### SKYHAWK FIELD

THE UNIVERSITY OF TENNESSEE AT MARTIN WOMEN'S SOCCER PROGRAM HAS CALLED SKYHAWK FIELD ITS HOME SINCE 1998. IT

IS A 120X75 BERMUDA PITCH WITH A PRESS BOX AND PERMANENT SEATING FOR OVER 500 FANS ALONG THE WEST SIDELINE. FANS ALSO CIRCLE THE FIELD WITH TRUCKS, LAWN CHAIRS AND COUCHES TO CREATE A FESTIVE ATMOSPHERE THAT IS INTIMIDATING TO OPPONENTS.

ON NOV. 4, 2012, UT MARTIN PROVIDED A BIT OF HISTORY AGAINST AUSTIN PEAY IN THE OVC TOURNAMENT CHAMPIONSHIP. IN THAT MATCH, THE RAUCOUS CROWD OF 773 FANS CHEERED ON THE SKYHAWKS TO A THRILLING 2-O VICTORY - PASSING THE PROGRAM'S ALL-TIME RECORD FOR SINGLE-GAME ATTENDANCE. IN FACT, FIVE OF THE SKYHAWKS NINE HOME GAMES RANKED AMONGST THE TOP CROWDS IN SKYHAWK FIELD HISTORY.

PRIOR TO THE 2012 SEASON, SKYHAWK FIELD SAW THE ADDITION OF FIELD LIGHTS MAKING CONDITIONS APPROPRIATE FOR NIGHT MATCHES. THE FIRST MATCH PLAYED UNDER THE LIGHTS WAS ON AUG. 17, 2012, AGAINST SOUTHEASTERN CONFERENCE POWER

VANDERBILT. ALTHOUGH THE SKYHAWKS DROPPED THE MATCH 2-0, THE NIGHT MARKED THE FIRST OF THREE NIGHT GAMES FOR THE SKYHAWKS IN 2012 IN ADDITION TO HOSTING THE 2012 OHIO VALLEY CONFERENCE TOURNAMENT.



IN THE SUMMER OF 2010, SKYHAWK FIELD RECEIVED A MASSIVE FACELIFT. NEW COLORFUL WIND SCREENS WERE ALSO ADDED TO GIVE THE FIELD A PROFESSIONAL EXTERIOR LOOK, AND NEW BRICK BARRIERS WERE ALSO BUILT AROUND BOTH BENCHES. ANOTHER NEW FEATURE ADDED ARE A PAIR OF LARGE TENTS THAT HAVE BEEN PLACED OVER THE TWO ADJACENT SETS OF BLEACHERS THAT SANDWICH THE MAIN BLEACHERS. THIS PROVIDES A COMFORTABLE, SHADY CLIMATE FOR FANS OF ALL AGES TO ENJOY.

THE FIRST MATCH PLAYED AT SKYHAWK FIELD, WAS ON SEPT. 4, 1998, AGAINST OHIO VALLEY CONFERENCE FOE TENNESSEE TECH. ALTHOUGH THE SKYHAWKS DROPPED A TOUGH 1-0 DECISION IN THAT MATCH, THEY CAME ROARING BACK FOR THE FIRST HOME WIN IN PROGRAM HISTORY ON THEIR NEXT TRY - A 2-1 WIN OVER OVC OPPONENT MOREHEAD STATE ON SEPT. 12, 1998.

OVER THE YEARS, THE SKYHAWKS HAVE PUT TOGETHER A 82-55-7 RECORD WHILE PLAYING IN FRONT OF THE HOME CROWD. HOWEVER, UT MARTIN HAS ENJOYED A TREMENDOUS HOME-FIELD ADVANTAGE OVER THE LAST SEVERAL SEASONS. SINCE 2002, THE SKYHAWKS ARE 79-29-7 IN MATCHES PLAYED AT SKYHAWK FIELD, HAVING LOST ONLY 14 MATCHES ON THEIR HOME TURF IN THE LAST EIGHT SEASONS.

IN 2009, THE SKYHAWKS MATCHED THE BEST HOME START TO ANY SEASON BY BEGINNING THE YEAR 6-0-0, AND ENDED THE SEASON WITH THE HIGHEST SINGLE-SEASON HOME WINNING PERCENTAGE (.857) IN PROGRAM HISTORY. THE 2010 SQUAD FOLLOWED THAT WITH A FIVE-MATCH HOME WINNING STREAK, WHICH INCLUDED SHUTOUTS IN ALL FIVE MATCHES AND CONFERENCE WINS OVER AUSTIN PEAY, JACKSONVILLE STATE AND TENNESSEE TECH.

SKYHAWK FIELD HAS ALSO BEEN HOME TO THE PUMA SKYHAWK INVITATIONAL FROM 2002-2007 AND 2009, AS WELL AS THE FIRST ROUND OF THE OHIO VALLEY CONFERENCE TOURNAMENT IN 1999, 2003, 2008 AND HOSTED THE 2012 TOURNAMENT IN ITS' ENTIRETY.



The University of Tennessee at Martin soccer program has grown into one of the top programs in Ohio Valley Conference history behind the work of head coach Phil McNamara, who enters his sixth season at the helm after being named UT Martin's fourth head coach on March 23, 2010.

During his tenure at UT Martin, McNamara has continued to build an impressive resume. Having won four consecutive OVC titles, including two regular season and tournament championships, McNamara has guided players to 12 All-OVC first team honors, four earning second team honors and 10 on the All-Newcomer teams. McNamara helped Skyhawks earn their first OVC Player of the Year in 2014 when Rianna Jarrett brought home the award. In his second season, McNamara helped Melissa Govea earn UT Martin's first OVC Defensive Player of the Year award in 2012.

Last season McNamara saw the Skyhawks open the season with a school-record four victories on their way to a fourth-straight season with double-digit victories. Guiding the team to a 12-6-2 record including a 6-3-1 conference slate, the Skyhawks were offensively gifted by leading the OVC in shots taken. The season saw newcomer Rianna Jarrett set a school-record with 17 goals on her way to the program's first OVC Player of the Year honor. In the conference tournament, UT Martin fell in a shootout to Jacksonville State

In 2013 McNamara guided the Skyhawks to their fourth-consectutive as he led the Skyhawks to piece of conference history. The Skyhawks picked up their fourth consecutive OVC title, including two regular season and tournament championships, after rattling off an 8-2 record in conference play to win their second consecutive season crown. The Skyhawks became the first team in conference history to pull off such a streak.

After McNamara took the Skyhawks to the NCAA Tournament for the first time in program history, he posted arguably the best season in school history in 2012. UT Martin captured its first

outright Ohio Valley Conference regular season championship on its way to a new program record for single-season winning percentage (.659, 13-6-3). In the NCAA Tournament, the Skyhawks pushed Southeastern Conference power Kentucky to the limit before a narrow 1-0 loss in overtime.

For his efforts, McNamara garnered 2012 OVC Coach of the Year honors. He also presided over five players who were All-OVC performers, including Saphyra Coombs-James - the program's first-ever OVC Freshman of the Year. All in all, eight of McNamara's players earned All-OVC or All-OVC Tournament accolades in 2012.

McNamara's second season at UT Martin was a banner year, as the Skyhawks captured their firstever OVC Tournament championship in 2011. UT Martin won a program-record six straight games from Oct. 21 through Nov. 6 on its way to a school record for victories (14) before falling to thenundefeated Memphis in its first NCAA Tournament match in school history. The Skyhawks boasted four players on the All-OVC team, including Melissa Govea (the league's Defensive Player of the Year.

In his debut season as Skyhawk skipper, McNamara guided UT Martin to an 8-8-2 record and 3-4-1 OVC slate. The Skyhawks began to click midway through the schedule, winning seven of nine games during one stretch. UT Martin also continued its home dominance under McNamara, putting together a five-match win streak and going unbeaten for a 58-day span, falling only in the home opener and finale in 2010. The stingy Skyhawk defense also excelled under McNamara, as the team tied an all-time single-season record with eight shutouts.

McNamara came to UT Martin from Carson-Newman College in Jefferson City, Tenn., where he led the Eagles to the NCAA Division II championship tournament in each of his last seven years. His teams advanced to the NCAA Final Four in back-to-back years in 2004-05 and won five regular season league titles and four South Atlantic Conference tournaments. During his eight-year tenure at Carson-Newman, he picked up the South Atlantic Conference Coach of the Year honor four times.

At Carson-Newman, McNamara's teams were consistently ranked, as his players garnered several top honors throughout his tenure. All in all, he coached 43 all-conference players, 22 all-region players, four All-SAC Tournament members, four All-SAC tournament MVP's, four All-Americans (including the first in Carson Newman history), four All-NCAA Tournament team players, three SAC Players



McNamara's 2009 Carson-Newman team was the best in school history, as they set a single-season record for most wins (20). They finished ranked seventh in the nation after winning their third NCAA Southeast Regional title under his guidance. McNamara won 11 games or more every year for the past eight years at Carson-Newman.

Before Carson-Newman, McNamara served two seasons at Virginia Intermont in Bristol, Va.. He posted a 17-12 record and he led the team to both conference and regional championships. He was named conference and

regional coach of the year. . McNamara has three European coaching licenses and has served as a youth coach for the Irish Football Association (IFA) in Belfast, Northern Ireland. As a player, he was a YTS trainee with Ashton Villa FC in England for two years, and spent one season with the Carrickfergus Rangers FC in the Irish First Division. He was a member of the Cliftonville FC in the Irish Premier

League for four years before ending his playing career in the United States.t McNamara is married to the former Jacqueline Logue of Belfast, Northern Ireland, and has two children, Halina and Anthony.

Leslie Gillies begins her second season as assistant head coach after serving as a fulltime assistant coach at the University of Tennessee at Martin since 2010.

Gillies has been instrumental in building an impressive resume throughout her time at UT Martin as she led the Skyhawks to a piece of conference history in 2013. The Skyhawks picked up their fourth consecutive OVC title, including two regular season and tournament championships, after rattling off an 8-2 record in conference play to win their second consecutive season crown. The Skyhawks became the first team in conference history to pull off such a streak.

The Skyhawks saw five players take home six OVC awards, highlighted by three All-OVC first team selections for Mariah Klenke, Aoife Lennon and Hannah Fessenden while Alyssa Curtis earned second team honors. . As a whole, six Skyhawks took home either All-OVC or All-OVC Tournament accolades in 2013.

In 2012, Gillies was part of arguably the best season in Skyhawk soccer history. UT Martin cruised through its first-ever Ohio Valley Conference regular season championship on its way to a 13-6-3 overall record. For the second straight season, UT Martin advanced to the NCAA Tournament, where it battled against Southeastern Conference power Kentucky before falling 1-0 in overtime. The Skyhawks' .659 season winning percentage ranks first in school history.

Gillies guided eight Skyhawks to either All-OVC or All-OVC Tournament honors in 2012. In 2011, Gillies helped guide the Skyhawks to their first-ever NCAA Tournament appearance, as a result of winning the OVC Tournament championship. She presided over a

squad that shattered the program record for matches played (23), victories (14), highest winning percentage (.652), longest winning streak (six), points (120), assists (34) and shots (383)

winning streak (six), points (120), assists (34) and shots (383).

Gillies coached four All-OVC performers in 2011, led by OVC Defensive Player of the Year Melissa Govea.

In 2010, Gillies and the Skyhawks found their groove at the midpoint of the season, as UT Martin produced victories in seven of nine matches during one spurt in the schedule. She also oversaw a defense that grinded out eight shutouts, which tied a single-season UT Martin program record.

Prior to UT Martin, Gillies spent three seasons as an assistant coach to current Skyhawk head coach Phil McNamara at Carson-Newman, helping the Eagles to a 40-14-2 record (including a school-record 20 wins in 2009), three consecutive NCAA Division-II Tournament appearances and two South Atlantic Conference regular-season and tournament titles.

At Carson-Newman, Gillies was responsible for the organization of practices, ongoing recruitment, workouts, administrative duties such as travel and scheduling, player development and team preparation, among other things.

Not only did Gillies coach with McNamara at Carson-Newman, she also finished out her collegiate playing career for him from 2004 through 2006 before graduating with a bachelor's degree in applied psychology in 2007.

In those three seasons, Gillies led the team to a 53-10-3 record, including an 18-3 conference slate. A forward and outside midfielder, she led the team to back-to-back NCAA Division-II Tournament Final Fours, as well as two regular-season SAC titles and two SAC Tournament titles. Perhaps the most impressive feat is that as a player, she was part of the three most winningest seasons in Carson-Newman history at that point in time, including a then-school-record 19 wins in 2004.

Before playing at Carson-Newman, Gillies spent two seasons playing in Conference-USA for head coach Paul Harbin at the University of Alabama at Birmingham. As a true freshman, she logged 203 minutes and scored her first career point on an assist against Jackson State on Oct. 25, 2002. The next season, she saw limited action because of an injury. In her two years at UAB, the Blazers went 22-14-2 with a 13-7 league record.

A Marietta, Ga. native, Gillies was a four-year letterwinner at Sprayberry High School, where she was an all-star selection in the state of Georgia. She scored 56 goals - including a team-high 21 her junior season - in her career and led the Yellow Jackets to a state 5A quarterfinalist berth in 2001, as well as a 6AAAA Sub-Region championship and pair of 6AAAA Sub-Region runner-up appearances.

### THE YOUNG SKYHAWKS LOOK

### TO TAKIE FLIGHT IN 2015

When you walk down the hallway toward the office of University of Tennessee at Martin soccer head coach Phil McNamara, you notice some views. First you see the Ohio Valley Conference Championship trophies sitting on the table next to his desk but outside the office are picture frames sitting with past players. The frames await the next championship run with the newest bunch of Skyhawks.

This year's edition of the UT Martin soccer team is much like McNamara's office. Now in his sixth season as Skyhawk head coach, never has he had a team with as many freshmen. In fact 15 of the 19 student-athletes are about to play their first collegiate season, the highest percentage (79%) in all of NCAA Division-I women's soccer in 2015. Despite their ages, the newlook Skyhawks are striving to add another championship to the prestigious program history.

"We have to keep the same expectations that we have had in the past which will be a huge challenge," McNamara said. "There is freshness around the program with our high standards and the players are reaching every goal that we have set thus far. The group is hungry for success, which shows in their daily work ethic, attitude and commitment. I really like what this group has to offer."

This year's squad will be looking to replace the winningest class in program

history. Last year's senior class won 50 games in their four years at UT Martin. The Skyhawks will also be without the 2014 OVC Offensive Player of the Year Rianna Jarrett, who suffered an offseason knee injury.

"We knew for the past few years that this season was coming but we have been looking forward to it," McNamara said. "Last year's senior class did so much but this season is very rewarding because the competition rate is much higher than before. Normally a freshman has to be patient to beat returners in their spot but this year there aren't many returners so the group is excited about getting chances to the opportunities to play and start."

Arriving to UT Martin in early August, practices began on Aug. 5 and saw a pair of preseason matchups against Mississippi State and East Tennessee State. While the results didn't go in the Skyhawks favor, McNamara got a better idea of what this squad could achieve.

"We tell the players that we have three seasons every year," McNamara said. "We just wrapped up the first season with preseason and now we head into the second season being nonconference and finish with conference play. I have told the team that we need to keep building and moving forward as we progress in each of those upcoming seasons."

The preseason also saw, at times, 11 freshmen on the field. While McNamara has a desired formation in mind for the roster, the preseason saw many strengths for the Skyhawks. With the positives, the job of the coaching staff has been challenging.

"We aren't really sure what formation we will be using this season because we have so many versatile players that will really dictate what positions and formation we need for particular games," McNamara said. "The nonconference portion will give us time to see what works. It's a great problem to have and we are more flexible with three or four formations that we could use and the players would be comfortable while we maintain a possessive style. There will come a time though where we will need to concentrate on one formation and have a backup formation."

During the tenure of McNamara, the Skyhawks have been one of the most defensive teams in the OVC. It begins inbetween the goalposts where two freshmen, Maya Jamison and MaKenzie Crawford, are looking to earn the starting nod.

"It's tough to replace Mariah Klenke,

who is could be the best goalkeeper in conference history, with two freshmen so there are big shoes to fill," McNamara said. "As a team we have to work harder and defend smarter as a team to limit chances on our goalkeepers. That being said I'm very comfortable with either goalkeeper and the competition will probably go all the way down to the conference season. Maya and MaKenzie each bring a different strength so it will come down to game execution to see who wins the starting spot."

The freshmen trend continues up the field and into the defenders who will be looking to help keep the opposition off the scoreboard. The group boasts eight members on this year's squad including lone senior Temple Hughs. Last season the Skyhawks backline produced six shutouts and held opponents to only 19 goals.

"Individually we like all of them, but now we have to find the right players that work well together," McNamara said. "It might not be the best four players that end up starting but the four players that complement each other. From being calm at the right time to building possession from the back, we look for athletes with pace, size and speed that can control the ball. I really expect big things from Rebecca Starnes because she has been so consistent, level-headed and with great recovery speed. I also am looking forward

to seeing how Kaci Mitchell plays coming off an injury last season. She provides experience despite not having the playing experience."

The midfield will provide the foundation for the Skyhawks' success in 2015 according to McNamara, as two players joined UT Martin with international experience.

"I really like the look of the midfield since we are very smart and technical," McNamara said. "There are a number of new players that are looking to gel and gain balance but I expect us to create many chances for our forwards and develop possession. We look for competitive midfielders who can read the game and can run box to box and offer quality passing. I really like the potential from every player in that position but Maggie Burkett and Sara Ketis have done well so far. We still have Amy McGivern to add into the mix and she will provide a level-headed approach with a physical presence."

Leading the Skyhawks offensive attack will be a group of forwards eager for the opportunity to succeed and score goals. After Jarrett scored a single-season record 17 goals last fall, McNamara believes this year's group could do more together.

"What we are looking to do this year is improve by having our entire forward's group better than having just one goal scorer. Last year as the season progressed, teams focused on Rianna and this year I expect our goals scored to be higher and

from different players. In order to do that you have to have multiple goal scorers getting near double-digit goals and I feel we can do that this year with three or four players that can push the pace and score goals."

The group is highlighted by 2012 Freshman of the Year winner Saphyra Coombs-James, who scored five goals in 2014 and several talented freshmen.

"I think Coombs-James has come back completely from her injury she suffered at the end of her freshman season and is more determined than ever. She wants to get back to that level and we are looking for that too, and she showed it with a pair of goals against ETSU in our final tuneup. Along with Saphyra, I like Sierra Franz and Lisa Schmieder, who hasn't been with us long but early signs are that she will be a positive player for us. Hope Van Ryckeghem will keep defenders guessing all season and she covers a lot of field. Then you have Zara Musker who can play in the back but come forward and provide options as well."

The nonconference will see the Skyhawks face eight opponents, all away from Skyhawk Field. UT Martin will begin the season against Conference USA foe Western Kentucky under the lights in Bowling Green on Friday, August 21 before traveling to face off against Evansville of the Missouri Valley Conference on Sunday, August 23. The Skyhawks continue their road trip with a visit to the Cotton State where they will battle Troy and South Alabama, the top two teams in the Sun Belt Conference just last season, in the Troy Trojan Classic to end August.

"With such a young team the hump can be getting that first win and learning what it takes to win. What we have told the team is look at how hard we have worked in the preseason and yet we haven't won yet. At the Division-I level it takes an enormous amount of quality and hard work to win so we will appreciate every win and enter each contest with a confidence that we can be successful."

September will see the conclusion of nonconference play with a Sunday, Sept. 6 matchup against UMKC followed up with a visit to in-state rival Memphis. The nonconference slate concludes with an appearance in the Lipscomb Tournament on Sept. 17-19 where the Skyhawks will battle Western Carolina and Akron.

The journey to a fifth consecutive OVC Tournament appearance begins at Skyhawk Field with a pair of home matches. The home debut will come against Eastern Illinois on Friday, Sept. 25 followed up with defending OVC

champion SIUE on Sunday, Sept. 27. The Skyhawks will then return on the road for three contests but two being close to home with contests against Murray State and Austin Peay before a long trip to Eastern

UT Martin returns home for a crucial tournament run with home matches against Jacksonville State, who knocked the Skyhawks out of the OVC Tournament last season, on Friday, Oct. 16. That is followed up with a home contest against Belmont on Sunday, Oct. 18. The Skyhawks conclude their regular season travel with matches against Tennessee Tech and Morehead State before hosting Southeast Missouri on Thursday, Oct. 29

to wrap up the year.

"I think the league is wide open this year and last season it was close," McNamara said. "I think it will be closer this year than in the past because typically you had two or three teams that would contend for the title and this year I see six teams in that spot. We are picked one spot higher than where we finished last season, which is a compliment to our recruiting class. The nonconference schedule will certainly provide us a foundation to succeed in conference play as our opponents match up similar to our conference opponents. The players have a massive challenge ahead but one that is a fantastic opportunity for this the youngest squad in NCAA Division-I women's soccer."

Fresh off of three consecutive trips to the Ohio Valley Conference Tournament Championship game, the Skyhawks entered the season seeking redemption after a heartbreaking loss in the 2013 title match held at Skyhawk Field. UT Martin began the season predicted to make it back to the title

THE STREAK CAME TO AN END AGAINST SOUTHEASTERN CONFERENCE POWERHOUSE MISSOURI ON SEPTEMBER 7. AFTER BATTLING AND OUTSHOOTING THE TIGERS IN THE FIRST HALF, THE GAME'S ONLY GOAL CAME IN THE 55TH MINUTE OFF A SET PIECE GOAL.

CONSECUTIVE 1-0 DECISIONS THAT WENT AGAINST THE SKYHAWKS BUT MADE THE TEAM STRONGER AGAINST TOUGH COMPLETION. UT MARTIN RETURNED TO THE FRIENDLY CONFINES OF SKYHAWK FIELD AND FOUND THEIR HIGH-POWERED OFFENSE, TOTALLY FIVE GOALS AGAINST TENNESSEE TECH. IT began with a goal from Coombs-James MIDWAY THROUGH THE FIRST HALF, FOLLOWED UP BY EVA HELLER'S FIFTH GOAL OF THE

SEASON SECONDS BEFORE HALFTIME. AFTER THE GOLDEN EAGLES MADE IT 2-1, UT MARTIN SET A NEW SCORING RECORD WITH A THREE GOALS IN LESS THAN THREE MINUTES THANKS TO GOALS FROM ELLIE MYRICK, JARRETT AND THEN MYRICK AGAIN.

The offense kept its momentum as it traveled to Southeast Missouri, scoring two goals including a game-winner with two minutes left. After Jarrett connected on her seventh goal of the season, the Redhawks found an equalizer in the 85th minute. With overtime looming senior defender Amy Maksimowicz timed her run and broke away to net the winning goal into the top right corner of the net for a 2-1 victory.

After suffering a heartbreaking own goal loss to SIUE on the road in early October, UT Martin went into championship mode in order to defend their regular season championship. After the loss, Jarrett turned in one of her best performances, scoring a hat trick against Eastern Kentucky in a 4-0 win. In a rematch of the 2013 OVC Tournament final, UT Martin struck first with freshman Olivia Bohlman scoring in the 39th minute. However the Skyhawks settled for a draw as 2013 Player of the Year Jade Flory scored in the 87th minute.

UT MARTIN RETURNED TO ITS WINNING WAYS WITH THREE CONSECUTIVE WINS AGAINST EASTERN ILLINOIS, BELMONT AND AUSTIN PEAY. DURING THE STREAK JARRETT TURNED IN A RECORD-SETTING PERFORMANCE, SCORING SIX GOALS AND SETTING THE PROGRAM RECORD WITH 17 GOALS IN A SINGLE SEASON. THE REGULAR SEASON CAME TO AN END WITH A 1-0 LOSS TO RIVAL MURRAY STATE.

WITH THE REGULAR SEASON CONCLUDED, THE FOURTH-SEEDED SKYHAWKS EARNED NUMEROUS ACCOLADES INCLUDING RIANNA JARRETT BECOMING THE FIRST UT MARTIN SOCCER PLAYER TO WIN THE CONFERENCE'S PLAYER OF THE YEAR AWARD. JOINING JARRETT WITH POSTSEASON AWARDS WERE SENIORS MAKSIMOWICZ AND DOMINKA

Conc. The duo of Maksimowicz and Conc also made Skyhawk history on senior day, appearing in their 85th matches for a new UT Martin appearance record.

The season turned to November and much like the season had begun, overtime was called upon. After winning the season opener in extra time and losing

The Skyhawks finish the season with a 12-6-2 mark, ranking as the most regular season victories in school history. They created some outstanding opportunities on the night. It's a cruel game, a real cruel game sometimes."

"We have a senior class that has had a remarkable career. They've had big games, won championships and had NCAA Tournament appearances. They have overachieved immensely - individually and collectively. I'm extremely proud of each and every one of them. We send them off with our gratitude and look forward to building a new squad for next season."

The Gamecocks got on the board first in the opening period of play. Lindsey Jackson scored from 15 yards out to the far post for the game's first goal, giving JSU the early 1-0 lead in the 32nd minute.





# ATHLETICS DIRECTOR HIRED: JAn. 13, 2014

Julio Freire, formerly the assistant/associate athletics director for development at the University of Nevada, Las Vegas, was formally introduced as the 12th athletics director in University of Tennessee at Martin history on Jan. 13, 2014. He succeeds Phil Dane, who retired

on Dec. 31, 2013 after 34 years of service at UT Martin, the last 14 of which were as athletics director.

"At certain times, certain individuals rise to the top and that's really what happened in this case," UT Martin Chancellor Dr. Tom Rakes said of the athletics director search. "Julio demonstrates an understanding of protocol and team spirit necessary for this type of position. He also exhibits a level of energy and understanding of how to interact with a whole cross section of individuals. He has seen the intricacies of Division-I athletics and we are fortunate to have him here."

"It's such an exciting day for the future of Skyhawk nation," OVC Commissioner Beth DeBauche said. "I am absolutely delighted for the opportunity to work with Julio and to get to work with his family as we move forward. There are some exciting things going on in the OVC and it's the perfect time to be joining the league. I know Julio brings the right energy, excitement, vision and knowledge to really be a contributor to this fine conference."

Freire stressed three messages at his introductory press conference, noting that he had a plan for comprehensive excellence, he would remain focused on the student-athlete and he would engage the community in a meaningful way.

"We will embrace the spirit of planning for comprehensive excellence, all in support of the mission of the University of Tennessee at Martin. Our plan for excellence will allow us to build upon the department's history and traditions. With this plan, we will guide and support our student-athletes as they aspire to reach their fullest potential academically, athletically and socially."



"Our plan for excellence will allow us to build upon the department's history and traditions. With this plan, we will guide and support our student-athletes as they aspire to reach their fullest potential academically, athletically and socially."

"We will embrace high ideals that a UT Martin student-athlete should be leaving this great university with a meaningful degree and had been in position to compete for championships," Freire said. "Everyone on my staff throughout the department and throughout the university will know that the academic achievement of our student-athletes is our top priority. It is my intent to have us all represent this institution with the highest degree of integrity at all times."

"We will work to communicate a plan that will focus on the well-being of our student-athletes," Freire said. "This plan will be shared within our community, with university leaders, with the academic community, with alumni and fans. We will be inviting them all to be part of our plans and part of our success. I believe that community engagement must extend beyond the campus border, beyond the city limits and beyond the great state of Tennessee."

Freire brings 22 years of experience within intercollegiate athletics and educational settings to UT Martin. He most recently worked under athletics director Jim Livengood at the University of Nevada, Las Vegas as senior associate athletics director from 2010-13. Freire worked closely with university relations, department leadership, athletics development, external operations, athletic program administration and compliance while at the Mountain West Conference affiliate.

Prior to his time at UNLV, Freire spent time at the University of Arizona from 2007-10 as the assistant/associate athletics director for development under Livengood. Among Freire's accomplishments at the Pac-12 school were the increase of planned gifts by \$4.5 million and serving as the athletic program liaison for the highly successful football and men's basketball programs.

Freire also served at fellow OVC institution Tennessee Tech under athletics director Mark Wilson from 2005-07 as the associate athletics director for development. While in Cookeville, Freire was responsible for the cultivation and stewardship of major gift prospects and donors. He increased annual donations by 300 percent and secured seven of the 10 largest gifts in department history.

Freire began his collegiate athletic administration career at Ohio University, where he served as an assistant/associate athletics director for development from 2000-04 under athletics director Thomas Boeh. During his time at the Mid-American Conference member, Freire managed all facets of facilities and game operations units, concession and merchandise contracts and also supervised the renovation and construction of numerous facilities.

Freire spent 10 years as a high school teacher, counselor, coach, athletics director and principal in Phoenix, Ariz. and Tempe, Ariz. before moving on to Ohio.

Born in Tijuana, Mexico and raised in Tucson, Ariz., Freire ran cross country and track and field at Arizona State University in Tempe, Ariz. He graduated with a bachelor of arts degree in education in 1990 and earned his Master's degree in counseling from the University of Phoenix in 1997.

Freire, 47, is married to the former Cherie Taylor and has two children, Christopher (11) and Gabriella (9).

Now in its 68th year, the Ohio Valley Conterence continues to build on the success that has made it the nation's eighth-oldest NCAA Division I conference.

In May 2011 the Conference expanded for the second time in four years, adding Belmont University which began competition in the 2012-13 academic year. The addition of Belmont gave the OVC 12 members, the most the league has had at one time in its illustrious history. The move added a second team in the city of Nashville and was the first addition to the league since Southern Illinois University Edwardsville joined in 2008. Subsequently, the league has shown its stability over the past decade, seeing only one member institution depart over the past 15 years.

The 2009-10 school year saw a change in leadership as Beth DeBauche was named the seventh full-time Commissioner in league history on July 28, 2009. The last three commissioners of the OVC have moved onto jobs as the commissioner of the Big Ten, Big 12 and the Mid-American Conferences.

The OVC's proud history dates back to 1948, but seeds for the new league were actually planted in 1941. It was then that Roy Stewart, the athletics director at Murray State, Charles "Turkey" Hughes, the athletics director at Eastern Kentucky, and Kelly Thompson, the public relations director at Western Kentucky, first broached the idea of forming a new conference. Discussions were put on hold by World War II, but reemerged February 27-28, 1948 at the Kentucky Hotel in Louisville as the three original institutions combined with Morehead State, Louisville and Evansville to form the OVC.

In the 1950s, the OVC became a pioneer on a much more significant scale socially. During times of racial segregation, league member Morehead State became one of the first non-traditionally black mid-southern institutions to accept a black student. In 1958 Marshall Banks earned athletically-related aid at Morehead, which signed a second black athlete, Howard Murphy, a year later. In 1961 Murphy earned all-conference recognition as a halfback in football. With racial barriers broken, the rest of the institutions in the league began to provide educational and athletic opportunities to African-Americans.

After Title IX legislation passed in 1972, women's athletics began a rebirth on the national scene as the NCAA began sponsoring and marketing women's sports. Recognizing the need to provide increased opportunities for female athletes, the OVC began formulating plans for women's athletics in 1975 and established women's championships in the sports of basketball, tennis and track in 1977, with cross country and volleyball added over the next four years. Those sports were initially governed by the Association of Intercollegiate Athletics for Women (AIAW), but the overall strength of women's programs in the league was demonstrated by the automatic bids the OVC instantly received when the NCAA became the governing body in 1982. The conference added women's golf and softball in 1994 and women's soccer in 1998.

Through the past 67 years, 15 teams have won or shared the league's football title. The list is led by Eastern Kentucky, winner of 21 outright or shared football crowns, which is tied for the most in Football Championship Subdivision history (with Massachusetts). Among OVC teams, former member Middle Tennessee is next with 11 titles, followed by Tennessee Tech with 10, and Murray State and former member Western Kentucky with eight apiece. Eastern Illinois has claimed seven football crowns and Jacksonville State has four, while Morehead State, Tennessee State and former members Evansville and East Tennessee State have captured two apiece. Austin Peay, Southeast Missouri, UT Martin and former member Youngstown State have one title apiece.

Murray State and Evansville tied for the initial football championship, and the Racers participated in the first-ever bowl game by an OVC team, tying Sul Ross State 21-21 in the 1948 Tangerine Bowl. From 1948 to 1975, OVC teams played in 15 bowl games, winning eight of them. Eastern Kentucky and Western Kentucky were also participants in the NCAA Division II playoffs in the early and mid-1970s prior to the NCAA's reclassification of football programs into Division I-AA. The term "I-AA" lasted until the end of the 2006 season when it was changed to Division I Football Championship Subdivision (FCS).

The first Division I-AA/FCS football playoff was

held in 1978 with only four teams, which is the only year through present day that the OVC did not field a playoff representative. In 1979, four of the nation's top teams were invited to the playoffs, and two of them - Eastern Kentucky and Murray State - were from the OVC. Murray dropped its semifinal game to Lehigh, but the Colonels nipped Nevada-Reno in double overtime and claimed the national championship a week later with a 30-7 victory over Lehigh. EKU was coached by former All-America quarterback Roy Kidd, who was in his 16th year at the helm of his alma mater and who skippered the Colonels to a second national title three years later. Following the 2002 season, Kidd retired after 39 years at EKU; upon retirement, he ranked sixth alltime among Division I coaches with 315 victories, earning him a spot in the College Football Hall of Fame. EKU's now 21 FCS playoff appearances are the second for the most all-time (behind only Montana's 23 berths).

In addition to Kidd, other coaching legends in the OVC include Charles "Bubber" Murphy, who coached at Middle Tennessee from 1947-1968, Western Kentucky's Jimmy Feix (1968-83), Wilburn Tucker (1954-67) and Don Wade (1968-82) of Tennessee Tech, Bill Ferguson (1967-77) of Murray State, Guy Penny (1959-67) of Morehead State and Boots Donnelly (1977-78 at Austin Peay; 1979-1998 at Middle Tennessee). Following the 2011 season Eastern Illinois head coach Bob Spoo retired after 25 years at the school (the last 16 as members of the OVC). In his time as an OVC coach he compiled 92 total victories (fifth-most in league history) and 68 OVC wins (fourth-most in league history) and was inducted into the OVC Hall of Fame in 2012.

A sampling of former OVC football stars, some of whom were All-Americans during their collegiate careers before achieving stardom at the professional ranks, include Jim Youngblood and Larry Schreiber (Tennessee Tech), Phil Simms (Morehead State), Virgil Livers and Dale Lindsey (Western Kentucky), Myron Guyton and Chad Bratzke (Eastern Kentucky), Cortland Finnegan (Samford) and Tony Romo and Jimmy Garoppolo (Eastern Illinois). In 2008, former Tennessee State standout Dominique Rodgers-Cromartie became just the fourth NFL First Round draft pick in OVC history when he was selected 16th overall by the Arizona Cardinals. He would break into the starting lineup halfway through his rookie season and started at cornerback for the Cardinals in Super Bowl XLIII.

The 2007 season marked a return to scholarship football and the OVC for the Austin Peay Governors. Following the 1996 season the Governors dropped scholarship football and competed as both an independent (1997-00, 2006) and as a member of the Pioneer Football League (2001-05).

The 2007 season also brought new vernacular

The 2007 season also brought new vernacular to the Ohio Valley Conference and the division formerly known as I-AA. Beginning with the 2006 National Championship game the term I-AA was changed to NCAA Football Championship Subdivision (FCS) in a decision by the Division I Board of Directors. The new label was chosen to communicate in a positive and clear manner the unique differences between Division I football categories (chiefly, the post-season opportunity) while still defining them within the Division I experience. The FCS includes programs that compete in an effort to participate in the NCAA championship postseason structure (one of 89 NCAA national championships) as opposed to the Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) which competes in an effort to participate in the postseason bowl system (the 41 NCAA-licensed events which includes the Bowl Championship Series).

In 2010 Southeast Missouri State, picked to finish seventh in the preseason poll, compiled a 7-1 Conference record on the way to its first OVC Championship since joining the league in 1991. Overall the Redhawks were 9-2 during the regular season and earned a berth in the FCS Playoffs, its first playoff berth at any level in the program's 104-year history. Southeast would lose to eventual national champion Eastern Washington in the second round of the playoffs. Head coach Tony Samuel capped the year by winning the Sports Network's Eddie Robinson Award, given to the National Coach of the Year. Samuel was the second OVC coach to win the award (joining Murray State's Houston Nutt who won the award in 1995).

For only the second time in league history in 2011, three teams shared the OVC football championship, as Eastern Kentucky, Jacksonville State and Tennessee Tech finished with 6-2 records.

two champions were crowned at the end of the year was 1962 (when four teams shared the crown).

In 2012 Eastern Illinois became just the fourth football team in OVC history to go from worst-to-first in winning the OVC Championship. The Panthers were led by head coach Dino Babers who became just the fourth first-year head coach to win an OVC Championship (joining Boots Donnelly in 1977, Jason Simpson in 2006 and Dean Hood in 2008 – Jacksonville State head coach John Grass would become the fifth coach to achieve that feat in 2014). During the year Eastern Illinois junior wide receiver Erik Lora shattered the FCS single-season receptions record, hauling in 136 passes in 12 games; that mark was 13 more than the previous NCAA record and 44 more than the previous OVC mark.

In 2013 Eastern Illinois repeated as OVC Champions behind Walter Payton Award winner Jimmy Garoppolo. The quarterback became just the second OVC player to earn the National Player of the Year Award, joining former EIU signal caller Tony Romo (2002). Garoppolo passed for 5,050 yards (second most in NCAA single-season history) and 53 touchdowns (fourth in NCAA history) in leading the Panthers to a 12-2 record and berth to the quarterfinals of the FCS Playoffs. Garoppolo was drafted by the New England Patriots in the second round of the 2014 NFL Draft, becoming just the fifth OVC player selected in that round and just the fifth OVC quarterback ever selected (and first since 1998).

since 1998).

The 2013 season saw the OVC snap a 19-game playoff losing streak dating back to the 2000 season. Tennessee State shutout Butler (marking the first OVC road playoff victory since 1986) to snap the streak while later that day Jacksonville State smashed Samford in the first round. A week later Eastern Illinois beat Tennessee State while Jacksonville State won at McNeese State to each advance to the quarterfinals; that marked the first time the OVC put two teams in the quarterfinals in the same season since 1991. Overall the four total playoff wins in the same season established a new OVC record.

Over its 67 years, OVC teams have garnered national championships and bowl games in football, along with national team or individual titles in the sports of rifle, cross country, track and golf.

The playing field is not the only place where OVC athletes are working hard. The league also recognizes excellence in the classroom. Six Scholar-Athlete Awards are presented yearly to male and female athletes, while others are commended for their academic success by being Medal of Honor recipients or earning a spot on the Commissioner's Honor Roll. Additionally, the league annually presents one institutional Academic Achievement Award, as well as separate team awards in each Conference-sponsored sport. Since the College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA) Academic All-America program began, the Ohio Valley Conference has had 243 student-athletes honored with the award, including 51 over the last five years (2010-15).

The vision of leadership demonstrated by the Founding Fathers in 1948 remains alive today as the Ohio Valley Conference prepares for the future. One example is in regard to the current trend in collegiate athletics administration for increased involvement of university presidents in setting policies and making rules. The presidents of OVC institutions, however, have always governed the Conference, long before presidential governance became a national theme.

The Ohio Valley Conference sponsors the following sports: baseball, basketball, cross country, football, golf, tennis and track for men, and basketball, cross country, golf, soccer, softball, tennis, track and volleyball for women. In addition, the OVC also sponsors the combined men's and women's sport of rifle.

Now in its seventh decade of competition, the Ohio Valley Conference has grown significantly from its humble beginnings while increasing the number of athletics opportunities it provides for students. Current league representatives include charter members Eastern Kentucky, Morehead State and Murray State, along with Austin Peay, Belmont, Eastern Illinois, Jacksonville State, Southeast Missouri, SIU Edwardsville, Tennessee State, Tennessee Tech and UT Martin.

Above: Skyhawk rifle member Dakotah Faught notched a piece of history after appearing in back-to-back NCAA Championships along with earning All-American honors.



Above: Lester Hudson became the first Skyhawk in history to be selected in the NBA Draft when he was drafted by the Boston Celtics in 2009. A two-time OVC Male Athlete of the Year, he led the UT Martin men's basketball team to its first-ever OVC regular season championship in 2008-09. The only player in NCAA Division-I history to accumulate a quadruple-double, he has suited up for the NBA's Boston Celtics (2009-10), Memphis Grizzlies (2009-10, 2011-12), Washington Wizards (2010-11), Cleveland Cavaliers (2011-12) and Los Angeles Clippers (2014-15) since graduating from UT Martin.



Above: Heather Butler became the first player in UT Martin and Ohio Valley Conference history to play in the WNBA after signing with the San Antonio Stars. She left the Skyhawks as the program and conference's all-time leading scorer with 2,865 career points, ranking 16th in NCAA history. Her 392 career 3-pointers tied the NCAA all-time record while scoring double figures in all 129 games of her career, ranking as the second longest streak in history.
