OVC Tournament championship in 2011. UT Martin won a program-record six straight games from Oct. 21 through Nov. 6 on its way to a school record for victories (14) before falling to then-undefeated Memphis in its first NCAA Tournament match in school history. The Skyhawks boasted four players on the All-OVC team, including Melissa Govea (the league's Defensive Player of the Year) and Brooke Robertson (the fourth player in program history to achieve All-OVC first team status in two different seasons).

In his debut season as Skyhawk skipper, McNamara guided UT Martin to an 8-8-2 record and 3-4-1 OVC slate. The Skyhawks began to click midway through the schedule, winning seven of nine games during one stretch. UT Martin also continued its home dominance under McNamara, putting together a five-match win streak and going unbeaten for a 58-day span, falling only in the home opener and finale in 2010. The stingy Skyhawk defense also excelled under McNamara, as the team tied an all-time single-season record with eight shutouts.

McNamara came to UT Martin from Carson-Newman College in Jefferson City, Tenn., where he led the Eagles to the NCAA Division II championship tournament in each of his last seven years. His teams advanced to the NCAA Final Four in back-to-back years in 2004-05 and won five regular

season league titles and four South Atlantic Conference tournaments. During his eight-year tenure at Carson-Newman, he picked up the South Atlantic Conference Coach of the Year honor four times.

At Carson-Newman, McNamara's teams were consistently ranked, as his players garnered several top honors throughout his tenure. All in all, he coached 43 all-conference players, 22 all-region players, four All-SAC Tournament members, four All-SAC tournament MVP's, four All-Americans (including the first in Carson Newman history), four All-NCAA Tournament team players, three SAC Players of the Year and two SAC Freshmen of the Year. In addition to coaching the program's first-ever national All-American, he also guided the Eagles to the program's first-ever NCAA Tournament appearance and NCAA Tournament victories. Four players also earned national or regional academic All-American awards under his watch.

McNamara's 2009 Carson-Newman team was the best in school history, as they set a single-season record for most wins (20). They

McNamara won 11 games or more every year for the past eight years at Carson-Newman, a tremendous feat considering the Eagles had never won more than 11 games in any one season in its first 11 years of playing soccer prior to McNamara's hiring.

Before Carson-Newman, McNamara served two seasons at Virginia Intermont in Bristol, Va.. He posted a 17-12 record and he led the team to both conference and regional championships. He was named conference and regional coach of the year. He spent the 2001 season as head coach of both the men's and women's programs. The men were ranked 18th in the nation.

McNamara also served as an assistant coach for both the men's and women's programs at his alma mater. King College in Bristol, Tenn.

McNamara has three European coaching licenses and has served as a youth coach for the Irish Football Association (IFA) in Belfast, Northern Ireland. As a player, he was a YTS trainee with Ashton Villa FC in England for two years, and spent one season with the Carrickfergus Rangers FC in the Irish First Division. He was a member of the Cliftonville FC in the Irish Premier League for four years before ending his playing career in the United States, spending one season playing indoor soccer with the Huntsville Fire of the Premier League and two years with the Roanoke Wraft of the PDL D-2 League.

McNamara is married to the former Jacqueline Logue of Belfast, Northern

Ireland, and has two children, Halina and Anthony.



## Assistant Head Coach Leslie Gillies

Leslie Gillies begins her first season as assistant head coach after serving as a full-time assistant coach at the University of Tennessee at Martin since 2010.

Gillies has been instrumental in building an impressive resume throughout her time at UT Martin as she led the Skyhawks to a piece of conference history in 2013. The Skyhawks picked up their fourth consecutive OVC title, including two regular season and tournament championships, after rattling off an 8-2 record in conference play to win their second consecutive season crown. The Skyhawks became the first team in conference history to pull off such a streak.

The Skyhawks saw five players take home six OVC awards, highlighted by three All-OVC first team selections for Mariah Klenke, Aoife Lennon and Hannah Fessenden while Alyssa Curtis earned second team honors. Lennon was joined by classmate Ellie Myrick as All-Newcomer selections. Three players took home All-Tournament honors as Lennon and Fessenden both joined Lucy Pater. As a whole, six Skyhawks took home either All-OVC or All-OVC Tournament accolades in 2013.

In 2012, Gillies was part of arguably the best season in Skyhawk soccer history. UT Martin cruised through its first-ever Ohio Valley Conference regular season championship on its way to a 13-6-3 overall record. For the second straight season, UT Martin advanced to the NCAA Tournament, where it battled against Southeastern Conference power Kentucky before falling 1-0 in overtime. The Skyhawks' .659 season winning percentage ranks first in school history.

Gillies guided eight Skyhawks to either All-OVC or All-OVC Tournament honors in 2012.

That list includes Saphyra Coombs-James (OVC Freshman of the Year, All-OVC first team, All-OVC Newcomer), Mariah Klenke (All-OVC first team, All-OVC Tournament team, OVC Tournament MVP), Ashley Reveiz (All-OVC first team, All-OVC Newcomer), Hannah McGowen (All-OVC first team), Alyssa Curtis (All-OVC second team), Lucy Pater (All-OVC Tournament team), Amy Maksimowicz (All-OVC Tournament team) and Mary Thompson (All-OVC Tournament team).

In 2011, Gillies helped guide the Skyhawks to their first-ever NCAA Tournament appearance, as a result of winning the OVC Tournament championship. She presided over a squad that shattered the program record for matches played (23), victories (14), highest winning percentage (.652), longest winning streak (six), points (120), assists (34) and shots (383).

Gillies coached four All-OVC performers in 2011, led by OVC Defensive Player of the Year Melissa Govea. Both Govea and Brooke Robertson notched all-league first team accolades, while Amy Maksimowicz and Midori Sera were named the

All-OVC Newcomer squad.

In 2010, Gillies and the Skyhawks found their groove at the midpoint of the season, as UT Martin produced victories in seven of nine matches during one spurt in the schedule. She also oversaw a defense that grinded out eight shutouts, which tied a single-season UT Martin program record.

Also, Gillies coached Rosaelia Loza and Sam Dunn, who earned All-OVC second

team and All-Newcomer accolades under Gillies' tutelage in 2011.

Prior to UT Martin, Gillies spent three seasons as an assistant coach to current Skyhawk head coach Phil McNamara at Carson-Newman, helping the Eagles to a 40-14-2 record (including a school-record 20 wins in 2009), three consecutive NCAA Division-II Tournament appearances and two South Atlantic Conference regular-season and tournament titles.

At Carson-Newman, Gillies was responsible for the organization of practices, ongoing recruitment, workouts, administrative duties such as travel and scheduling, player development and team preparation, among other things.

Not only did Gillies coach with McNamara at Carson-Newman, she also finished out her collegiate playing career for him from 2004 through 2006 before graduating

with a bachelor's degree in applied psychology in 2007.

In those three seasons, Gillies led the team to a 53-10-3 record, including an 18-3 conference slate. A forward and outside midfielder, she led the team to back-to-back NCAA Division-II Tournament Final Fours, as well as two regular-season SAC titles and two SAC Tournament titles. Perhaps the most impressive feat is that as a player, she was part of the three most winningest seasons in Carson-Newman history at that point in time, including a then-school-record 19 wins in 2004.

Before playing at Carson-Newman, Gillies spent two seasons playing in Conference-USA for head coach Paul Harbin at the University of Alabama at Birmingham. As a true freshman, she logged 203 minutes and scored her first career point on an assist against Jackson State on Oct. 25, 2002. The next season, she saw limited action because of an injury. In her two years at UAB, the Blazers went 22-14-2 with a 13-7 league record.

A Marietta, Ga. native, Gillies was a four-year letterwinner at Sprayberry High School, where she was an all-star selection

A Marietta, Ga. native, Gillies was a four-year letterwinner at Sprayberry High School, where she was an all-star selection in the state of Georgia. She scored 56 goals - including a team-high 21 her junior season - in her career and led the Yellow Jackets to a state 5A quarterfinalist berth in 2001, as well as a 6AAAA Sub-Region championship and pair of 6AAAA Sub-Region runner-up appearances.

Leslie recently married Chris Gillies in November 2012. The couple resides in Martin.





## Graduate Assistant Jana Horvat



Jana Horvat joins the Skyhawk soccer team as a graduate assistant for the 2014 season. She will primarily work with the goalkeepers.

Horvat was a standout at Bethel University, a neighboring NAIA program in McKenzie, Tenn. While playing for the Wildcats she was named a TranSouth Conference Scholar-Athlete in 2011.

Horvat originally signed with the Skyhawks in 2011 along with current player Dominika Conc. She also played on the Slovenian senior national team, serving as team captain on the Slovenian U19 squad. Prepping under coaches Boris Devetak, Bostjan Zlobko, Petra Mikeln and Darko Zizek, Horvat also led the Krka FC club squad to a national championship with Conc. She has made two UEFA appearances and attended Gimnazija Novo Mesto High School in Lower Carniola, Slovenia.

#### TRAINER KATHERINE MAUK



Katherine Malik enters her seventh season as an assistant athletic trainer at The University of Tennessee at Martin. She serves as the primary athletic trainer for the Skyhawk soccer and softball teams, while also assisting with day-to-day operations with all other UT Martin sports teams.

Malik came to the Skyhawk Sports Medicine staff from Birmingham Southern where she was

also an assistant athletic trainer, working primarily with the women's soccer, women's basketball, softball and lacrosse teams.





## SEASON PREVIEW

Success has come in bunches the past several years for the University of Tennessee at Martin women's soccer team dating back to the hiring of head coach Phil McNamara, who enters his fifth season at the helm of the Skyhawks.

Coach McNamara preaches to his players that current success is not to be based off previous years' accomplishments, but the accolades have been bountiful when it comes to the Skyhawk soccer program since 2011. McNamara and the Skyhawks began their string of championship performances with the program's first Ohio Valley Conference Tournament championship in 2011, initiating the first of an OVC record four consecutive championships – including two regular season and tournament crowns.

"I tell the girls that there is no point in comparing our team to previous years, it's all about this year," said McNamara. "We can only be the best that we can be this year, with this group of players. For me, I think there is huge potential here. I really like the spirit of the group, the work ethic is outstanding, the fitness levels are higher than we have had and I think we have a couple higher impact players than we've had in years past. On paper, I think we are better at this stage than we were last year, but until we start playing games and winning games, only time will tell."

With such storied success in the past five years, the Skyhawks will look to the next group of seniors to carry the torch in the 2014 campaign after the loss of five seniors

to graduation. The void left by seniors Hannah McGowen, Sarah Tompkins, Jessica Horvatich, Hannah Fessenden and Abi Sanvee along with All-OVC first team selection Aoife Lennon will have to be filled by the eight-member senior class. The class which includes Amy Maksimowicz, Lucy Pater, Alyssa Curtis, Sam Dunn, Mariah Klenke, Ashley Reveiz, Ashlie Watson and Dominika Conc has won 38 games over the course of the previous three seasons, a program record.

"It's a good size class and they have been extremely important for us in the past," said McNamara. "It's a class which has done well for themselves and for the program. We are very proud of this group and it still stings that we lost in the final last year, at home, and I think that these seniors want to put the record straight by coming out strong this year."

With such a strong senior class to anchor the Skyhawk squad, the addition of key newcomers could infuse a veteran squad with youth and ability. Seven newcomers grace the Skyhawk squad, including three international players with decorated careers and two Tennessee natives. Look for junior transfer Rianna Jarrett who played for the Republic of Ireland, scoring seven goals in UEFA international play, to make an immediate impact.

"I think that the majority of the new players will find a way to be plugged in right away," said McNamara. "I think that there are a couple of them that will make a big conference impact. That's exciting considering how young they are and new they are to the college level. I think it complements our group of seniors while filling a couple positions that we needed to fill. We feel like we are pretty well balanced."

The Skyhawks will look to their defense once again to be an incredible strength. While the back four has been dominant in years past, the play of Klenke – the Skyhawk goalkeeper - has been record setting. She continues to rewrite the UT Martin record book, ranking amongst the career leaders in multiple categories. Her seven shutouts last season not only led the league but tied for the program's single season shutout mark. She currently ranks in the top five in 11 statistical categories while ranking first in career shutouts (15), career victories (31) and single season victories by goalkeeper (12 in 2012). She tallied five or more saves on eight occasions and tallied a 0.96 goals against average last season.

"In the women's game, much of your success is on the quality of your goalkeeper

and strikers," stated McNamara. "The longer I'm in this game I realize the importance of a quality goalkeeper. Mariah has had an immense career at UT Martin. I think she smashes all the records this fall, and that record will be very difficult to ever break going forward."

Klenke will rely heavily on the play of the back four defensive unit to relieve the pressure. Maksimowicz and Pater, a pair of senior defenders, proved to be a defensive power in the backfield for the Skyhawks yet again, starting in all 21 matches last season. Both helped lead a Skyhawk defensive line which produced eight shutout performances, including a stretch which saw opponents score just two goals over the course of seven matches. The defensive unit came up especially tight in overtime, holding their opponents scoreless in seven overtime periods. Look for Eva Heller, Temple Hughs, Deborah Schaudt, Taylor Fry and Kaci Mitchell to see action in the back.

"The quality of play that Amy brings, along with the leadership that Lucy brings and the quality of her play, presents a back four which will be very difficult to beat," said McNamara. "We will have two new players in there this year who I think are quality players. We have to balance the youth of the back four, with the experience, by splitting the seniors. I think it is going to be the foundation of our success this year."

The midfield unit will be led by the play of seniors Curtis and Conc. The duo both tallied eight points each last season, with

Curtis notching four goals while Conc scored tallied two game-winners for the Skyhawks. The pair played and started in all 21 games last season while Curtis transitions from striker to midfielder. Look for Abby Masters, Jaclyn Heckle, Ashley Reveiz and Sam Dunn to see time at the position as well.

"I think the midfield area is certainly full of possibilities," said McNamara. "Alyssa will play primarily in the center-mid for us this year, along with Dominika. I think the third spot is certainly up for grabs. There is some new potential for new players, but we also have returners like Jaclyn and Abby who have both came in strong for us this year."

The Skyhawk strikers are a position with a lot potential for the upcoming season. Highlighted by sophomores Saphyra Coombs-James and Ellie Myrick, the strikers are looking to become a force in the attack game. After sitting out the entire 2013 season due to injury, Coombs-James is primed for a big year after being named the OVC's Freshman of the Year in 2012. Myrick proved to be a dynamic player for the Skyhawks as a freshman, earning OVC All-Newcomer honors. She saw action in all 21 games, earning 15 starts along with scoring three goals and tallying three assists for nine points. Along with the sophomore pair, look for Watson, Heller and Olivia Bohlman to provide depth at the position.

"There is no question that we are going to be a major force going forward this year in comparison to any year that I have been here at UT Martin," stated McNamara. "I have a lot of confidence in the five or six players that can play at those positions this year. If they can get off to a quick start and build confidence early against good level teams, I think they can have good individual years which gives us the foundation for a record year."

UT Martin will begin the 2014 slate against Atlantic-10 foe Saint Louis under the lights on Friday, Aug. 22 before returning to action just two days later in a non-conference matchup against OVC rival Southeast Missouri on Sunday, Aug. 24. The Skyhawks will continue their four game homestand to open the season with another pair of home matches against Missouri Valley Conference foes Indiana State on Sunday, Aug. 31 and Evansville on Wednesday, Sept. 3.

"I like the fact that, including our exhibition, that we have five home games to start the season especially with the amount of new players we have coming in," said McNamara. "We visit some big name programs including some of the best college soccer facilities in the country. It all provides the opportunity for our players to learn and become the best team possible before our conference season begins. Once we hit the road, the schedule gets pretty brutal. Our schedule should give us a good idea of how good we can be heading into OVC play."

UT Martin will then leave the friendly confines of Skyhawk Field as they hit the road for a decisive six game road swing beginning at national powerhouse Missouri on Sunday, Sept. 7. The Skyhawks will then travel to Tulsa on Friday, Sept. 12 before making the trip to Big 12 foe Oklahoma State on Sunday, Sept. 14. From there the Skyhawks will travel east for a pair of games, opening at Kennesaw State on Friday, Sept. 19 before making the short trek to Georgia State on Sunday, Sept. 21.

"We could honestly be 30-40 percent better this year, but our results and record may not show it," said McNamara. "The conference teams are not going to know exactly how good we are until we start OVC play because of how difficult our non-conference schedule is. We start out with four home games against similar high caliber opponents, and every game is going to be a dog fight, but also a way to prove ourselves and get better for conference."

The defending OVC champions will cut their teeth on the road to open the conference slate with a trip to Jacksonville State on Friday, Sept. 26 before returning home to host Tennessee Tech on Sunday, Sept. 28. UT Martin will then alternate home and away the next two weekends, traveling to Southeast Missouri on Friday, Oct. 3 before making a stop at

SIU Edwardsville on Sunday, Oct. 5. The Skyhawks will complete the home portion of the split when they play host to Eastern Kentucky on Friday, Oct. 10 before playing defending OVC Tournament champion Morehead State on Sunday, Oct. 12.

The Skyhawks will hit the road for their final road swing of the season when they travel to Eastern Illinois on Sunday, Oct. 19 before closing out the road slate at Belmont on Friday, Oct. 24. UT Martin will conclude the regular season with back-to-back home matches against OVC foes. The Skyhawks will play host to Austin Peay on Sunday, Oct. 26 before wrapping up the regular season against OVC rival Murray State on Friday, Oct. 31.

"I think we know the conference pretty well at this point," said McNamara. "There will be several similar teams at the top, like in years past. The new coaches coming in certainly bring a new level of urgency and energy into their programs, so there are no teams on the schedule that you can circle a guarantee win. You're going to have to go into every game ready to compete, work hard and earn the right to win games in this league. We hope that we can compete in the non-conference segment and get ready for conference play."

As the balance begins to come into focus and the competition cranks up, look for the Skyhawks to look forward for future success rather in the rear view mirror at the shadow left behind in their quest for yet another OVC crown.

## SEASON RECAP

With a solid foundation erected for the past two season, the 2013 version of Skyhawks continued to build upon that strength and take the program to new levels which has never been seen before in Ohio Valley Conference soccer history.

Fresh off back-to-back trips to the NCAA Tournament following OVC Tournament championships, the Skyhawks went into the season as the early favorites to repeat as champions. What was predicted of the Skyhawks was a piece of history. Heading into the season, the Skyhawks under the direction some of the top power conferences in the country.

The Skyhawks took the schedule and welcomed Big 12 power Oklahoma State to Skyhawk Field for the regular season home opener, battling with the Cowgirls for 84 minutes before allowing the lone goal of the evening in the 85th minute to fall to the visiting foes. With minimal time to regroup, the Skyhawks turned to new Conference USA foe Middle Tennessee. Junior goalkeeper Mariah Klenke and the Skyhawk defense would flex their muscles in the contests, saving nine

Pac-12 foe Colorado. The Skyhawks held with their nationally ranked opponent before surrendering the deciding goal in the 71st minute in a 1-0 decision. The next game saw a showdown against Colorado which had the Skyhawks jump out to an early advantage off the leg of senior Hannah McGowen before an aggressive Buffaloes' squad tallied 30 shot attempts and ultimately won with a 4-1 advantage.

A quick pit stop at Skyhawk Field had the Skyhawks playing host to Georgia State before hitting the pavement for yet another four



of Phil McNamara had won the last three straight championships handed out by the OVC. Another regular season championship would stretch that streak to four consecutive championships, a mark which has never been done before in the OVC's storied 65 year history.

Going into the season, McNamara knew that he would have to prepare his squad for the daunting grind of the conference slate. With that in mind, the Skyhawks would put together a non-conference schedule which would face schools from shot attempts and preserving a shutout for a scoreless tie.

The next contest saw the Skyhawks hit the road for the first time, traveling to Evansville for the first game of a four game road swing. After faltering at Evansville, the Skyhawks notched their first win of the season at Lipscomb with a 2-0 decision.

After a quick luggage exchange, the Skyhawks were back on the road and flying to nationally ranked No. 20 Denver for a weekend showdown against the hosts and game road swing and the start of conference play. The Skyhawks would against Georgia State and Indiana State before wrapping up non-conference play with a 2-6-1 record following a victory at Saint Louis.

Conference play would being on Sept. 27 with a trip to perennial challenger Austin Peay, where the Lady Govs would get the best of the Skyhawks in the conference opener with a 2-1 victory.

Following the loss to Austin Peay, the Skyhawks would put



their play in overdrive, ripping off a season best seven game winning streak at the hands of Murray State, Jacksonville State, Morehead State, Eastern Kentucky, Tennessee Tech, Belmont and Eastern Illinois. During the span, the Skyhawks picked up their road sweep of Morehead State and Eastern Kentucky with backto-back shutouts, outscoring their rivals 4-0. The decisive 3-0 victory over Morehead State also marked career victory 200 for McNamara.

With just one matches to play in the regular season, the Skyhawks early season record was far in the rearview mirror. Sitting with just two victories in their first nine contests, the Skyhawks went into the final home match with a record of 9-8-1 and only Southeast Missouri left on the slate.

Holding onto a one game lead in the league standing over Southeast Missouri going into the final game, the Skyhawks need just a victory or tie over the Redhawks to make OVC history. Pregame festivities saw the Skyhawks pay tribute to their five seniors as McGowen, Sarah Tompkins, Abi Sanvee, and Iessica Horvatich Fessenden were announced in their final regular season match. The five

seniors combined for 29 goals, 27 assists and 46 wins over the course of their standout careers.

Regulation would not be enough for the heavyweight match as the eventual game winning goal came in the 102nd minute as Sanvee capped off Senior Night with a goal past the keeper and sealed UT Martin the regular season crown and the

right to host the OVC Tournament. With the championship, the Skyhawks owned a piece of history by winning their fourth consecutive OVC championships – including two regular season and tournament championships.

Less than a week after the Skyhawks notched its second consecutive season championship, five players were honored at the conference's annual postseason award banguet. Klenke, Fessenden and freshman Aoife Lennon each earned All-OVC first team honors while junior Alyssa Curtis earned second team accolades. Lennon joined classmate Ellie Myrick as All-Newcomer selections. Amongst the individual accolades the Skyhawks were awarded the 2013 OVC Championship trophy.

With the championship under their belt, and the right to host the OVC Tournament, the Skyhawks were in prime position to defend yet another crown. Before punching their ticket for the title match, the Skyhawks had to get past No. 4 seed SIUE who had just knocked off the hosts the week before on their home field. For the second consecutive match, the Skyhawks would need overtime before a goal from Lennon in the 95th minute sealed the Skyhawks third consecutive trip to the tournament finals with a 2-1



victory.

With the championship set between No. 1 seed UT Martin and No. 2 seed Morehead State on the bracket, the league's top two teams would face off for the league's automatic berth to the NCAA Tournament and a rematch of the 2011 OVC Championship.

Both teams would struggle to get anything going on the offensive end of the field in the first half, going into the break scoreless. Morehead State would come out of the halftime break as the aggressors, find the day's only goal just 48 seconds into the second half. Despite outshooting Morehead State in the game, the Skyhawks could never find the equalizer in the final 44 minutes of the match, ultimately dropping the match 1-0.

With the loss in the OVC Tournament finals, the Skyhawks finished a decorated 2013 season with a regular season championship and a record of 11-9-1 (8-2 OVC). Sanvee led the team with five goals and 11 points on the season, including four game winning goals, while Lennon and Curtis tied for second on the team with four goals each. Myrick led the team with three assists. Klenke tallied a 9-9-1 record, 0.96 goals against average, 90 saves and 18 goals allowed in 1687:18 minutes of play.

MARTIN, Tenn. – For the second consecutive year, the University of Tennessee at Martin women's soccer team clinched an Ohio Valley Conference championship after defeating Southeast Missouri, 1-0 in double overtime. On a night in which five Skyhawk seniors were recognized, it was senior Abi Sanvee who lifted the home team to its second OVC season championship in as many years with a double-overtime golden goal.

With the victory, the Skyhawks (10-8-1, 8-2 OVC) not only secured the right to host next week's OVC Tournament on Nov. 7-10, but sealed their place in conference history. UT Martin has now won four consecutive OVC titles, including two season and tournament crowns each, marking the first time in conference history that a team has accomplished such a feat.

The Skyhawks outshot the visiting Redhawks 39-6 on the evening before Sanvee's final shot of the evening proved to be the game's deciding goal. Freshman Aoife Lennon led the aggressive Skyhawks with nine shots on the evening, including three shots placed on goal.

Defensively, UT Martin pitched its eighth shutout of the season and fifth of the conference slate. Ignoring the offensive statistics of the game, it was the Skyhawk defensive line of Lucy Pater, Amy Maksimowicz, Hannah Fessenden and Jessica Horvatich which dominated the game. The defensive quartet held a Southeast Missouri offense which tallied four goals in its last game, to just six total shots on the night and more importantly, two shots on goal.

In goal it was junior Mariah Klenke who continued to impress, notching her seven shutout of the season. Already ranking amongst the leaders in nearly every statistical category as a goalkeeper, Klenke tallied two saves on the evening in 110 minutes of action.

Southeast Missouri (8-6-3, 6-2-2 OVC) would look to Storm French to pace the Redhawks with two shots on the night, both of which on goal. The Skyhawks (11-8-1, 8-2 OVC) used key performances from all three All-OVC first team honorees as senior Hannah Fessenden and freshman Aoife Lennon gave the host all the offense that they would need to avenge a late season defeat at the hands of the visiting Cougars just two weeks before. Lennon, Alyssa Curtis, Ellie Myrick and Abi Sanvee led the team with three shot attempts each while Lennon and Myrick each tallied two shots on goal each.

All-OVC goalkeeper Mariah Klenke tallied four saves in tonight's match. Klenke allowed just one goal in over 94 minutes of play.

Goalkeeper Elizabeth Floyd was perfect between the posts, tallying seven saves on the afternoon while shutting out the Skyhawks.

With the loss, five Skyhawk seniors place the final stamp on their decorated careers. 

# PROGRAM TIMELINE

1998

After guiding the UT Martin women's soccer club team, Dr. Ruth Holden was hired to field the first intercollegiate squad. Holden retained 10 players from the club team and added eight true freshmen to form the first Skyhawk squad. The inaugural edition of Skyhawk soccer picked up its first victory in the third match of the season over Morehead State 2-1. UT Martin finished its first season 2-15 overall and 1-3 in the Ohio Valley Conference. Kim Thompson set a school record with four goals Oct. 7 against North Alabama.

1999

In its second year UT Martin managed only one win, defeating Chattanooga 2-1 Oct. 22. The 1999 campaign would be the final season for head coach Dr. Ruth Holden, who ended with a 3-34 overall record and 1-8 OVC record at UT Martin. Jane Carroll stopped a school record 18 shots in goal Oct. 1 against Tennessee Tech. Kelli Armstrong led the Skyhawks with six goals in her only year on the team.

2000

Nathan Pifer was hired March 15, from Midwestern State University as the second head coach of the Skyhawks. Sherrie Weeks and Lydia Lloyd led the squad with two goals apiece as UT Martin suffered through an 0-18 season.

Pifer picked up his first win Sept. 23 in the seventh match of the season after defeating Arkansas Little-Rock 2-1. UT Martin played its first overtime match Oct. 9, falling 3-2 to Chattanooga.

2002

UT Martin posted its first winning season after going 9-7-3 overall and 4-3-2 in the OVC. The Skyhawks posted school records with five consecutive wins and earning five spots on the OVC All-Conference teams. The Skyhawks recorded a record 10 goals Oct. 11 against Morehead State. Dani to Myrick set a freshman and school record with 16 goals on the season.

2003

The Skyhawks record a second consecutive winning record and host their first post season match when Southeast Missouri fvisited Nov. 4 and defeated UT Martin 2-0. Katie Jackson tied Dani Myrick's single season record of 16 goals. For a second consecutive year, five Skyhawks earned OVC All-Conference recognition.

2004

2001

UT Martin goes 4-11-2 and misses the OVC tournament for the first time in three seasons. Freshman Katie Behrens netted three goals and earned the Skyhawks only spot on the all conference team.

2005

Dani Myrick concluded her Skyhawk career as the all-time leader in goals scored, shots and assists. UT Martin set Ohio Valley Conference records for goals-per-game with 2.32 and shots-per-game with 19.11. As a team UT Martin tallied nine wins for the third time in four years.

2006

Craig Roberts assumed the helm of the Skyhawk soccer program as the third head coach only four weeks prior to the season's start. The Skyhawks set a school record with six shutouts, including five consecutive conference shutouts. The Skyhawks returned to the OVC Tournament for the first time since 2003.

**2007** At the f

At the time, UT Martin had the winningest season in program history with a record 10 wins and advanced to the semi-finals of the OVC Tournament for the first time in program history. Katie Behrens and Jamie Price were both named to the All-Ohio Valley Conference Team while Behrens was also named UT Martin's Female Athlete of the Year.

2008

The Skyhawk program reached new heights in its third season under Roberts, tying or breaking 12 school records, including most victories in one season (10) and highest season winning percentage (.632). The Skyhawks advanced to its first OVC Tournament championship appearance, and had five OVC Player of the Week honorees, including four straight weekly mentions, a new program record.

200 The S

The Skyhawks won their first-ever Ohio Valley Conference regular-season championship, breaking or tying eight school records in the process. Danielle Rogers was one of six players to earn All-OVC mentions, as she was named the OVC Defensive Player of the Year - the first time a Skyhawk had taken that award home. UT Martin also tied a program record with five OVC Player of the Week honorees.

2010

In Phil McNamara's first season as head coach, the Skyhawks found their groove midway through the season, winning seven out of nine games during one stretch. UT Martin tied an all-time single-season program record with eight shutouts and produced a pair of All-OVC second team and All-Newcomer selections in Rosaelia Loza and Sam Dunn.

2011

UT Martin went where no other team in program history had gone - to the NCAA Tournament. The Skyhawks clinched their first-ever Ohio Valley Conference Tournament championship behind the foot of tournament MVP Lucy Pater, who netted the game-winning goal in the 76th minute against Morehead State. Behind All-OVC first team selections Melissa Govea (also the league's Defensive Player of the Year) and Brooke Robertson, the Skyhawks tallied a program-record 14 victories.

2012

UT Martin picked up where they left off in 2011, winning the program's first outright OVC championship and second straight OVC Tournament championship and NCAA Tournament qualifier. The Skyhawks placed five on the All-OVC first and second teams while Saphyra Coombs-James notched the program's first OVC Freshman of the Year award while Phil McNamara took home OVC Coach of the Year honors.

2013

UT Martin notched a feat never seen before in Ohio Valley Conference history after winning their fourth consecutive conference championship - including a pair of regular season and tournament championships. Mariah Klenke led a Skyhawks squad which saw five players take home postseason awards, including three All-OVC first team selections after tying the program's single season shutout mark with seven clean sheets on the season.




selected in the NBA Draft when he was drafted by the Boston Celtics in 2009.

A two-time Ohio Valley Conference Male Athlete of the Year, he led the UT Martin men's basketball team to its first-ever OVC regular season championship in 2008-09. The only player in NCAA Division-I history to accumulate a quadruple-double, he has suited up for the NBA's Boston Celtics (2009-10), Memphis Grizzlies (2009-10, 2011-12), Washington Wizards (2010-11) and Cleveland Cavaliers (2011-12) since graduating from UT Martin.



**Above:** Skyhawk junior pitcher Taylor "Bug" Cox was selected by the San Diego Padres in the 16th round of the 2014 MLB Draft. That marked the fourth straight season that a UT Martin baseball player had been chosen. Other selections include Trey Karlen (2011, 33rd round, Washington Nationals), Alec Mills (2012, 22nd round, Kansas City Royals) and Dan Tobik (2013, 39th round, Los Angeles Angels of Anaheim).



**Above:** Heather Butler became the first player in UT Martin and Ohio Valley Conference history to play in the WNBA after signing with the San Antonio Stars. She left the Skyhawks as the program and conference's all-time leading scorer with 2,865 career points, ranking 16th in NCAA history. Her 392 career 3-pointers tied the NCAA all-time record while scoring double figures in all 129 games of her career, ranking as the second longest streak in history.

**Above:** Head coach Phil McNamara and the UT Martin soccer team won its' second consecutive Ohio Valley Conference season championship in 2013. Overall, the Skyhawk soccer team won four consecutive championships handed out by the OVC with back-to-back OVC season and tournament titles from 2011-13.

Now in its 67th year, the Ohio Valley Conference continues to build on the success that has made it the nation's eighth-oldest NCAA Division I conference.

In May 2011 the Conference expanded for the second time in four years, adding Belmont University which began competition in the 2012-13 academic year. The addition of Belmont gave the OVC 12 members, the most the league has had at one time in its illustrious history. The move added a second team in the city of Nashville and was the first addition to the league since Southern Illinois University Edwardsville joined in 2008. Subsequently, the league has shown its stability over the past decade, seeing only one member institution depart over the past 14 years.

The 2009-10 school year saw a change in leadership as Beth DeBauche was named the seventh full-time Commissioner in league history on July 28, 2009. The last three commissioners of the OVC have moved onto jobs as the commissioner of the Big Ten, Big 12 and the Mid-American Conferences

The OVC's proud history dates back to 1948, but seeds for the new league were actually planted in 1941. It was then that Roy Stewart, the athletics director at Murray State, Charles "Turkey" Hughes, the athletics director at Eastern Kentucky, and Kelly Thompson, the public relations director at Western Kentucky, first broached the idea of forming a new conference. Discussions were put on hold by World War II, but reemerged Feb. 27-28, 1948 at the Kentucky Hotel in Louisville as the three original institutions combined with Morehead State, Louisville and Evansville to form the OVC.

In the 1950s, the OVC became a pioneer on a much more significant scale socially. During times of racial segregation, league member Morehead State became one of the first nontraditionally black mid-southern institutions to accept a black student. In 1958 Marshall Banks earned athletically-related aid at Morehead, which signed a second black athlete, Howard Murphy, a year later. In 1961 Murphy earned all-conference recognition as a halfback in football. With racial barriers broken, the rest of the institutions in the league began to provide educational and athletic opportunities to African-Americans.

After Title IX legislation passed in 1972, women's athletics began a rebirth on the national scene as the NCAA began sponsoring and marketing women's sports. Recognizing the need to provide increased opportunities for female athletes, the OVC began formulating plans for women's athletics in 1975 and established women's championships in the sports of basketball, tennis and track in 1977,

with cross country and volleyball added over the next four years. Those sports were initially governed by the Association of Intercollegiate Athletics for Women (AIAW), but the overall strength of women's programs in the league was demonstrated by the automatic bids the OVC instantly received when the NCAA became the governing body in 1982. The conference added women's golf and softball in 1994 and women's

Over its 66 years, OVC teams have garnered national championships and bowl games in football, along with national team or individual titles in the sports of rifle, cross country, track

The OVC has also produced several Olympic athletes, including Murray State's Morgan Hicks, who was a member of the 2004 United States Olympic Rifle Team and Morehead State's Brian Shimer who competed in five Winter Olympics in bobsled (winning a bronze medal in 2002) and coached the 2010 United States bobsled team to its first gold medal since 1948. Former Morehead State football and Eastern Kentucky track and field athlete Dallas Robinson competed with the U.S. bobsled team during the 2014 Sochi Winter Olympics. In addition, some of the greatest players in professional sports were educated at OVC institutions. The list includes former greats such as football's Phil Simms (Morehead State), basketball's Clem Haskins (Western Kentucky) and Bubba Wells (Austin Peay) and two-sport star Steve Hamilton (Morehead State) to presentday standouts like basketball player Kenneth Faried (Morehead State), football player Tony Romo (Eastern Illinois) and baseball players A.J Ellis (Austin Peay) and Shawn Kelley (Austin Peay). Hamilton is the only athlete to ever play in the NCAA Basketball Championship, a Major League Baseball World Series (New York Yankees) and a NBA Championship Series (Los Angeles Lakers).

The playing field is not the only place where OVC athletes are working hard. The league also recognizes excellence in the classroom. Six Scholar-Athlete Awards are presented yearly to male and female athletes, while others are commended for their academic success by being Medal of Honor recipients or earning a spot on the Commissioner's Honor Roll. Additionally, the league annually presents one institutional Academic Achievement Award, as well as separate team awards in each Conferencesponsored sport. Since the College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA) Academic All-America program began, the Ohio Valley Conference has had 229 student-athletes honored with the award, including 50 over the last five years (2009-10, 2010-11, 2011-12, 2012-13, 2013-14).

Through the early years of the league,

administrators wrestled with fan behavior due to the close proximity of the Conference members and the intense rivalries which developed. Just as it did decades ago, the OVC took the leadership role on what has become a national issue. In 1995, the OVC implemented a first-of-its-kind "Sportsmanship Statement," a policy which promotes principles of fair play, ethical conduct and respect for one's opponent. The statement has become a model for others to follow across the nation, and has answered the challenge of the NCAA Presidents Commission to improve sportsmanship in collegiate athletics.

Additionally, the OVC annually presents the Steve Hamilton Sportsmanship Award, in honor of the former Morehead State studentathlete, coach and athletics director, to a junior senior student-athlete with significant athletic contributions who best exemplifies the characteristics of sportsmanship and citizenship. Most recently, the Conference has also implemented the OVC Institutional and Team Sportsmanship Awards, which are presented to one institution and 18 sport-specific teams voted by their peers to have best exhibited the standards of sportsmanship and ethical conduct as outlined by the OVC and NCAA.

The vision of leadership demonstrated by the Founding Fathers in 1948 remains alive today as the Ohio Valley Conference prepares for the future. One example is in regard to the current trend in collegiate athletics administration for increased involvement of university presidents in setting policies and making rules. The presidents of OVC institutions, however, have always governed the Conference, long before presidential governance became a national theme.

The Ohio Valley Conference sponsors the following sports: baseball, basketball, cross country, football, golf, tennis and track for men, and basketball, cross country, golf, soccer, softball, tennis, track and volleyball for women. In addition, the OVC also sponsors the combined men's and women's sport of rifle.

Now in its seventh decade of competition, the Ohio Valley Conference has grown significantly from its humble beginnings while increasing the number of athletics opportunities it provides for students. Current league representatives include charter members Eastern Kentucky University, Morehead State University and Murray State University, along with Austin Peay State University, Belmont University, Eastern Illinois University, Jacksonville State University, Southeast Missouri State University, Southern Illinois University Edwardsville, Tennessee State University, Tennessee Technological University and the University of Tennessee at Martin. In addition Columbus State University serves as an affiliate member for the sport of rifle.



The Skyhawk Fieldhouse athletic training room was renovated in 2007 as part of a \$1.9 million dollar renovation of the entire Skyhawk Fieldhouse and Kathleen and Tom Elam Center. Included in the renovation was an updated whirlpool rehabilitation room where student-athletes can receive aqua rehabilitation and treatment. The athletic training room also contains multiple examination stations with the latest in rehabilitation equipment.

The athletic training staff uses a comprehensive approach to the injury care and wellness of student-athletes by utilizing state-of-the-art diagnostic and treatment equipment with the latest methods in the care and prevention of injuries.

Assistant Athletic Director Bart Belew is in his 13th year as head athletic trainer. Belew, a UT Martin graduate, went on to earn a master's degree and serve as a graduate assistant at Ole Miss where he worked with both the football and baseball programs before a stint at Freed-Hardeman led him to a return to his alma mater in 2000 as the head athletic trainer. He currently has a staff of four full-time certified athletic trainers and support staff of 16 athletic training students.

The athletic training staff is surrounded by many qualified and generous team doctors, through a partnership with Sports Orthopedic and Spine of Jackson, Tenn.. Dr. G. Bradford Wright, MD, and Dr. Steve Houseworth, MD, serve as the primary team physicians and are directly responsible for the orthopedic needs of UT Martin student-athletes. Dr. Wright has previously worked as team physician with the US Olympic Track & Field teams, West Tennessee Diamond Jaxx and Memphis Riverkings while Dr. Houseworth has served as a team physician for Louisiana Tech University.

Dr. Wright and Dr. Houseworth are also assisted in the care for Skyhawk student-athletes by the other orthopedic specialist of Sports Orthopedic and Spine; Dr. David E. Yakin, MD, Dr. Keith Nord, MD, Dr. Timothy Sweo, MD, and Dr. John P. Masterson, MD.

The athletic training staff is one support group that the athletic teams cannot do without. They are responsible for staffing all practices and games as well as handling the day-to-day rehabilitation of injured or post-surgery student-athletes.

# SKYHAWK STRENGTH & CONDITIONING

The UT Martin strength and conditioning facilities are for the exclusive use of Skyhawk student-athletes as they train for competition, under the direction of strength and conditioning coach Charles Rayburn.

Sport specific workouts are designed and supervised at all times by one or more members of the strength and conditioning staff. Each student-athlete is placed in to respective developmental levels according to individual ability and specific regiments are then prescribed and continuously changed based on individual aptitude.

The Skyhawk strength and conditioning philosophy is multifaceted with a primary emphasis on reducing injuries during the season.


The 3,500 square-foot Skyhawk weight room, located on the second level of Skyhawk Fieldhouse, includes Hammer Strength and Life Fitness machines and weights. This state-of-the-art facility is equipped with modern equipment ranging from self contained Power Lift multi-racks with 6x8 platforms, Olympic lifting bars, a complete line of rubber coated TGX dumbbells, a variety of glute/ham stations, a huge plyometric/medicine ball area, and various other supplemental pieces. The facility offers an unlimited variety of movements and exercises for the student-athlete.

The Skyhawk weight room allows for large enough groups so the student-athletes can train concurrently optimizing efficiency and effectiveness but, small enough to receive individual direction.



Freire brings 22 years of experience within intercollegiate athletics and educational settings to UT Martin. He most recently worked under athletics director Jim Livengood at the University of Nevada, Las Vegas as senior associate athletics director from 2010-13. Freire worked closely with university relations, department leadership, athletics development, external operations, athletic program administration and compliance while at the Mountain West Conference affiliate.

Prior to his time at UNLV, Freire spent time at the University of Arizona from 2007-10 as the assistant/associate athletics director for development under Livengood. Among Freire's accomplishments at the Pac-12 school were the increase of planned gifts by \$4.5 million and serving as the athletic program liaison for the highly successful football and men's basketball programs.

Freire also served at fellow OVC institution Tennessee Tech under athletics director Mark Wilson from 2005-07 as the associate athletics director for development. While in Cookeville, Freire was responsible for the cultivation and stewardship of major gift prospects and donors.





He increased annual donations by 300 percent and secured seven of the 10 largest gifts in department history.

Freire began his collegiate athletic administration career at Ohio University, where he served as an assistant/associate athletics director for development from 2000-04 under athletics director Thomas Boeh. During his time at the Mid-American Conference member, Freire managed all facets of facilities and game operations units, concession and merchandise contracts and also supervised the renovation and construction of numerous facilities.
